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
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

Where do USAID and DOD Coordinate



- Serve as focal point for USAID-DoD interactions
- Forge effective working relationships, including NGO-military interface
- Enable USAID/DoD planning, training, education, and exercise participation

Strategic Focus

- Inform 3DCongressional Engagement Strategy
- Inform DoD doctrine development
- Develop USAID-DoD Engagement Policies
- Serve as USAID lead for DoD 3000.05 and QDR

Operational Focus:

- Enable civ-mil relationships where they make sense
- Exchange LNOs with Joint Staff and COCOMs
- Coordinate DoD exercise and experimentation participation
- Initiate TSCP/MPP/Country Strategic Plan Synchronization

Tactical Focus:

- Develop construct for DoD-USAID interaction (training, support, planning)
- Mobile Training Teams (MTTs)
- Develop and deploy Tactical Conflict Assessment Framework and programming guide



USAID role in NSS



- **Main threat to US:**
 - Terrorism, Proliferation and Global criminal networks
- **These threats thrive in fragile states**
- **USAID HA and Developmental Assistance (DA) capabilities are directed toward many fragile states**
- **DA must be applied in a 3D manner (where it makes sense) and focused on diminishing underlying conditions of instability and setting conditions for long-term stability**
