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MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING

between

Mr. Nasrullah Rehmat for Jamiat al Ulama of Afghanistan

and

Dr. Joseph Rittmann for Mercy Corps International

This memorandum of understanding is between Mr. Nasrullah Rehmat of Jamiat al-Ulama of Afghanistan, and Dr. Joseph Rittmann of Mercy Corps International, for Al-Jehad Hospital and Clinics.

This memorandum of understanding states that Jamiat al-Ulama of Afghanistan and Mercy Corps International, as founding organizations of Al-Jehad Hospital and Clinics, agree to form an advisory board for Al-Jehad Hospital and Clinics.

The advisory board will support Mercy Corps International in administration of Al-Jehad Hospital and Clinics in accordance with the terms of this agreement.

1.0 The Mission of Al-Jehad Hospital

Al-Jehad Hospital and Clinics was established in 1987 in Quetta by Jamiat al-Ulama of Afghanistan and Mercy Corps International with funds granted by the United States Agency for International Development. Al-Jehad Hospital and Clinics was established to train health workers for service in Afghanistan.

The mission of Al-Jehad Hospital and Clinics is to train health workers to meet the health needs of the people of Afghanistan located in the southwest region. At the appropriate time and under appropriate conditions, Al-Jehad Hospital and Clinics will relocate inside Afghanistan with its program, staff, and equipment to continue training.

2.0 Administration of Al-Jehad Hospital and Clinics

Mercy Corps International is responsible for the program of Al-Jehad Hospital and Clinics and for the

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fulfillment of the mission of Al-Jehad Hospital and Clinics. Mercy Corps International administers Al-Jehad Hospital and Clinics in accordance with the goal of providing quality health workers for Afghanistan. Resources obtained from donors are applied with priority for training. The budget for Al-Jehad Hospital and Clinics is used for training.

Mercy Corps International appoints the best qualified staff for the service and operation of Al-Jehad Hospital and Clinics. Mercy Corps International appoints staff with administrative responsibility for Al-Jehad Hospital and Clinics. Mercy Corps International appoints support staff for operating and maintaining Al-Jehad Hospital and Clinics.

Mercy Corps International appoints trained medical staff for outpatient care, for women's health care, for laboratory, dental, and radiology services, for ward nursing, and for surgical services. Mercy Corps International appoints trained staff for the training department.

All staff participate in helping Al-Jehad Hospital and Clinics succeed in its mission through their commitment to the rebuilding of health care services for Afghanistan. All staff work together to improve the quality of the program.

3.0 Resources of Al-Jehad Hospital and Clinics

Al-Jehad Hospital and Clinics operates with funds provided by the United States Agency for International Development. Funding is provided one year at a time, with no assurance for continued funding.

Funds from other sources are included in the total budget of Al-Jehad Hospital and Clinics.

4.0 Technical Assistance of Al-Jehad Hospital and Clinics

Mercy Corps International appoints staff to provide technical assistance to Al-Jehad Hospital and Clinics in certain areas. These technical consultants are expatriates who volunteer their skills for short periods for a relatively small stipend. These consultants are administered by Mercy Corps International and cooperate with the administration of Al-Jehad Hospital and Clinics.

5.0 Terms of Reference of the advisory board

The advisory board will be established and operate under the terms of reference stated here.

TERMS OF REFERENCE

1.0 An advisory board will be formed according to the mission of Al-Jehad Hospital and Clinics and the terms of this agreement.

1.1 No member of the board will be employed by or receive compensation from Jamiat al-Ulama of Afghanistan or Mercy Corps International.

2.0 The board will form its membership in the following manner.

Step 2.1 Each founding organization of Al-Jehad Hospital and Clinics will nominate one person to be a member.

The names will be delivered in writing in a sealed envelope to the Manager of Services, Al-Jehad Hospital and Clinics, before 15 September 1990.

The names will be submitted under the signature of Dr. Joseph Rittmann and Mr. Nasrullah Rehmat respectively.

The nominated members will sign this memorandum.

Step 2.2 The two members will together nominate two additional members.

The names will be delivered in writing in a sealed envelope to the Manager of Services, Al-Jehad Hospital and Clinics before 15 October 1990.

The names will be submitted under the signature of the two members nominated by the founding organization.

The nominated members will sign this memorandum.

Step 2.3 The four members will nominate one additional person to be the executive secretary for the board.

The executive secretary will be responsible for the operation of the board.

The names will be delivered in writing in a

sealed envelope to the Manager of Services, Al-Jehad Hospital and Clinics before 15 November 1990.

The names will be submitted under the signature of the four members.

The nominated members will sign this memorandum.

Step 2.4 The executive secretary will call the first meeting of the board before 1 December 1990 with the written agreement of the members.

The Country Director of Mercy Corps International will attend regular meetings as acting administrator of Al-Jehad Hospital and Clinics.

3.0 The Powers of the board will be as follows.

Power 3.1 The board will meet quarterly in Quetta, Pakistan until Al-Jehad Hospital and Clinics is established in Afghanistan.

Power 3.2 The board will hear and review a report given by the Country Director of Mercy Corps International on the progress of Al-Jehad Hospital and Clinics at regular meetings.

The board will direct questions to the Country Director.

Power 3.3 The board will nominate an administrator for Al-Jehad Hospital and Clinics.

The administrator will support Mercy Corps International and the mission of the hospital and report to the Country Director of Mercy Corps International.

The candidate will have proven experience in administering a large hospital that includes a training program.

The candidate will be medically qualified with satisfactory credentials in administration, business, and management.

The candidate will have appropriate understanding of and experience in delivery of health care within Afghanistan under current circumstances.

The candidate will accept compensation from Mercy Corps International at a rate which is in line with the salary of Al-Jehad

Hospital and Clinics staff.

Power 3.4 The board will review broad plans for Al-Jehad Hospital and Clinics.

Broad plans for the program of the Al-Jehad Hospital and Clinics will be presented regular meetings of the board.

Power 3.5 The board will seek funding for Al-Jehad Hospital and Clinics according to the mission of Al-Jehad Hospital and Clinics.

Funds obtained by the board will be added to the general revenue of Al-Jehad Hospital and Clinics and administered by Mercy Corps International.

5.0 Tenure of Board

5.1 The original members of the board will hold membership for two years from the date of the first meeting.

5.2 Any member who resigns from the board will be replaced by unanimous nomination of the new member.

5.3 Two members of the board may not succeed themselves at the end of the first term. The board will nominate each member to be terminated.

5.4 The board will replace the two terminating members before the end of term of any member.

6.0 Rules of Process of the Board

6.1 The board will operate for one year under the probation of Mercy Corps International, and Jamiat-al-Ulma of Afghanistan

6.2 The board will be accountable to the mission of Al-Jehad Hospital and Clinics.

6.3 The board members will be responsible for any costs attached to operation of the board.

6.4 The board members will follow the terms of reference and the memorandum of understanding.

7.0 Dissolution

7.1 If the board dissolves before one year from the date this agreement was signed by Mr. Rehmat and Dr. Rittmann, the executive secretary will inform the Manager of Services, Al-Jehad Hospital and Clinics in writing.

7.2 When the board dissolves, this agreements becomes inactive. Under such circumstances, attempts will be made by original members to find means of continuity keeping in view the aims and objects for which this hospital was organized.

8.0 Responsibilities of the Board

8.1 The board and its members will support Al-Jehad Hospital and Clinics and help to foster a cordial atmosphere for Al-Jehad Hospital and Clinics according to the mission statement.

8.2 The board and its members will support Al-Jehad Hospital and Clinics and its broad plan.

8.3 The board and its members will support improvement in the quality of Al-Jehad Hospital and Clinics staff.

8.4 The board and its members will support the administration of Al-Jehad Hospital and Clinics and participate in review of the appropriateness of its program.

8.5 The board will set a funding target for the first year of its operation and meet this target accordingly.






MCI, CUETTA, PATIENT VISITS BY DATE, OCT 90












MCI HEALTH CENTERS: Lat 29-39 Long 59-76

Evaluation of survey: We have started our trip from chaman through these clinics, Shahrifafa, Khakriz, Arugh, Ghorak, Sangin, Kajaki, Baghran, Nawzad, Panjwayi, Baghi pool, Dand and Maiwand. As we checked Shahrifafa there were many health problems and the people of that area were requesting to have a clinic there.

Baghran (Dara) hospital:

General Information: This hospital is located in Dara village 500 villages are taking advantages from this hospital, it is located in North of Kajaki and 100 Kms far away from it, is located in the center of Baghran district.

Building: it is a fine building it had 26 rooms and 30 beds.

Electricity: They use the generator.

Water source: All the area's people uses Karez.

Latrines: They use latrines but the area's people. Do not have latrines.

Transportation: There is an Ambulance and motor cycle.

Daya: Daya do not have a specific relation with the hospital.

Private Medical: There was one private Medical.


Patients: Patients were coming to the hospital without any difficulties.

There are more than 500 villages, the population of this district is 350,000, the area is secured and the people are busy on their daily work, but there is many health problems.

Above hospital: The supplies which the have been getting from MCI are not enough, because the number of patients are too many and it increases, the supply which were given were according the war situation, now the people which have been immigrated have come back and in every reports of clinic the number of women and children patients are too many than before, so it will be better to prepare the supplies to the present situation.

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TB Programme of Dara Hospital

General Information : This programme had started in Baghran district 1-10-1989, for the first time, they had twenty patients and bought the medicines by their own expenses which were 480,000 Afghanis only. The MCI started cooperation with them and bought 8 months TB drugs for forty patients, in which 26 new TB patients have been registered and started retreatment for other 20 old patients even they have been treated once but their problem did not cure, the drugs which have been sent by MCI were prepared for 40 patients each 56Kg but the patients which were under treatment were not 56Kg. therefore they have treated 6 more.

The results are as follows:

1. 5 patients had completely been treated.
2. 3 " " died
3. 4 " " escaped including an out reach worker.
4. 34 " are under treatment.
5. 3 " replaced.

New cases:

A number of suspected TB patients have been introduced by ORW 13 of them got BK+ after general investigation as chest X-Ray, sputum exam, but were not treated. I started their treatment and brought some of their slides and gave them to Alice for re-examination.

They are distributing the TB medicines to the patients, the patients which are not able to come to the hospital. So they send their medicine to their homes by out reach workers ORW, and then they give the report to the supervisor (A. Majid) and every one of ORW is responsible for his own area.

As I said that Dr. Qasam has been doing diagnosis and treatment in his absense M. Yaqoub takes his responsibility, and he is also the responsible of the programme.

There are two women in mentioned village they are 25, 30 years old they have signs and symptoms of TB like fever, cough, lymph adenitis, but are not coming to the hospital, the reason is they knew that they are not getting the drugs. In other families two women Bibi Kawtara and another BK+ but did not get treatment.

One family has been examined in mentioned village. Head of the family Mr. Ghafar had BK+, but was not treated for his two sons which were 8 and 12 years old had signs and symptoms of TB. His 16 years old daughter sputum result was negative but she had signs and symptoms of tuberculosis, and his eldest son was 25 years old sputum result was negative but his X-Ray showed signs and symptoms of TB and A. Ghafar's wife 40 years old had signs and symptoms of tuberculosis. All the above mentioned patients were not treated yet.

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Comments about TB Programme of Baghran.

This Programme had 40 registered patients, but there were 100 problems about these diseases that in 300 persons 20-30 have active TB and the rest are having signs and symptoms of TB. The ORW brings daily report about these matters there were 13 persons who had BK+ after general investigations but they did not treat there fore if a person has an active TB he is not ready to come for investigations, because he already knew that no one takes care of his problem. Another thing is contact treatment, if a person is under treatment and his problems becomes normal but the rest of the family members get signs and symptoms of TB even some of them are under contact treatment not all of them, because the amount of drugs are not enough for them to be given.

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


