

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### Food Security Situation\*

- The poor performance of the 2009 *masika* rains (which normally start in March) in the bimodal areas is increasing worries about food security in the northern, northeastern, and coastal areas where the 2008-2009 *vuli* season failed.
- Generally, markets are adequately supplied with food grain. However, all food crop prices remain above the five-year average in all monitored markets. The persistence of high food prices continues to erode the purchasing power of resource-weak households. A slight decrease in food prices is therefore not likely to translate into improved food access for market-dependent poor households in urban or rural areas.
