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Fifth Quarterly Report (October – December 2001)

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1. INTRODUCTION

The tempo of activities for the ASA Program continued to increase dramatically this quarter (October through December 2001) as demonstrated in this report. The ASA Jakarta Office has strengthened its program management and support function considerably, with comprehensive programs implemented in all five priority provinces and program planning commencing in several others.

2. PROGRAM IMPLEMENTATION AND ACHIEVEMENT

During this quarter, activities have been implemented that support each of the five key result packages (RP) as outlined below.

RP 1 : Increase Risk Reduction and Behavior and Practices

In November, the Papuan Sexuality Research was completed. Preliminary results of the study revealed that the BCC and advocacy strategies in Papua need to be adjusted. More attention needs to be focused on Papuan youth who may potentially to become sex workers, clients of sex workers, or to engage in casual sex. Papuan female sex workers and Papuan male clients of FSW should be a priority, as opposed to *pendatang*. Advocacy to religious leaders and *adat* leaders is also very important.

The BCC TOT batch II was conducted in Yogya from 4-17 November 2001 with 36 participants from Papua, Jakarta, East Java, West Java, and Riau. The training focused on BCC theory & practice, and training facilitation skills.

An evaluation of IEC materials is being planned. Studio Driya Media has been the selected to do the evaluation. Materials to be evaluated have been collected.

Yayasan Utama conducted public awareness activities on the occasion of World AIDS Day in Pekanbaru with support from ASA. YMKK (Yayasan Mitra Kesehatan dan Kesejahteraan) in Batam organized an "AIDS Concern Week" for female factory workers who have the potential to work as FSWs.

Yayasan Kesehatan Bethesda has continued conducting peer education for Papuan youth in Oksibil, who are at risk of HIV transmission. Yapepa has continued conducting outreach to high school students in Merauke, Papua. Dekanat Katholik Jayawijaya with sponsorship from ASA through a RRF has been conducting public awareness through February 2002.

ASA Surabaya assisted KPAD Surabaya to conduct a workshop that addressed the issue of brothels in Surabaya, and resulted in a recommendation not to close the brothel complexes.

RP 1-A - FSW Peer Led Interventions

YAA (Yayasan Abdi Asih – Surabaya) has continued conducting outreach activities under their sub-agreement with ASA.

Considering the scale of the FSW problem in Surabaya, the ASA provincial staff is exploring the potential for additional NGOs to collaborate on promoting safer sex practices, with a focus on 100% condom use.

Yasanto (Merauke), YSA (Sorong) and PSK Uncen (Jayapura) have continued their interventions with FSWs during this period.

ASA Papua and Jakarta have provided technical assistance to Yayasan Almamater and Yashukogo in finalizing their proposals. Both will conduct outreach to street based and local FSWs. Yayasan Almamater's area of work will be at Agats (Asmat), and Yashukogo will be at Wamena. Other proposals for RRFs from Papua are also in process; including an intervention to FSWs in Sorong by Yayasan Peduli AIDS.

RP 1-B- Behavior Change Intervention : Role Model Story

A workshop to discuss, plan and determine benchmarks for the FSW role model story intervention was held on 19 & 20 December with participants from ASA, Atma Jaya University and ADRA (the IA selected for the sub-project). The workshop discussed detailed roles and responsibilities of each party, a common understanding of the RMS concept, and detailed schedule of the work.

Despite substantial technical assistance from the ASA FSW program coordinator to Bandungwangi, due to weak management and over expansion, Bandungwangi's involvement in the role model story initiative has been cancelled.

RP 1-C - Prevention Marketing and Mass Communications

Advertising concepts were developed by Leo Burnett Kreasindo and discussed with the ASA team. A qualitative testing of the advertising concepts with selected target groups was then done by AC Nielson in three cities (Jakarta, Batam, and Manado). The results, which were presented to ASA & USAID on December 5th, clearly showed that an "aspirations" approach was the most compelling concept, followed by an "expert" approach.

ASA and Howard Delafield International have planned the advertising campaign to include two phases. The first phase will consist of six months during which the "expert" concept to debunk the three major myths around HIV/AIDS (HIV/AIDS does not exist in Indonesia, antibiotics can prevent HIV, and you can judge whether someone is HIV (+) or not by appearance). The second phase will utilize an "aspiration" concept. LBK will design several storyboards, which will be selected based on a qualitative research with the target groups.

Public Relations and Policy Advocacy

Two launches were held during the quarter. The launch of the 1st Indonesia National Report on HIV/AIDS, “Challenges and Opportunities of Action” was conducted prior to the ICAAP meeting in Australia in October. The launch of the Harm Reduction Manual at the Coordinating Ministry for Social Welfare was held on 15 November 2001. Both were aimed to gain support and to socialize the documents.

From 4 to 11 November 2001, eight senior policy makers from Papua (Vice Governor of Papua Province and Head of Papua Province KPAD, Vice Chairman of Papua Province PKK, Head of Papua Province Women Empowerment Office, a representative of Women Development Center and also the member of Indonesia Christian Church Synod of Papua, the Mayor of Jayapura and Head of Jayapura Municipality KPAD, Vice Chairman of Merauke District Legislative) went on a guided study tour to Uganda as part of ASA public relations and policy advocacy efforts. The results were very good.

As the follow up of the study tour, the Vice Governor gave presentations of lessons learned in meetings attended by legislative members from Jayapura District, Jayapura District KPAD, the Head of Jayapura sub-districts, and all heads of sub-districts from Papua Province

Three national journalists from Kompas, Tempo, and Antara; and four local journalists (Timika Post, and Papua Post) were involved in a press trip to Papua (Jayapura, Timika, and Merauke) from 11 to 18 November 2001 to promote public discourse concerning HIV/AIDS.

On the occasion of World AIDS Day 2001, ASA Papua conducted a HIV/AIDS talk show at TVRI Papua. Key speakers of the talk show included several members of the study tour as well as Dr. Willy E. Kalalo, Head of Papua Province Health Department.

RP 1-D - Health Ports and Highways Intervention

Bitung

A socialization meeting followed by a planning workshop to launch the concept of Healthy Ports and Highways were successfully conducted during this quarter. KPAD Bitung committed to lead the initiative, and will incorporate this initiative into their strategic planning. They will also propose a local budget to support the initiative. The Transportation Agency, and several other bodies, clearly stated their willingness to establish sectoral budgets. These sectors also made it clear that they will support NGOs working in areas under their authority. Six concept papers (interventions to sailors and fishermen, to truckers, to ojek drivers, and to FSWs) from NGOs were developed and submitted for funding to ASA. The ASA Manado technical advisor is expected to provide necessary technical assistance to the KPAD and related sectors as well as the NGOs to move the program forward. It is expected that all proposals will be funded by ASA by February 2002.

Medan

The KPAND and Women Study Center – University of North Sumatra drafted a proposal for an assessment of truckers. The draft has been submitted to ASA and discussed with relevant ASA program coordinators. It is expected that the proposal will be approved for funding by ASA by the end of early February, and a socialization meeting with stakeholders will be conducted by the end of February 2002.

Central Java

The KPAD Central Java has shown interest in starting the Healthy Ports and Highways Initiative in the province. The Program Management Unit will follow up on this issue with KPAD Central Java in late January 2002.

East Java

The KPAD East Java has discussed with NGOs in Surabaya the possibility of adopting the Healthy Ports and Highways Intervention in Tanjung Perak Surabaya. A final decision has not been made yet.

RP 1-E - Strategies Targeting MSM

MSM Study

A protocol for a study of HIV and syphilis prevalence and risk behaviors in MSM in Jakarta was finalized by the team and submitted for ethical review to the International Review Board (IRB) of UCSF.

IAKMI (Ikatan Ahli Kesehatan Masyarakat Indonesia)

IAKMI has continued to facilitate peer education among waria in Jakarta as well as to provide hotline and comprehensive STI services. Continuing low quality of services despite intensive technical assistance from ASA (and HAPP) is an issue that has raised concern. As this sub-project is approaching its ending date (31 January 2002), the technical team at ASA is seriously considering alternatives with regards to funding this sub-project.

YBPI (Yayasan Bina Putera Indonesia) - Jakarta

ASA has granted a Rapid Response Fund to YBPI to do mapping of Male Sex Workers and their clients in Jakarta, and preparation for outreach to these populations. The results of the mapping will be used by CHR – UI as the basis for the BSS among MSM.

Gaya Siak, Gaya Nusantara, Gaya Priangan

ASA MSM Specialist, in collaboration with provincial staff, has given substantial technical assistance to these NGOs to develop proposals for interventions to MSM in Pekanbaru, Surabaya, and Bandung. Drafts proposal have been submitted to ASA. It is expected that these can be funded by February 2002. All three NGOs have been granted legal status, i.e. registration and certification from the government.

YKB (Yayasan Kesehatan Bethesda) – Jayapura

YKB has continued to facilitate peer education among waria in Jayapura and to provide health services.

RP 1-F - IDU Focused Strategies

The report on the initial assessment and intervention targeting IDUs in Kelurahan Duri Utara has been completed.

Five draft contract documents for IDU interventions (Asia Harm Reduction Network, Center for Harm Reduction – Mc Farlene Burnett, CHR-UI, PPKM Universitas Atma Jaya, and Yayasan Pelita Ilmu) have been processed. It is expected all will be granted by February 2002 at the latest.

ASA IDU advisor and IDU Specialist participated in the Workshop of ASEAN Coordination on Drug Related Policy & Programming from 12-14 November 2001. The workshop focused on policy and demand reduction.

A harm reduction network meeting was conducted on 3-4 December in Jakarta, with 37 participants attending, including the Vice Governor of East Java; several NGOs from Jakarta, Bali, Yogya; and selected journalists.

The ASA Surabaya technical advisor assisted the Drug Information Training conducted by Bappenapzakar (Badan Penanggulangan Narkotik, Psikotropika, dan Zat Adiktif lainnya) in East Java on 1 October 2001. He also gave technical support to Pokjanis Litkaji (Kelompok Kerja Teknis, Penelitian dan Pengkajian) Bappenapzakar and KPAD East Java.

RP 1-G - PLWA Involvement with HIV/AIDS Prevention

ASA supported nine participants to the 5th International Conference on Home and Community Care, Chiang Mai, 16 – 22 December 2001. It included a study tour to Friends for Life Home, Orchid Clinic, Doi-Saket Hospital, and Clear Sky Project where participants met PLWHA in different care settings.

RP 1-H - Client Intervention

On the occasion of World AIDS Day 2001, ASA funded a NGO (Yayasan Tuah Belia) in Kepulauan Riau District, Riau Province to conduct a boat competition to socialize HIV prevention among males in Tanjung Pinang.

Intensive meetings with the staff of the Ministry of Defense during the quarter resulted in a plan to conduct a three-day workshop to reorganize the HIV/AIDS prevention program among the uniformed services in Indonesia in January 2002. This will entail collaboration among MoD, the Armed Forces, Police, MoH, ASA, and AUSAid.

Four NGOs in Manado and Bitung are finalizing proposals for RRFs. They are:

- LHS : In-depth social economic survey and high risk behavior among sailors and operational lanes mapping in Bitung and Manado
- LKKNU: Potential surveillance survey of STI/HIV/AIDS among the ojek drivers and the high risk behavior of the ojek drivers' clients in Manado
- ZPG : Sexual behavior survey among the truck drivers
- Y. Nei Kamang : Social and sexual behavior mapping among the ojek driver in Bitung

RP 2 : Strengthen HIV/STI Services

RP 2-A - Improved STI Diagnosis and Treatment

The Surabaya branch of the Indonesian Medical Association (IDI) hosted a seminar on “Ethics of HIV Testing” on 8 November 2001. Participants included IDI members, representatives of area hospitals, and members of the national midwife (IBI) and nursing (IPPNI) associations. This seminar was very timely to address current problems associated with HIV sero surveillance activities. The characteristics of voluntary counseling and testing (VCT) were also discussed.

Dr. Atiek S. Anartati, of Semarang, and Dr. Kemmy Ampera P. of Surabaya received ASA support to attend a STI/HIV Diploma course in Bangkok and Hat Yai, Thailand from 5-30 Nov. 2001. Both successfully passed the oral and OSCE exams.

As STI/HIV counselors continue to have a pivotal role in improved STI/HIV services, ASA supported monthly counselor meetings in Surabaya and Jakarta. These forums provide an opportunity for professional development and networking of reproductive health counselors from both government and NGO sectors. The Jakarta counselor group is identifying IEC products already in print that will be reproduced to assist with counseling activities in area clinics.

ASA provided technical assistance to YBHK, Manado, and KPAD, Merauke in drafting proposals for STI clinic services in their respective areas.

During this quarter, IAKMI waria clinic in Jakarta provided general health screenings to 105 waria (transsexuals) and 89 male partners. IAKMI continues to refer waria and male partners to the polyclinic at Cipto Magnakusumo General Hospital for follow-up confirmation, treatment for STIs, and HIV testing.

Other STI clinic activities supported under the ASA program this quarter were Bintang Clinic, YSA, Sorong; Tanjung Elmo Clinic, PKBI, Jayapura; and YKB Clinic, Jayapura.

High rates of gonorrhea and other STIs are still being detected among female sex workers at Putat Jaya STD clinic in Surabaya. October and November saw a total of 169 STI infections out of 495 patients. December STI services were inactive due to the closure of the *lokalisasi* during the holy month of Ramadan and Christmas holidays. Putat Jaya staff continues to provide comprehensive STI services to female sex workers and their partners. The tri-partisan support and collaboration for Putat Jaya Clinic by ASA/FHI, Surabaya Municipal Health Department, and the Provincial Lab has been working well.

Dr. Kemmy AP, as ASA consultant providing ongoing technical assistance to Putat Jaya Clinic, has helped the Putat Jaya staff address issues concerning more thorough documentation, increasing efficiency, and improved customer service including counseling activities.

RP 2.2 - Care and Support for PLWA

During this quarter, ASA implementing agencies active in care and support to People Living with HIV/AIDS include, Yayasan Sosial Agustinus, Sorong; YASANTO, Merauke; and Yayasan Abdi Ashi, Surabaya.

An ASA supported workshop on “Case management” is being organized with the assistance of the Widuri Social Work Faculty. A one-day seminar introducing the concept of Case Management as a strategy of providing follow-up to individuals, particularly PLWA and Papuans, was given on 2 Nov. 2001. Two three-day workshops on case management are targeted for the next quarter.

Recognizing the need to develop more capacity for providing care and support to PLWA, ASA supported eight persons to attend the 5th International Conference on Home and Community Care for PLWA, Chiang Mai, Thailand, December 16-22, 2001. ASA coordinated a pre-departure briefing for conference delegates with sponsorship from ASA, AUSAID and ASEAN secretariat. The pre-departure briefing included a dialogue with PLWA and NGOs providing care and support to this population.

The ASA STI/HIV Services Coordinator, represented FHI in designing and facilitating a workshop on “Family Counseling, Improving Communication with Families for Better Support”. This skills building workshop was well attended and held during the 5th ICHCC.

ASA through the assistance of FHI ARO office, facilitated 20 Indonesians on a study tour of medical centers and NGOs in Chiang Mai Province that are providing integrated care and support services.

RP 3 : Enhance Capacity and Quality of Government of Indonesia HIV/STI Surveillance Systems and their Use of Epidemiological Data in Key Decision Making

ASA has been working towards the creation of a second-generation surveillance system which is sustainable over the long term and which Indonesia will be able to expand to

achieve national coverage. The system stresses the better use of data for decision-making, an increasingly important goal as health and welfare systems are decentralized. In order to balance local information needs with the imperative need to maintain data quality at a national level, ASA and partners have proposed a system in which surveillance is guided by surveillance working groups under the auspices of each KPAD, but is implemented by a national body. The proposed implementing agencies are P2M for HIV and STI surveillance (no change from the current system) the central bureau of statistics (BPS) for behavioral surveillance, and the department of health's health research wing (LitBangKes) for periodic, household based surveys which include questions about HIV-related of knowledge and behavior in the general population.

Building the framework for second generation surveillance

In the fourth quarter of 2001, meetings were held with BPS to establish whether they would be interested in undertaking BSS nationally (beginning in ten ASA provinces). The idea was also discussed with P2M and the KPAD North Sumatra to determine whether the local guidance/ national implementation model would work for them. The response was initially positive on all fronts, but it became apparent after time that P2M had some reservations about the model. These reservations revolved principally around the extent to which BSS qualifies as social research, in which case it might be thought to come under the responsibility of LitBangKes. After intensive discussions with P2M, LitBangKes and other partners, the function of BSS as just one more tool in the surveillance toolbox was clarified, and the Director General issued a letter on the 25th of January giving his full support for the new framework for Second Generation Surveillance.

We expect to move quickly in early 2002 to implement this model in a few key provinces, with all provinces covered by the end of the year. Meetings have already been held with North Sumatra, and Riau, West Java and DKI Jakarta will follow shortly. These meetings aim to explain the new structure of second-generation surveillance, explain the roles and responsibilities of KPAD working groups on surveillance, and help provinces to begin to constitute these working groups.

Behavioral Surveillance

While waiting for the approval of the second-generation framework, we worked with our partner organization the Population Council to prepare BPS to take over surveillance activities. After some discussion, BPS has decided to limit their work in the first year to sex workers and client groups. They would like to gain more experience working with non-household samples before taking on the truly hard-to-reach populations such as drug injectors and men who have sex with men. While BPS conducts BSS among sex workers and client groups (with training and quality control from the Population Council), the University of Indonesia's Center for Health Research will conduct BSS in IDUs in three cities and three groups of MSM, all in three cities. (Details are given in the attached plan).

The Population Council is charged with developing training materials, questionnaires etc for BPS. Questionnaire revision was undertaken for the BPS groups together with ASA

staff in Q4 2001. IDU and MSM questionnaires will be finalized with UI in January. Training in BSS methodology for BPS at the central level and for three “key” provinces will begin in the first quarter of 2002.

Serological HIV surveillance and STI surveillance

ASA support for strengthening sero surveillance is not yet well defined. During this quarter, a consultant was identified and hired to conduct an assessment of the quality of the HIV surveillance system. The assessment will include all aspects of surveillance from sampling to data reporting. ASA is already responding to a clearly defined need to strengthen laboratory capacity. Beyond that, it will set its priorities in supporting strengthened HIV surveillance according to the outcome of the surveillance quality assessment.

In addition to the assessments, ASA is responding to a significant demand for training in ethical surveillance methods. This activity began as a joint initiative with AUSAid, who provided the majority of the technical input for two meetings held in the second half of 2001. Interest was substantial. At least one province – East Java – has repeated the training for district workers with support from the Indonesian Doctors’ Association (IDI). ASA is now planning further regional meetings to reinforce the need to conduct surveillance in ways that provide data for decision-making without jeopardizing the rights of those included in surveillance.

MSM study

One of the neglected populations in HIV surveillance and programming in Indonesia is men who have sex with men. It is also not known how much risk behavior between men might contribute to a wider epidemic, because men who have sex with men also have female partners.

ASA is therefore conducting a study among five sub-populations of men who have sex with men. These are transvestite sex workers, male-identified sex workers, self-recognized men who have sex with men (but who do not sell sex), clients of transvestites, and clients of male sex workers. The last two groups will participate only in the qualitative wing of the study. The first three groups will participate in qualitative studies, quantitative surveillance (through BSS), and a sero-survey that will yield measures of HIV and syphilis prevalence. The study will also compare the performance of HIV tests using serum and using spots of blood dried on filter paper, which, if validated, have the potential to become an important tool in HIV surveillance systems in Indonesia.

A wide variety of partners are involved in the study, and much preparation has been done. In December, the protocol (available from ASA offices) was submitted to the University of California’s ethical review board, and was conditionally approved (subject to minor changes, which have already been undertaken). It is anticipated that training for study investigators – a substantial fraction of whom are members of the MSM communities – will take place in late February and early March, and fieldwork will begin in mid 2002.

RP 4 : Strengthened Capacity of Local Organizations to Plan, Finance, Manage and Coordinate HIV/STI Responses

During this reporting period, program management and capacity building activities were focused on the empowerment of ASA Program provincial liaison/offices, and strengthening working relationship between ASA and partner institutions that work for building capacity of KPADs and Implementing Agencies. Apart of capacity building activities, ASA facilitated a pre jump-start workshop in two provinces; South Sumatra and West Java.

Empowerment of ASA Program Provincial Liaison Offices

A management and coordination meeting among the staff of ASA headquarters and the ASA provincial program officers was held for three days in Jakarta during November 2001. The meeting discussed in depth ASA program coordination system and mechanism, and the plan of empowering the provincial offices.

The ASA provincial program offices in Papua, North Sulawesi, East Java, and Riau significantly enlarged their scope of work. The decision making process of all ASA Program activities in the respective regions is now flowing first through this four offices. ASA Jakarta will provide back up support either technical or management to these of four provinces.

Outputs of capacity building activities made during the reporting period include:

- Determine scope of work and organizational structure;
- Develop job descriptions;
- Develop annual program operational work plans;
- Decision to recruit and assign two District Liaison Officers each for Papua and Riau ASA program provincial offices.

FHI Indonesia also began recruiting candidates for ASA Program provincial officers in West Java, DKI Jakarta, Central Java, North Sumatra, and South Sumatra. One provincial officer for North Sumatra was selected, and interviews for potential candidates for DKI Jakarta, West Java, Central Java, are on-going.

Strengthening ASA Working Relationship with Partner Institutions

A first meeting was held with all ASA Capacity Building Partner Institutions (Atma Jaya, Business Dynamic, Remdec, RTI, and Population Council) on 1 December in Jakarta to begin discussion on a basic concept and design for future capacity building activities for KPADs and Implementing Agencies.

A second meeting with the same partner institutions was held on 14-15 January 2002 to develop the capacity building program vision, strategy, framework, and determine priority activities for the year of 2002.

Pre Jump Start Workshops

One workshop in each of the provinces of South Sumatra and West Java was held in December 2001. Each of the workshops was attended by KPAD core members including various sectors and local NGOs. Topics discussed in the workshop included problem identification and prioritization, and development of concept papers and proposal for NGOs.

RP 5 : Increase Leveraging of Non-Program Programmatic Interventions and Financial Resources

Private Sector Participation

Several private sector companies were invited to participate in a gathering in Batam in mid November 2001 to discuss opportunities to include the private sector in HIV/AIDS prevention. Positive responses were received. Most of the audience felt strongly that HIV/AIDS information dissemination is important to increase awareness of the problem.

A meeting with UNOCAL was held in November 2001 in Batam, during which UNOCAL requested the ASA Program to collaborate in the development of a local program in Batam. UNOCAL had allocated \$ 10,000 for the program.

A meeting was also held with Newmont in early December. Newmont has several on-going community development programs and is very interested in developing a HIV/AIDS prevention program.

Module Development

A comprehensive generic module for worksite programs on HIV/AIDS prevention is being developed by Yayasan Kusuma Buana (YKB) in collaboration with the Thailand Business Coalition on AIDS (TBCA) and ASA. This module is intended for NGOs, university departments and other parties to provide basic guidelines for advocacy and for preparation and implementation of worksite program.

SUPPORTING ACTIVITIES

ASA/FHI Management and Staffing

Management

New personnel continued to be added during this period, and a new organizational structure reflecting the priority of better program management was finalized. Personnel policies, office procedures and program management procedures have been drafted, discussed and are close to being finalized. Program offices in the five priority provinces are functioning well, and the recruitment of program officers for the five remaining provinces is well under way.

Staffing

On 28 December 2001, Ciptasari Prabawanti, the ASA FSW and BCC Specialist resigned her position in order to continue her studies in the Netherlands.

New staffing this quarter include:

- Flora Tanujaya, as the Chief of the Technical Support Unit in Jakarta.
- Yen Yerus Rusalam, as the Chief of the Program Management and Capacity Building Unit.
- Luciana Barliantari, as Chief Contracts and Grants Officer.

- L.H. Kekek Apriana DH, as Counseling Assistant.
- Zaenal Abidin, as Program Manager, ASA Papua.
