Matching Grant to support the continuation and expansion of Project Concern International's (PCI) programs to establish self-supporting, low-cost systems of primary health care (PHC) for the very poor in developing countries.

PCI will expand its PHC training programs and will establish PHC in underserved communities, with each project having a long-term goal of country wide coverage of PHC needs. Beginning with host country support, PCI will establish model health care systems that: (1) bring an affordable system of health care to underserved communities; (2) develop local capacity to assume total responsibility for projects; (3) provide financial and technical support within specific time frames; (4) establish host country nationals as community health worker (CHW) trainers; (5) train CHW's in basic curative and, more importantly, preventive

health education; and (6) demonstrate to the host country's central government the feasibility of a low-cost, effective PHC system to encourage its replication. PCI may offer advisory services to both governmental and nongovernmental agencies.

Initial projects will be in Mexico, Guatemala, Bolivia, and The Gambia. During the grant period, PCI will also initiate projects in two countries selected from Costa Rica, Liberia, Somalia, and Colombia.

Grant amendment of 9/25/81 prohibits the use of project funds in support of the Ignacio Ramirez primary school in Tiajuana, Mexico. (PD-ABC-711)

Pursuant to the authority contained in the Foreign Assistance Act of 1961, as amended, the Agency for International Development (hereinafter referred to as "A.I.D." or "Grantor") hereby grants to Project Concern International (hereinafter referred to as "PCI" or "Grantee") a matching sum of \$300,000 in support of its development program as more fully described in Attachment 1 to this 50/50 Matching Grant and your grant application/proposal entitled "A Matching Grant Proposed to USAID in Support of Primary Health Care Development Program" dated July 1979 (see Attachment 3 of this Grant).

This Grant is effective as of the date of this letter and is applicable to commitments made by the Grantee in the furtherance of program objectives during the period September 28, 1979 through September 27, 1980 (see Article VI of Attachment 1).



PURPOSE AND IMPLEMENTATION OF GRANT

ARTICLE I - PURPOSE

The purpose of this Grant is to provide matching funds to support the continuation and expansion of the Grantee's programs to establish and institutionalize self-supporting, low cost systems of primary health care for the very poor in LDCs as more fully described in the Grantee's proposal.

ARTICLE II - ACTIVITIES

PCI will continue and expand its primary health care training programs and will establish primary health care in underserved communities with each project having a long term goal of country wide coverage of primary health care needs. Beginning with host country support, PCI will establish model health care systems that: bring an affordable system of health care to these underserved communities; develop local capacity to assume total responsibility for projects; provide financial and technical support within a specific time frame; promote local responsibility for the development of future health care services; establish host country nationals as Community Health Worker trainers; train Community Health Workers in basic curative and, more importantly, preventive health education; and demonstrate to the host country's central government the feasibility of a low cost, effective primary health care system to encourage its replication. PCI may offer advisory services to governmental and nongovernmental agencies.

The ultimate goal of the health care program will be self-sufficiency; i.e., the ability of the program to sustain itself indefinitely on local resources, without the need for personnel, money or equipment from outside the country.

Initial grant projects will be in Mexico, Guatemala, Bolivia and The Gambia. During the grant period, PCI will also initiate new projects in two countries selected from: Costa Rica, Liberia, Somalia, and Colombia. PCI may initiate these new projects in countries other than those listed with the prior concurrence of the A.I.D. Project Manager.

The activities supported under this Grant are more fully described in the Grantee's proposal.

ARTICLE III - IMPLEMENTATION

The Grantee will implement the Grant in accordance with its proposal.

ARTICLE IV - REPORTS

Semi-annual reports of progress will be prepared and twelve (12) copies submitted to A.I.D. Reports will contain information concerning progress toward achievement of grant objectives, problems encountered and action required or taken for their resolution, and a brief outline of proposed activities for the ensuing quarter. Upon completion of grant activities, a final summary evaluation report will be prepared and submitted to A.I.D.

ARTICLE V - EVALUATION

At the end of nine months of the first program year, PCI will prepare a report for A.I.D. (and PCI's own use) on the current status of evaluation activities with respect to all the country programs funded under this grant. The report will use as its framework the evaluation concepts and approaches set forth in the Grantee's proposal. The report will describe what evaluation

work (both routine and extraordinary) has been done over the last two years for each country program; and in what ways the direction, emphasis, or management of the country program has been changed or affirmed as a result of the evaluation. If this survey of two years experience should show that evaluation has been deficient in the country programs, the report will include a discussion of the steps which PCI will take to correct these deficiencies. The report will also include a section describing the kinds of information on country programs which will normally be available in the PCI San Diego home office for purposes of program planning and management and other decision making by the Department of Health Services. Ten (10) copies of the report will be transmitted to A.I.D. within 30 days of the end of the reporting period.

ARTICLE VI - GRANT TERM

- A. The term of this Grant shall be from September 28, 1970 through September 27, 1981.
- B. All subgrants and subordinate agreements under this Grant shall not extend beyond the term of this Grant unless this Grant is extended, at an increase in the Government's share, to cover the terms of such subgrants and subordinate agreements. The intent of this paragraph is to allow the Grantee to make long term commitments within currently obligated funds (i.e., A.I.D.'s share); it is not the intent of this paragraph to authorize the Grantee to make unfunded long term subgrant and subordinate agreements and thereby commit A.I.D. to unfunded commitments.

ARTICLE VII - MATCHING UNDERSTANDINGS

A. A.I.D. agrees to match dollar for dollar (i.e., 50/50) from the funds provided under this Grant for each annual period of the Grant, the Grantee's private funds and "in-kind" contributions under this Grant, up to the dollar limit stated on the face of this Grant.

B. The standard provision of this Grant entitled "Allowable Costs and Contributions" shall be used to determine the acceptability of the Grantee's "in-kind" contributions.

C. The Grantee's private matching funds shall be from other than public sources (i.e., non-governmental sources); the Grantee may include cash and "in-kind" contributions from private third parties in meeting its share of obligation. Grantee funds received directly or indirectly from the U.S. Government, any foreign government, or public international organization like the United Nations shall not be allowable in determining the Grantee's share. The intent of this paragraph is to insure that A.I.D.'s share is matched by private funds, not public funds received either directly or indirectly by the Grantee.

D. The parties agree that the restrictions on the use of A.I.D.'s funds, stated in the standard provisions of this Grant, shall not apply to the Grantee's matching funds and "in-kind" contributions. The only restriction on the allowability of a Grantee matching expenditure is that it shall be incurred for the purposes of this Grant. In addition, the parties agree

that individual expenditures do not have to be matched, provided that the total of all annual expenditures under this Grant are matched. This arrangement will allow the Grantee to absorb any disallowed expenditures under this Grant are matched. This arrangement will allow the Grantee to absorb any disallowed expenditure attributed to A.I.D.'s share from the Grantee's matching share, provided that the expenditure was otherwise for the purposes of this Grant.

E. If at the end of each year hereunder, the Grantee has expanded an amount of A.I.D. grant funds greater than expenditures from its non-Federal contribution, the difference may be applied to reduce the amount of A.I.D.'s obligation the following year. However, if this Grant has expired or been terminated such amount shall be refunded to A.I.D. in accordance with Attachment B, Standard Provision B entitled "Refunds".

ARTICLE VIII - DRAWDOWN AGAINST FEDERAL RESERVE LETTER OF CREDIT

Based on the recipient's stipulated cash flow requirements, A.I.D. shall request through the Treasury Department, that the FRLC authorize quarterly drawdowns of up to \$90,000 up to the yearly ceiling of the Grant. The foregoing is subject to applicable interest accrual provisions set forth elsewhere in the Grant document.
