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I. INTRODUCTION

ICMA's Building Institutions for Good Governance (BIGG) Program operates under USAID Strategic Objective 10: Decentralized, Participatory Local Government. To this end, it is designed to help USAID meet its four intermediate results (IRs):

- IR 1: Appropriate Environment Established to Enable Effective Local Government
- IR 2: Local Government Capacity Strengthened to Deliver Effective Services
- IR 3: Participation Increased in Local Government Decision-Making
- IR 4: Associations of Local Governments and Officials Established as Advocates

During the second quarter 2003, substantial progress was made in both the Resource Cities and Association Development components of the BIGG/LGSPP program. For Resource Cities, despite numerous obstacles to travel between the US and Indonesia, a number of successful exchanges were held. The culminating Innovative Practices Symposium was held on 1-2 July. Although this event took place during the first two days of the 3^d Quarter, we have decided to include it in this current quarterly report. In the area of Association Development, there has been progress in the areas of advocacy, communication, and member services.

The following report presents the activities, results, and next steps in the BIGG/LGSPP program. Annex 1 presents the Results Framework under which the program operates and progress toward those results to date.

II. MAJOR ACCOMPLISHMENTS THIS QUARTER

A. Project Administration

A.1 Project Workplan

USAID/DLG approved the final project workplan for January–September 2003 for BIGG/LGSPP.

A.2 Management

USAID/DLG approved the budget realignment, which reflects new program personnel and new program priorities for BIGG/LGSPP.

Carol Bartl replaced Amanda Lonsdale as Program Manager for the resource cities program effective June 30, 2003.

An update on National Conference on Innovative Practices is presented below.

The National Innovative Practices Conference was held at the Jakarta Grand Hyatt on July 1-2, 2003. It was opened by Mr. Patrick Truhn, Charge d’Affaire, representing the US Embassy, Mr. Progo Nurjaman, Director General of Government Affairs, representing the Minister of Home Affairs, Mr. Djoharis Lubis, Deputy of the Office of Poverty Alleviation, representing the Coordinating Minister of Social Welfare and Dr. Machfud Sidik, Director General of the National and Local Fiscal Balance, from the Department of Finance.

Attendance exceeded expectations, with over 150 participants representing all U.S. and Indonesian partners (with the exception of Oregon State), Indonesian associations, donor organizations as well as representatives of non-partner cities interested in participating in Resource Cities, should BIGG/LGSP be extended. The conference stimulated interest in the partnerships and provided an opportunity for local government practitioners to network with one another and share experiences – in many cases for the first time. ICMA received high praise from participants for the interesting and substantive nature of the conference, the level of organization, and the overall mix of attendees.

Updates on partnerships are presented below.

Pasir, East Kalimantan – Coquille, Oregon

Activities: The fifth exchange took place this quarter on July 3-12, 2003 in Pasir, East Kalimantan.

The National Innovative Conference was held in Jakarta (July 1-2), Pasir was represented by Mr. Abdul Azis Maulana, Mr. Sanusi Oneih, and Mr. Stepi Hakim. The US partner was represented by Mr. Eric Greenquist from the Eugene District Bureau of Land Management (BLM replaced Coquille, OR, who was forced to resign from the partnership)

On July 7, Mr. Rick Colvin and Mr. Richard Hart, staff experts from the Eugene District Bureau of Land Management, joined Mr. Greenquist and the Pasir team in Pasir.

The partners visited the protected mangrove forests, villages, shrimp farms, and the logging port in the bay area and held discussions with Kabupaten staff representing different departments: fishery, forestry, planning, and agriculture.

On July 9-10, a two-day workshop was held by Bappeda. Several stakeholders of the bay area attended, including: the village heads, sub-district (*kecamatan*) heads, related departments (including fishery, forestry, agriculture, crop-estates, land use, planning), and a member of the DPRD.

Results: An attendance list was established and an agenda was created in order to give an example and facilitate Pasir for a workshop on revised land-use planning for the bays’ (Teluk Adang and Teluk Ampar) protected mangrove forests.

Mr. Colvin and Mr. Hart helped to lay out the framework of the workshop and made a drawing of the planning process to outline the results. Examples from what they have been doing in Eugene were given to illustrate what could and could not be made of the process. It was

recognized that this workshop was the first step needed (and held) prior to the next steps that would be made by Bappeda on the bay land-use planning. It was made clear during the workshop that before any planning process on the bay could be undertaken, key questions would have to be answered by all stakeholders:

- what is to be achieved by the bay plan;
- where is the geographical boundary of the area for planning;
- what should and should not be discussed in the plan (e.g. moving of villages is not possible);
- who will sit on the planning team.

The workshop was organized to address the following issues:

- Day One: framework development and sharing of Oregon experience, followed by brief presentations (and discussion) by each department on the latest condition of the area;
- Day Two: explanation about the planning process by the Oregon team, followed by an active exercise, brainstorming session, and writing assignment by all participants in order to come up with specific answers to the key questions. Results were recorded as recommendations for the next phase of the planning process that will be conducted by the planning team. The participants successfully identified several alternatives to the key questions.

Next steps: Preparation for the sixth exchange to Eugene, OR in August 2003 as well as the seventh exchange to Pasir in September 2003. LGSPP also needs to work with the U.S. partner on gaining official status for the Bureau of Land Management to take over the partnership with Pasir from Coquille. Land-use experts from the Bureau of Land Management (Eugene District) have already been identified and would be ready to make a trip to Pasir, however they are not in the position to do so until BLM's status is formalized.

Bekasi, West Java – Gresham, Oregon

Activities: The final exchange of the Bekasi–Gresham Partnership took place on June 23–27, 2003, in Bekasi, during which they also held their “Innovative Practices Seminar”.

Following the final exchange, the Gresham and Bekasi delegates attended the “National Innovative Practices Conference” held in Jakarta on 1-2 July. The National Conference was attended by all Indonesian and U.S. partners involved in the Resource Cities Program, associations, non-partner local governments as well as donor organizations.

The Gresham delegation included:

Results:

The Innovative Practices Seminar was attended by Bekasi local government officials as well as other nearby local governments that are experiencing similar transportation problems. Two working areas were highlighted at the seminar: transportation planning/modelling and an introduction to double-entry accounting.

Bekasi officials also took the staff of Bekasi and other local governments to the field where they demonstrated the changes that had been implemented since the start of their partnership with Gresham. The changes implemented included an interactive traffic light in front of city hall, and the traffic control room that the Mayor recently dedicated to the Transportation Department due to the department's success in resolving transportation issues on some of the major streets, as well as for the underpass that is under construction.

Bekasi and Gresham calculated that the time saved for commuters due to these implemented transportation activities equaled a savings of 100 million man-hours per year.

In addition to dedicating one floor of city hall to be used for a main traffic control room, he also added some transportation projects to the annual budget.

Bekasi received and used transportation software (ATCS) from Gresham. The local council of Bekasi supports the use of ATCS to reduce traffic jams in Bekasi.

Bekasi also concluded their training on a Double-Entry Accounting System for budget management. On the final exchange, Gresham delivered a short training on balance sheet reporting for the Finance and Treasury Department Staff. Bekasi is effectively using the double-entry accounting system under the Kepmendagri No.29 2002. Bekasi completed implementation of the new accounting system following the training they received from Gresham. In the future, Bekasi is also planning on providing training on finance and budget management to other local governments.

Next Steps:

Gresham and Bekasi have both indicated a strong desire to continue their partnership, should USAID decide to extend the LGSP program. LGSP will work with both partners to identify the topics of further cooperation.

Indonesian Local Government Associations – League of Oregon Cities

Bitung, North Sulawesi – Coos Bay, Oregon

Activities: The sixth exchange of the Bitung–Coos Bay Partnership took place on May 19-23, 2003 in Coos Bay. The Bitung delegation included:

- Cornelis Supit – Vice Mayor of Bitung
- Jantje Takasihaeng – Chairman of the City Council
- James Rompas – Head of Program.

Both the Bitung and Coos Bay delegation attended the “National Innovative Practices Conference” in Jakarta on 1-2 July. The National Conference was attended by all Indonesian and U.S. partners involved in the Resource Cities Program, associations, non-partner local governments as well as donor organizations. Bitung-Coos Bay presented their achievement in conflict resolution and use of the mediation process with the Port Authority.

After the National Conference, Bitung and Coos Bay had their seventh and final exchange in Bitung on July 6-11, 2003. The Coos Bay delegation included:

- Patricia Davis – Tribal Attorney, Confederated Tribes of the Coos, Lower Umpqua and Siuslaw Indians,
- Jon Richards – Director, Southwestern Oregon Community College Business Development Center,

Results:

The delegation studied Coos Bay’s political system as related to their role in managing conflict among organizations, taking into consideration that Bitung and Coos Bay have a similar problem in dealing with port development.

Bitung applied their newly learned mediation skills to the conflict between themselves and the Port Authority and succeeded in resolving the first phase of the port development. In the future, Bitung will apply what they have learned about conflict mediation to other city/regional levels of government, as well as with independent organizations and with the community to further city development plans.

The process of receiving a grant from the Coos Bay Rotary Club is still on course and they are working together to finalize the steps for approval and funding.

At the final exchange in Bitung, the delegates held the Innovative Practices Seminar. Bitung staff and other neighbouring local government officials participated. Coos Bay conducted a simulation of the mediation process using a current issue for Bitung: Relocating Street Vendors.

Bitung and Coos Bay also discussed the possibility of developing a future program (with or without the support of BIGG) in local workforce development to stimulate economic growth. The two partners are also looking into other sources of funding for further development projects.

Next Steps:

Coos Bay and Bitung have both indicated a strong desire to continue their partnership should USAID decide to extend the LGSP program.

Kutai, East Kalimantan – Washington County, Oregon

Activities: No exchange took place this quarter. Washington County sent a new agenda to be discussed with Kutai after a sudden postponement of the previously planned exchange on March 9-15, 2003. Meanwhile, emails have continued to be exchanged among the partners. Mustafa Yamin, the BIGG Indonesian consultant for workforce development programs made several trips to Kutai to set out the preparatory work, information, agenda etc. These were forwarded and discussed with Nancy Pfahl, the BIGG American consultant for workforce development. After the Innovative Conference, both consultants traveled to Kutai to further develop their action plans for the creation of a workforce development program.

The National Conference on Innovative Practices was held in Jakarta on July 1-2, 2003. Kutai Kartanegara was represented by Bachruddin Noor, Judith Dipodiputro, Teguh Budi Budiharso, and Totok Heru Subroto. The US partner was represented by Craig Posser of Tigard, as the co-partner of Washington County in this partnership with Kutai.

Results: The partners agreed that Totok will go to Washington County for an internship program on community participation/communication programs. The date is tentatively set for August 2003. The names and agenda have been drawn up and are awaiting final approval by Kutai and BIGG Indonesia. The case study was prepared for the National Conference on Innovative Practices.

Following the conference, Kemal Taruc accompanied Nancy Pfahl and Mustafa Yamin to Kutai Kartanegara and assisted Kutai in developing an agenda that focused on paramedic training and a public service management program. Washington County has also proposed a new person from Portland State University, Dr. Marcus Engel, to join the task force for the public service management training program currently under discussion.

Next steps: Preparation for Kutai to visit Oregon in August, 2003 and Washington County to visit East Kalimantan in September 2003.

Samarinda, East Kalimantan – Tigard, Oregon

Activities: The fifth exchange took place this quarter. Rusman Yakub, Vice Chairman of DPRD, made his second trip to Oregon for an internship at Beaverton Conflict Mediation Center, a service that Tigard City (the official partner of Samarinda) also uses for its community. Rusman was accompanied by Suyitno, a professor at Mulawarman University. The internship took place June 18–29, 2003, during which Rusman and Suyitno were fully integrated in the Center's daily activities and training program.

The National Innovative Practices Conference was held in Jakarta in July 1-2, 2003. Samarinda was represented by Syaharie Jaang, Vice Mayor; Sali, Mochdar Hassan, Ali Fitri Noor and Rusman Yakub. The US partner was represented by Craig Posser.

Results: Samarinda continues working on its own to implement the new budget that has been developed using the Performance Budget model.

Next steps: Rusman and Suyitno are planning to hold a workshop to share with their fellow council members and city officials what was learned during the internship in Oregon. Preparations for Samarinda's visit to Oregon in August 2003 and Tigard's visit to Samarinda in September 2003 will begin.

Bandung, West Java – Santa Clarita, California

Activities: Both Kabupaten Bandung and the City of Santa Clarita sent delegates to the National Innovative Practices Conference in Jakarta, July 1-2, 2003.

The fifth exchange took place on July 6-11, 2003 in Bandung. Delegates from Santa Clarita included:

- Jill Fosselman – Assistant to the City Manager
- Jeffrey Lambert – Director of Planning
- Vince Bertoni – Planning Manager.

Results: Bandung and Santa Clarita developed a roadmap containing the phases, work components and the timing for the development planning of the new town.

Next Steps: Preparations are being undertaken for Bandung's visit to Santa Clarita in September 2003 and Santa Clarita's visit to Bandung in October 2003.

Balikpapan, East Kalimantan – Houston Area Governments, Texas

Activities: Both Balikpapan and Houston sent delegates to the National Innovative Practices Conference in Jakarta, July 1-2, 2003. Balikpapan was represented by Imdaad Hami, the Mayor, Sarjono, Suryanto, Wahyudi Widodo, Balikpapan city officials and Samsulistyo, representative of Unocal. The US partner was represented by Ivan Langford, City Manager of Dickinson City / Coordinator for Houston Area Governments, and by Bill Raley and Mike Kukuk of the College of the Mainland.

The fifth exchange took place in Balikpapan on July 3-6, 2003, following the National Conference.

Results:

Meetings were held with the Balikpapan Education Board and Education Commission of the City Council to introduce and discuss the prospect of establishing a Balikpapan workforce

development program. During the exchange, the delegates also met with the Vice President of Human Resources Unocal-Indonesia, who endorsed Unocal's potential support for a workforce development program. Nancy Pfahl and Mustafa Yamin, the BIGG development workforce consultants also attended these meetings. The group was invited to visit the Polytechnic, the tourism school, and the vocational training centers. A dinner was hosted by the City which included representatives from local educational institutions for an informal discussion on workforce development.

The Houston partners will develop a workplan with the help of Nancy Pfahl to present to Balikpapan.

Next steps: Preparation for Balikpapan's exchange to Houston in August 2003, and Houston's exchange to Balikpapan in September 2003 are underway. The partners will work on getting the formal support from Unocal's corporate headquarters for the workforce development program. The partners will try to coordinate this with the Balikpapan Mayor's visit to Houston.

Yogyakarta – Savannah, Georgia

Activities: The partners undertook their fifth exchange on June 16-21, 2003 in Yogyakarta.

The delegates from Savannah were:

- Michael Brown – City Manager
- Robert Keber – Grants Coordinator
- Eileen Baker – Director of Culture Affairs.

Savannah and Yogyakarta also attended the National Innovative Practices Conference held in Jakarta July 1-2, 2003. Savannah was represented by John Hutton of Building Services. Yogyakarta was represented by Herry Zudianto, Mayor, Harundono, City Planning Department, Sugito, Educational Department, Emiliana Yulianti, Human Relations Officer, Felix Kaswanto, Tourism Department, and Titi Handayani, Director of the Jogja Heritage Society (JHS).

Results:

The focus of the Savannah team's work with Yogyakarta was mostly on tourism development. The topic was the improvement of tourist attractions by developing a program based on historical preservation. Together with a non-governmental organization from Yogyakarta, the Yogyakarta Heritage Society (JHS), they developed a program on how to implement and develop the heritage or historical area around Jeron Beteng, the Sultan's Palace.

As a result of discussions, JHS and Savannah decided to focus on development of preservation of the heritage area in Jeron Beteng and to link this work with local workforce development. JHS took the lead in holding a public meeting with local communities and universities. As a follow-up step, JHS will be involved in creating and formulating the necessary next steps for a community college program together with the Yogyakarta Education Department. Yogyakarta and JHS have already contacted the local vocational schools. Savannah delegates were also interviewed by the local radio station in Yogyakarta and talked about the historical preservation program in Savannah and how it could be implemented in Yogyakarta.

The Yogyakarta tourism department learned how to improve their publications and promotion activities, to make people more aware of and care about tourism, improving relations with stakeholders, public-private and community, and preparing to improve their tourist destinations/attractions

Next Steps:

Preparation for the sixth exchange on August or September 2003 is underway. For the next exchange, Savannah and Yogyakarta have identified that they would like to focus on the workforce development program in order to generate historical preservation based-tourism and revenue improvement.

East Kalimantan Province – State of Oregon

Global Higher Education Program/Community College Development

LGSPS hired two community college consultants: Mustafa Yamin, based in Jakarta and Nancy Pfahl, based in the US. These consultants are working with the Indonesian and US local governments and community colleges to create action plans for workforce development programs and to assist with proposals for funding by other USAID and private initiatives. A concept paper for cooperation between Balikpapan Politeknik, Unocal-Indonesia, the City of Balikpapan, and the College of the Mainland (Texas City, TX) was submitted for funding to the Global Development Alliance. Unfortunately it was rejected for reasons outside the parties' control. However the parties believe that the concept paper was strong and they will continue to market it to other sponsors. From July 4-11 2003, Nancy Pfahl and Mustafa Yamin traveled to Bitung, Yogyakarta, Balikpapan, and Kutai, to work with these partners to further develop their actions plans for the workforce development programs. There is keen interest and commitment on the part of all of the US and Indonesian partners in making these initiatives succeed. All partners also seem willing to use their own resources to see that the project goes forward. City officials from Bandung not previously involved in this program have also indicated their desire to be included and to add a workforce development program to their agenda as well.

B.2 Association Development

During this quarter, BIGG/LGSPS continued assistance to the associations in three key areas: advocacy, communications, and member services.

Communications

Korwil/Komwil Computer Communications Program: Earlier in the year, BIGG/LGSPS distributed computers and provided financial support to establish an Internet communications network between and among the 6 regional offices of the city association and their national office in Jakarta, and similarly for the 29 regional offices of the regency association. These networks were initially to assist with the inexpensive and timely dissemination of information to association members, but also were intended to ultimately stimulate broader member input on

matters of association policy and position statements, which is a critical element for any transparent and representative advocacy efforts.

This quarter's activities provided further support for the use and development of these networks. At the close of the quarter, it is clear that the development and use of the regional computer networks of APEKSI and APKASI are quite disparate, principally due to differences in management of the secretariats by the executive directors. The computer network has created major organization change for APKASI, while it remains to be seen whether or not APEKSI will take full advantage of the increased communications tools beyond improved dissemination of information.

As reported last quarter, APKASI staff have already begun to use the network to disseminate their newsletter and information on membership and dues. In response to members' requests for information, they also used the network to distribute newly-enacted regulations. Of the 29 APKASI korwils, only the Maluku Tenggara korwil network is not operational because of its remoteness and lack of any workable communications infrastructure. In June, ICMA Communications and Training Advisor conducted an information sharing session with the staffs of APKASI, APEKSI, and APPSI to identify and update the associations about the current status of the communication network projects. Because APKASI has progressed significantly further, the session was also used to share lessons learned from their experience to stimulate and motivate the other two associations.

APKASI: The Advisor continued individual technical assistance with intensive work with APKASI on their newly-drafted "Standard Operating Procedures" for their regional offices that hope to decentralize information flow and input to and from the regions. Key issues addressed during the assistance included reiterating to the APKASI staff that their regional offices are a branch of a national association – not independent associations networking to solve regional issues. It was also emphasized that if the association is not working to improve nation-wide communication among members and regions, its purpose and strength in advocacy is diminished. One significant "spill over" effect from the BIGG-sponsored APKASI regional network is that the placement of computers in the korwils stimulated the regional membership to want to be involved in and provide input to the central secretariat. This interest in turn stimulated the staff of APKASI to set forth a very specific SOP which clearly defines the duties and obligations of the regions which had heretofore never been addressed and is a "breakthrough" for a traditionally passive and unaccountable membership. Not only does the new SOP begin to formalize member involvement and responsibilities, but it has served as a vehicle for the "democratization" of the organization. Specifically, the SOP now allows for the korwil regional members to elect their korwil chairmen and other officials. Prior to this, the korwil chairmen were all appointed by the Ministry of Home Affairs during the founders' meeting. This organizational change will allow for improved representation of the needs and issues of regencies, beyond the personal politics of the original selection of association leaders. Further, any korwil chairman who is not able to participate in association meetings can now delegate his authority to the regions' vice chair, secretary, and so forth, which allows for continuity and broader membership involvement of a region beyond a single individual who may or may not choose to be active in the national organization.

In addition to the korwil network, APKASI members at-large can utilize a new feature at their website that provides for on-line discussion groups on issues such as the autonomy law and improving the capacity of the korwils (www.apkasi.or.id).

APEKSI: Following the lead of APKASI's successful network and their earlier field visit support to the regions, during April and May APEKSI staff (with program and financial assistance from BIGG) made site visits to the 6 kota designated as komwil seats. During the site visits, APKESI staff trouble shot hardware and network problems to ensure proper use and placement of the computer networks. It was identified after the field visits that an unresolved problem with the network was due to insufficient capabilities of the network server at APKEKSI's secretariate offices. In May, BIGG provided cost-sharing support for the purchase and installation of an appropriately powered server to ensure that there would no longer be technical delays in the operation of a network between and among the regions and the secretariat. Due to APEKSI's delay in getting their communication system in place, the Communication and Training Advisor was not able to get beyond some basic issues and details on how they can use the network. BIGG will continue to work with the staff and leadership to see that the association tries to maximize the benefits of such a communication tool.

APPSI: BIGG has not provided financial or technical support on the establishment of a network because APPSI members already have computers and internet connections. However staff were involed in the session on communications with the regions. Due to the high political and cultural stature of governors, and according to APPSI secretariat staff, they are not receptive to designating staff to serve as communication liaisons. Nevertheless, APPSI staff remain open to learning more about how their association might use computers to broaden communications and information sharing.

Building the Capacity of the Indonesian Assocations, A Case Study: During the quarter, ICMA's Communication and Training Advisor initiated her work on a case study highlighting the struggles and successes of the three executive associations and their role in supporting local government in its struggle for decentralization in Indonesia. During her visit in June, she conducted interviews with the associations' staff, directors, members, and various other stakeholders. She began to gather data for compilation of a case study which will provide a 2+ year retrospective on the associations and which can provide a capacity "baseline" from which to measure future organizational development and growth. The case study is expected to be completed, published, and ready for distribution by October.

Advocacy and the Policy Development Process:

Association Policy Development Process: From June 2-13, consultant Suzette Denslow provided training and direct technical assistance to the three associations for the purpose of explaining and describing the policy development process in associations, and to move them forward to identify ways that their organizations could have increased member participation in the process. She conducted a 1-day working session entitled "The Policy Process in Associations: How the membership and staff work together to develop and represent policy positions" which was also open to participation by the staffs of the two legislative associations.

Following this training, APEKSI and APKASI staff observed, as she modeled one such policy process with a working group comprised of executives from the seven kota/kabupaten, that are the “star” local governments in performance based budgeting (that have also worked with BIGG over the past two years.) With the consultant’s assistance, these local government working group members developed three draft policy statements on finance, which could immediately be used by the associations to gain consensus and ownership from their membership at-large and potentially be used to advocate change by the central government. Immediately following the process, APEKSI and APKASI secretariat staff and executive directors joined the table and talked with the local government executives about the role the associations need to play to facilitate such substantive discussions for application to policy development and formulation of policy statements.

With the modeled process as a guide, the consultant continued with a second 1-day workshop where the staffs of the 5 local government associations addressed and developed a list of processes and specific actions that their organizations could use in trying to develop association policy committees or working groups. They also practiced drafting policy statements and resolutions; identified key topic areas for policy committees; and discussed other ways to get broader member representation in the policy development process.

It is through the establishment of policy committees that the association would greatly improve the quality and content of their policy statements, and gain the trust and ownership of all the members in advocacy. BIGG/LGSSP’s next steps are to provide association staff with facilitation training and stimulate further institutionalization of member involvement in the policy development process, via committees and by helping to establish a formalized policy process that suits each organization.

Local Government Association Toolkit Workshop: BIGG/LGSP continued to work in conjunction with NDI, CLGI, and IULA-ASPAC to begin preparation and planning for the rollout of the Bahasa Indonesia version of the Local Government Association Toolkit and the related conference targeted at the five local government associations. On May 6, a meeting of the six associations was conducted to brainstorm and identify the topics of the conference based on the capacity building needs of the associations. BIGG/LGSP continues to be an equal partner in the organization and financial sponsorship of the event planned for October. The principal donors met in June to cull through the topics proposed by the associations, and to narrow the scope of topics addressed. Tentative agreement was reached on making the event center around advocacy and coalition building among the associations.

Member Services

Membership Annual Conferences: In June, ICMA Communications and Training Advisor continued her work with the association staff in identifying improvements to the content and management of the associations’ annual membership conferences. In this regard, APKASI has worked to make their conferences more dynamic by adding break-out sessions and organizing the room set up to provide for member input and discussion (not auditorium style). APEKSI has introduced conference registration fees and is conducting phone interviews with members to get

input on future content and “hot” topics. APPSI has used input from their past three member meetings to devise a plan for lobbying activities and to assign members to lobby on specific issues.

Association Best Practice Documentation: In conjunction with continued technical assistance to the associations in helping them document and disseminate members’ best practices, BIGG/LGSSP printed and disseminated a manual specifically produced for the Indonesian association members by ICMA-India entitled “Documenting Best Practices and Facilitating Its Transfer.” It presents the core concepts of best practices programs, their transfer by association members, and the role of the association in the process. The 20-page brochure translated into Bahasa Indonesian was given to APEKSI, APKASI, and APPSI and is intended as one tool to help them “socialize” best practice concepts in Indonesia. In mid-May, the Association Advisor gave a presentation at a technical meeting of more than 100 members of APEKSI (sekda, bappeda, and department directors) to orient them on the role of the association in documenting and disseminating member best practices and to clarify some common misconceptions in the current Indonesian local government context. The audience also received copies of the aforementioned manual.

During the quarter, BIGG/LGSSP continued with technical assistance to support best practice documentation and dissemination among the three associations. By the end of the quarter, APKASI had completed documentation of practices in Deli Serdang, Banjarnegara, Gianyar, Sumba Timur, and Pasir; and APPSI had completed documentation on Jawa Bara and East Kalimantan. After multiple set backs in field visits, APEKSI staff completed initial documentation of Blitar, Palu, Medan, Denpasar, and Bekasi .

Presently, BIGG/LGSSP is working with the association staff on editing, English translations, and layout in preparation for publication of a brochure for each association containing their first year effort in documentation. With continued oversight and assistance from the Association Advisor and ICMA’s Communications and Training Advisor, APEKSI and APKASI will launch their respective best practice brochures at their annual membership meetings in late August and also disseminate the orientation manual to the full membership at that time. Once the best practices have been launched at the annual meetings, they will be available on the association websites and given to the Center for Local Government Innovations’ best practice clearinghouse.

B.3 Information Dissemination/Innovative Practices

In the final workplan for January–September 2003, LGSPP proposed hiring a production firm to develop a video to highlight the results of the Resource Cities Program and to draw out the public diplomacy benefits generated by this type of program. The specific proposal for the video has been submitted to USAID. LGSPP is awaiting approval.

B.4 Local Government Training

No activities this quarter.

B.5 Joint Activities with Task Order

Cooperative Agreement - Task Order Coordination: The level of coordination during the quarter has increased significantly. The TO extension agreement and its workplan include the provision of association interns to work with the TO on training and performance budgeting. As well, issues related to the socialization of performance budgeting among local governments requires a high level of interaction with the CA and the local government associations. The CA works closely with the TO to insure that proper relationships with each of the associations can be built and that each ICMA program contributes to the future sustainability of the associations.

B.6 East Kalimantan Regional Initiative

Activities: No exchange took place during this quarter. A big hurdle is the absence of official commitment from Oregon State regarding the next exchange. The second impediment is that Governor Suwarna's term ends this quarter and he is in the process of preparing his accountability report as well as preparing for his run for a second term in May's gubernatorial race.

Henry Sharpe, ICMA consultant, has been keeping in touch with Sumanto via email, although no significant outcome has resulted from this.

The National Innovative Conference was held in Jakarta on July 1-2, 2003. The East Kalimantan Province was represented by Sumanto, Syahrial Setia, and Rama Asia, the Bupati of West Kutai and Wahyudinanta. The US partner was not represented.

Results: The Province continues working on its own initiative to maintain contact and communication with the respective Indonesian local governments related to the Mahakam river basin. The province allocated funds in the new budget for the river basin master plan.

Next Steps: The province has provided a list of proposed candidates for the next exchange. They are awaiting acceptance from Oregon State.

B.7 Coordination with Other Local Government Programs

Civil Society Support Project (CSSP): ICMA and CSSP, funded through the USAID Democracy and Governance objective, have met and begun planning for joint activities with the local government associations. CSSP has access to a highly talented group of facilitators from the Philippines and Indonesia who would be able to work with the associations on the development of their own facilitation skills. Weak facilitation skills among association staff have been an impediment to their development, and staff members have requested this training. The specifics of this activity are still being worked out, but it appears likely that it would be jointly funded by BIGG and CSSP.

The Asia Foundation: ICMA and The Asia Foundation have continued coordination activities during the quarter, attending several joint meetings and holding discussions on association involvement with the IRDA process.

Center for Local Government Innovation: Several local government association coordination meetings were held with CLGI during the quarter. The purpose of these meetings was to discuss ways in which the donor community can most effectively assist the local government associations.

Further meetings were held with CLGI on an informal basis to discuss ways in which the associations can play a constructive role in the formation and future activities of the newly formed CLGI yayasan. A second focus of our collaboration with CLGI has been to ensure that future CLGI publications on decentralization are relevant to the needs of the associations and to discuss ways in which the associations can assist in disseminating CLGI materials.

ICMA has participated in several CLGI-sponsored meetings of their Best Practices Coordination Group during the quarter. ICMA has agreed to play a major role in the development of Indonesian local government best practices and to share these with CLGI for broader dissemination through its website. To this end, ICMA has been invited to sit on the Standards Board for the development of quality materials to include on the website.

UNDP: During the quarter BIGG/ICMA briefed the UNDP and its volunteer contingent for the local government associations. Issues discussed included potential donor overlap, priority needs for assistance, and workplan development.

National Democratic Institute, IULA and CLGI: ICMA has had further discussions with NDI, IULA and CLGI regarding a joint seminar/workshop for the legislative and executive associations that will focus on developing the skills needed for coalition building.

C. Challenges/Issues of Concern Affecting Implementation and Actions Taken

As mentioned in our last quarterly report, BIGG/ICMA remains concerned with the leadership of APEKSI. During the quarter, however, BIGG/ICMA was able to continue its programming schedule with APEKSI, working through staff members as opposed to the Executive Director. We were also able to sign a memorandum of understanding with APEKSI, which outlines in broad terms the types of assistance BIGG/ICMA will provide into the future.

The process for obtaining visas for Indonesians (especially males between the ages of 16 and 45) to travel to the US is, as in the past, difficult and lengthy. BIGG/LGSP has had participants unable to go on exchanges and entire exchanges postponed due to visas not being issued on time (despite BIGG/LGSP's starting the application process up to 2.5 months in advance).

BIGG/LGSP has made efforts to inform USAID/DLG staff of the visas required and has alerted them to potential problems as early in the application process as possible. In some cases, USAID intervention has expedited the process; however, because much of the delay is due to background checks and waiting periods imposed by the US State Department in Washington, DC, there is often very little BIGG/LGSP or USAID can do to expedite the process.

LGSP will continue to look for alternative ways to carry out the exchanges to the maximum benefit of all partners.
