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The STI/HIV/AIDS Prevention Support Program is a USAID-funded program managed by Family Health International in collaboration with the Directorate General of Communicable Disease Control and Environmental Health (PPM & PL), Ministry of Health and Social Welfare, the Republic of Indonesia

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1. INTRODUCTION

This quarter saw good progress being made in many areas. Capacity building on various aspects of the program has continued in nearly all ten provinces. The BPS is set to conduct the BSS, and several activities have focused on strengthening their capacity to do so and on coordinating with the other agencies involved. Advertisements for the proposed TV awareness and prevention campaign have been field tested with positive results, production set to begin soon. Ethical issues related to HIV/AIDS were highlighted this quarter, with a national workshop and preparations being finalized for ethical surveillance workshops in the provinces in the coming months. New territory was covered with a large-scale workshop on HIV/AIDS prevention in the military, which looks likely to lead to a review of the current approach to treatment and other HIV-related issues in the armed forces. Coordination between the program offices, KPADs and NGOs in each of the target provinces continues to strengthen, as constructive commitments are being made and proposals developed.

2. PROGRAM IMPLEMENTATION AND ACHIEVEMENT

During this quarter, activities have been implemented that support each of the five key result packages (RP) as outlined below.

RP 1 : Increase Risk Reduction and Behavior and Practices

During this quarter, the ASA Technical Unit and Program Management Unit began to develop a more integrated and coordinated system for reviewing proposals, and for strategizing and delivering technical assistance. As a result, proposal-writing workshops have been held for NGOs and KPADs (Regional Commissions on AIDS Prevention) in East Java and Riau, and several collaborative proposals are expected shortly from each province (those from Surabaya are described below; those from Riau are pending further NGO meetings and assistance from ASA provincial staff). Similar workshops will be held in other provinces as the need arises.

ASA staff conducted a basic outreach skills training workshop in Riau in January for over 60 participants from NGOs who were taught in parallel sessions during the ten-day event.

The BCC training of trainers activity is proceeding according to schedule. The new trainers conducted Echo Training workshops in Jakarta (40 participants in parallel sessions) and Papua (as above) during the quarter.

Studio Driya Media has completed a review of existing IEC materials from HAPP, the AusAID HIV/AIDS and STD project and other sources, and has submitted a final report to ASA. ASA will reproduce materials in the next quarter based on SDM's recommendations and suggested revisions.

Yapepa is currently negotiating with a consultant to assist them in revising their curriculum and modules for adolescent reproductive health education for youth both in and out of school.

FSW Peer-led Interventions

In Surabaya, several NGOs, including Yayasan Abdi Asih and NGOs newly involved with ASA, are developing a joint proposal to conduct more comprehensive interventions in and around the Dolly (Jarak) brothel complex. The program will include improving links with the ASA-supported clinic (Putat Jaya) and working with street-based sex workers as well as those working in the Dolly complex. Community mobilization to involve pimps and bar owners in 100% condom prevention more actively will be key.

In Jakarta, Yayasan Kusuma Buana has been granted an RRF to develop a strong local advocacy strategy that will enable them to work with the entire range of sex establishments in Mangga Besar, Jakarta and possibly facilitate the development of a local 100% condom use program. They will focus on working with the formal and informal power bases in the area so that the intervention they will develop (to be funded through a sub-agreement) will have a better chance of success and sustainability, and can be used as a model by NGOs working in other places.

Outreach and peer programs in Papua continue, but are still quite basic. The ASA team will be focusing in the next quarter on providing intensive technical assistance in outreach and BCC. Yayasan Harapan Ibu (a new NGO formed by Universitas Cendana staff) has received an RRF to conduct outreach activities for street-based sex workers as they formally develop their organization.

Behavior Change Intervention: Role Model Story (RMS)

Atma Jaya, ADRA, Bandungwangi, and YKB have finalized their collaborative approach and will be working together on the RMS. The activity will begin formally in May and is expected to run for 10 months.

Prevention Marketing

Leo Burnett-Kreasindo completed the animatics versions of the proposed TV advertisements, focusing on clarifying three key misconceptions: AIDS is not an Indonesian issue; antibiotics can prevent HIV and other STIs; and you can tell who is infected with HIV by their appearance. The Animatics were field tested with over 360 clients of sex workers in Mangga Besar by AC Nielsen, and then with 300 “ordinary people” recruited from the streets near Blok M Plaza, Terminal Blok M and Atrium Senen. The second group was surveyed at the request of the Ministry of Health (MoH) to demonstrate that people not clearly identified as members of “high risk groups” would find the ads acceptable. Clients of FSWs responded positively to the ad concept, the messages were clearly understood, and these men felt the messages were important for them and their peers. More than 90% said they felt the ad concept was compelling and

that they would consider using condoms. The “ordinary people” were not offended by the ad, and also felt the messages were important for the public.

While the Ministry of Health supports the campaign, the production of the ads for TV and radio has been delayed because of political sensitivity related to actively promoting condoms to the general public, and the possible backlash from conservative religious leaders. ASA is waiting for a firm commitment from the Ministry indicating that production can begin.

Public Relations and Policy Advocacy

There was a Special Cabinet Meeting on HIV/AIDS in March. ASA provided the National Report and other materials and assisted in preparing the Minister of Health’s presentation and printed materials for presentation.

During the proposal-writing workshop in Surabaya, several advocacy issues were identified as critical to program success. Esthi Susanti, of Yayasan Hotline Surya and currently a member of the provincial KPAD, will be leading an advocacy group of NGO and KPAD personnel to develop strategies for the province. They will be reviewing an existing draft Regional Regulation on prostitution and 100% condom use from Nusa Tenggara Timur (provided by the Indonesia HIV/AIDS and STD Prevention and Care Project, AusAID) for possible modification for selected sites in East Java. A representative from Nahdlatul Ulama who is also on the provincial KPAD will be working on developing strategies for gaining support from religious leaders for a range of HIV/AIDS/STI interventions, including 100% condom use programs.

Healthy Ports and Highways Intervention (HPH)

Bitung:

The HPH initiative is starting in Bitung, with Yayasan Lembaga Hidup Sehat working with fishing company PT Perikani (PTP) and their fishermen. Clinical referrals for STIs are being provided at a post with space supplied by PTP, but to date, few fishermen have been using them. The NGOs working with other groups (LHS, LKNNU, ZPG and Yayasan Nei Kamang) are working under RRFs to conduct assessments and develop plans for the program.

Surabaya:

During the proposal development workshop in March, a group of NGOs (including Widyadarma, Yayasan Midia and Yayasan Papa) decided to prepare a joint proposal for a collaborative program in Tanjung Perak. They will coordinate closely with the local KPAD, and assistance has been promised to create linkages with local health care facilities for STI diagnosis and treatment. A draft RRF for planning and strategizing has been submitted to ASA Surabaya, and the activity should begin early in the next quarter.

Medan:

The KPAD has expressed interest in developing a proposal for a HPH program. The study on truckers was completed and the findings reported to local stakeholders. The Program Unit will follow up on proposal development.

Central Java:

During the pre-jumpstart workshop in Semarang in January, participants from local NGOs and government expressed interest in the HPH concept, but no proposals have been submitted to date.

Strategies Targeting MSM

The MSM surveillance protocol has been approved by FHI, UCSF and MOH ethical review boards and the University of Indonesia team has developed interview guidelines for the qualitative part of the study. Yayasan Mitra Indonesia conducted an MSM sexuality workshop for organizations participating in the study.

Gaya Siak, Gaya Priangan, Gaya Nusantara, and Yayasan Bina Putera Indonesia have all received RRFs to do initial social and site mapping as they prepare to develop programs to be funded under sub-agreements.

ASA staff discussed the benefits of continuing to work with IAKMI, and concluded that their program did not fulfill expectations. They will not receive additional funding for their program. Their final report is pending.

IDU-Focused Strategy

After a change in government regulations, Badan Kordinasi Narkotika Nasional became Badan Narkotika Nasional, and it will now function more as a police and legal body than as a coordinating body. Field workers in Kampung Bali expressed concern that the increasingly “repressive” approach could endanger their wellbeing. Field workers have now been provided with ID cards by the participating Puskesmas so that they can explain their presence in the field in the event of further raids.

In January, a training workshop for NGO management staff and indigenous outreach leaders was held in Jakarta and attended by 28 participants from the partner organizations and NGOs. Center for Health Research, University of Indonesia, Atma Jaya and Yayasan Pelita Ilmu are establishing field stations. Another workshop was held for 28 participants in Bogor in February.

Yayasan Mitra Masyarakat in Manado has developed a proposal for a university-based outreach initiative, as most identified IDU to date are from the local university.

An initial assessment of possible NGO participants was made in Bandung and will be followed up. Three NGOs in Surabaya are preparing a collaborative proposal for an RRF for training in situational assessment.

PLWA Involvement with HIV/AIDS Prevention

ASA is developing a proposal with photographer Rio Helmi for a traveling exhibit of portraits of PLWA. He will initially be working with Yayasan Spiritia in Jakarta and Yayasan Bali+ in Denpasar, and then through the National PLWA Network that Spiritia coordinates. Information about the project has already been circulated nationally through Spiritia's PLWA newsletter and has received an enthusiastic response. The project is expected to begin in April.

Client Interventions

The workshop on HIV/AIDS prevention in the military, conducted in collaboration with the Ministry of Defense and AusAID, took place during three days in January. Two hundred participants from all the armed services and police attended the seminar and discussions, and 60 were involved in the three-day follow-up planning activity. The military has agreed that condoms will be reintroduced as a standard part of the health kit for all armed forces. Regulations governing treatment and reporting of STIs are also being reconsidered for review in keeping with current best practice. The final report from the workshop and plans for follow-up had not been released at the time this report was prepared.

A number of the proposals being developed following the Surabaya and Riau proposal-writing workshops will be for programs for clients; some will be port-oriented, and some workplace-oriented.

RP 2 : Strengthen HIV/STI Services

Improved STI Diagnosis and Treatment

During this quarter, ASA technical staff made monitoring visits to ASA-supported clinics: Putat Jaya Clinic, Surabaya; PKBI Clinic, Tanjung Elmo, Sentani; and YKB Clinic, Jayapura. Additional assessment visits were made by ASA partner Dr. Elizabeth Donegan, and ASA consultants Dr. Atiek S. Anartati and Dr. Niniek to health clinics in Merauke, Jayapura, Pekanbaru, Batam, Tanjung Pinang Bintan, and Tanjung Balai Karimun. These assessment visits will assist in identifying new areas for ASA support of STI services.

Technical staff assisted in proposal development for sub-agreement and RRF activities related to STI services, including the training of health care workers for improved care.

ASA supported monthly counselor support meetings in Surabaya and Jakarta. ASA technical staff initiated the identification of trained counselors in Jakarta, Surabaya, and Papua. Rosters are being created that identify individuals, their workplaces, and the types of STI/HIV/AIDS counseling services provided.

ASA consultants Dr. Penny Miller and Dr. Atiek S. Anartati and Dr. Elizabeth Donegan have identified information and begun to organize practical guidelines for improved STI clinic management. An STI Clinic Management Manual that complements existing GOI documents for STI syndromic management is planned.

ASA support for STI services at IAKMI clinic, Jakarta; Bintang Clinic, YSA, Sorong; PKBI Tanjung Elmo Clinic, Sentani; and YKB Clinic, Jayapura ended this quarter, in accordance with the agreements. For those accepted for a continued relationship with ASA as an implementing agency, bridging activities were identified and initiated. The new sub-agreements will aim to increase male participation in clinic services and achieve an overall increase in patient utilization of services.

Preliminary results from the HIV test kit evaluation were presented by ASA partner Dr. Elizabeth Donegan and her colleagues on 11 April 2002.

Care and Support for PLWA

ASA-supported workshops on HIV/AIDS Case Management were facilitated by a team from the Widuri School of Social Work for 20 participants on 19–21 February at the Pita Giri Hotel, Slipi, Jakarta, and for 20 participants on 17–21 March at the Jasmin Hotel in Jayapura. Both training programs involved site visits in their respective communities, strengthening advocacy and referral skill building. The HIV/AIDS Case Management Training Modules were revised with each repeat training. Follow-up activities are scheduled for next quarter.

ASA staff attended the video conference/discussion on HIV Care and Support Issues sponsored by the World Bank and UNAIDS on 15 January 2002. ASA staff also attended Yayasan Spiritia's presentation of their 2-year work plan, which outlined a comprehensive plan for greater involvement of People Living With AIDS via the Indonesian network of PLWA. ASA continues to explore with Yayasan Spiritia as to how best to support their activities in ASA program areas.

RP 3 : Enhance Capacity and Quality of Government of Indonesia HIV/STI Surveillance Systems and their Use of Epidemiological Data in Key Decision Making

Preparation for Behavior Surveillance Survey (BSS) Activities

The Director General of Communicable Disease Control expressed support for the role of BPS-Statistics, Indonesia in conducting the BSS as one of the key components in second-generation surveillance in Indonesia.

BPS set up a core team to implement routine BSS activities, consisting of nine senior staff. BPS expects the BSS to make an important contribution to strengthening their capacity, especially for their new social resilience division.

Several meetings were held in Jakarta to familiarize the BPS team members and MoH staff with BSS activities:

- Briefing on the basic concept of BSS and five years of experience in conducting BSS data collection by the Population Council (PC).
- Collaboration meeting between BPS and MoH.
- Second briefing by PC for BPS team members.

The next step, which started at the end of March, was to socialize BSS activities to KPAD members in Jakarta, Riau, and North Sumatra: this was facilitated by one member each from the BPS core team, MoH senior staff, and ASA. Since the KPAD will be involved in the planning phase, monitoring the data collection process, using BSS data for their planning, and monitoring HIV/AIDS prevention activities, this step is crucial. The KPAD is also tasked with selecting one key district or city as the location where BSS activities will be implemented. The KPAD should also support HIV/AIDS control programs and HIV and STI surveillance in the chosen area.

Training of BPS trainers will be conducted by the Population Council in April. BPS will then conduct training for field interviewers in each of the three provinces.

BSS Data Analysis Training

Regional BSS data analysis training was conducted on March 19–20 in Bangkok, Thailand, for participants from Vietnam, Bangladesh, Cambodia, Thailand, and Indonesia (one from BPS and two from ASA). Participants were exposed to appropriate survey data analysis using STATA.

As a follow-up to the workshop, BPS and ASA will prepare a program for appropriate BSS data analysis and include a number of important variables that were not taken into account during previous BSS data collection.

Ethical Surveillance Workshop

Dr. Penny Miller and Gede Ngurah Surya Anaya prepared the curriculum and materials for four ethical surveillance workshops that will be conducted during April and May in Jakarta, Batam, Medan and Jayapura.

The workshop will cover the ethical principals of HIV testing for surveillance, diagnostic purposes and blood screening, and its consequences. The participants will be key figures from the Health Service, NGOs, and the KPAD. Following the workshop, they will have the important task of advocating ethical principals of HIV testing in their respective area/province.

HIV Surveillance Assessment

ASA is supporting the strengthening of the sero-surveillance system, which remains the responsibility of the MoH. To ensure that surveillance standards are maintained as

decentralization is implemented, Dr. Penny Miller has been assigned to assess HIV and Syphilis Surveillance activities. She will work together with MoH staff to analyze each step of the existing surveillance process, from sampling through data handling and reporting. Based on the results of the analyses, further activities will be planned to develop and strengthen the sero-surveillance system for HIV.

Population Estimation Workshop

An international workshop on population estimation will take place on 8–9 April in Denpasar, Bali. This is aimed at supporting a national estimation process next September.

MSM and IDU Study

Injecting drug users (IDU) and men who have sex with men (MSM) are future target groups for the expansion of behavioral surveillance activities in Indonesia. Currently, ASA, together with other partners, are preparing a study among IDU in three cities (Jakarta, Bandung, and Surabaya), and among MSM in three provinces (Jakarta, East Java, and Riau). In order to assess the feasibility and acceptability of population-based surveillance in these groups, a sero-survey will also be conducted in Jakarta. The Center for Health Research of the University of Indonesia will continue to prepare the field work for BSS among IDU and MSM. A delay in the mapping of MSM led to a delay in data collection by UI.

RP 4 : Strengthened Capacity of Local Organizations to Plan, Finance, Manage and Coordinate HIV/STI Responses

Program Management and Capacity Building

During this reporting period, program management and capacity building activities continued to concentrate on how ASA implements an integrated approach to STI and HIV/AIDS prevention and care in the ten targeted provinces; strengthening the capacity of ASA Provincial Liaison Offices to develop and maintain working relationships with KPADs and Implementing Agencies (IAs); and working with ASA Partner Institutions on the development of materials and tools for capacity building workshops for KPADs and IAs. In addition to capacity building activities, ASA also facilitated a three-day pre-jumpstart workshop in Central Java.

Workshops/Meetings Managed by ASA Jakarta

A three-day meeting on program management and coordination was held on 14–16 February 2002 in Jakarta and attended by staff from ASA Jakarta and the ASA Provincial offices. The discussion focused on the framework for the integrated approach to STI and HIV/AIDS prevention and care, and how to address local issues in the ten targeted provinces. East Java and Riau are planning workshops on the STI and HIV/AIDS integrated approach framework in their respective provinces, which will be attended by representatives from the KPAD and IAs.

A three-day pre-jumpstart workshop was held in Central Java in February, attended by 41 participants from the KPAD and local NGOs/CBOs. The participants from each institution produced three-month action plans for disseminating the process and results of the pre-jumpstart workshop to the decision makers of their respective institutions (local GOI/sectoral offices and NGOs/CBOs). There is also a plan to produce draft program proposals for KPADs and NGOs/CBOs.

A two-day workshop was held on 14–15 January 2002, with several ASA Partners (Atma Jaya, Business Dynamics, Remdec, RTI and the Population Council), to develop a framework for capacity building activities directed at KPADs and IAs, and to determine a work plan for the year 2002.

Workshops/Seminars/Conference managed by ASA Provincial Offices

ASA Provincial Representative/Liaison Offices maintained and improved their collaboration with KPADs and IAs in their respective regions.

DKI Jakarta

The Jakarta KPAD has committed to collaborating with the Greater Jakarta Area NGO Forum. This will include providing office space and developing a joint strategic plan for HIV/AIDS prevention and care.

Introductory meetings on BSS with the provincial KPADs and local MoH staff were facilitated by staff from ASA Jakarta.

East Java

Training/workshops on the integrated approach to HIV prevention and care were held in East Java for 50 participants from KPADs and NGOs from three districts/municipalities.

Introductory meetings on BSS with the provincial KPADs and local MoH staff were held in East Java, facilitated by staff from ASA Jakarta.

A coordination meeting was held with representatives from Banyuwangi district.

Papua

A four-day workshop on the HIV Prevention Program was attended by 32 church leaders and church-based NGOs. A four-day Case Management Training course was attended by 23 trainees from five districts/municipalities.

Two separate program coordination meetings were held with representatives from the districts of Merauke and Nabire. Seven IAs were facilitated to develop draft project proposals for RRF; five of them have already submitted proposals to ASA.

North Sulawesi

Pre-award assessments were conducted for six NGOs in North Sulawesi; two of them were assessed as being capable of working with ASA on a sub-agreement basis.

West Java

An informal meeting was held with the provincial KPAD and NGOs with potential to be IAs. The municipality of Bandung and the district of Bekasi were selected to be ASA Program priority regions.

Riau

The ASA Provincial Office held a coordination meeting with the KPADs of Karimun, Batam, and Kepulauan Riau to encourage each of them to establish a secretariat.

A three-day workshop on the integrated approach to HIV prevention and care was attended by 42 participants representing NGOs and three district-level KPADs.

Introductory meetings on BSS with the provincial KPADs and local MoH staff were held in Riau, facilitated by staff from ASA Jakarta.

Coordination meetings were held with the districts of Kepulauan Riau, Batam, and Karimun; ASA provided one computer for the KPAD secretariats of each district.

North Sumatra

Introductory meetings on BSS with the provincial KPADs and local MoH staff were held, facilitated by staff from ASA Jakarta.

RP 5 : Increase Leveraging of Non-Program Programmatic Interventions and Financial Resources

Private Sector

A draft of the training module for HIV/AIDS prevention in the workplace is finished and ready to be tested with PT Caltex Pacific Indonesia through Yayasan Utama in Riau. A TOT course will be held for Yayasan Utama from 22 April to 1 May 2002, facilitated by Yayasan Kusuma Buana. TBCA has also contributed extensively in the module development based on their experience in handling outreach programs in the private sector.

A proposal has been sent to PT Caltex to officially establish collaboration on developing a workplace HIV/AIDS prevention program in their organization. If the go-ahead is given, training for PT Caltex will be implemented through Yayasan Utama, with support from Yayasan Kusuma Buana and TBCA, in the fourth week of May.
