I. Executive Summary

Highlights of ALP/E's activities and achievements during this reporting period:

- Completed the Wheat Seed and Fertilizer Distribution Program in Kunar province, and launched the program in Nangarhar province. 5,557 packages were distributed during this period. On a daily basis, some 35 trucks deliver seeds and fertilizers to farmers throughout the region.
- Assisted fruit and vegetable traders from eastern Afghanistan in gaining access to the national hospitality market. Three Kabul-based hotels now receive regular weekly supplies of fresh fruits and vegetables from the region.
- Facilitated the election of 98 delegates representing more than 4,000 fruit producers to hold district-level assemblies in preparation for establishing provincial trade associations.
- Helped improve orange grading and packaging standards, increasing regional farmers' revenues from US\$500/ha to US\$2,700/ha.
- Teamed with the Nangarhar University to engage 200 students, professors, government representatives, businesspeople, and 12 international experts in a dialogue on the constraints and opportunities for agribusiness and rural economic development in eastern Afghanistan.
- Following the lifting of the ban on poultry, began setting up a Regional Association of Poultry Producers to support the post-avian-flu revival of the industry.
- Completed a 30-day trade skills course for 41 construction workers, and began the same program for 37 new trainees, including two people with disabilities, at the Construction Trades' Training Center (CTTC).
- Held two cobblestone road training courses for 19 site engineers and assistant engineers, and 16 skilled workers.
- Increased the total number of active cash-for-work projects to 44, providing 57,606 person-days of employment in four provinces over the period.
- Reached 78% of the Mashina Road Project's completion in Quarghai district.
- Completed stretches of both Shamshapor and Darunta By-pass Roads, bringing the total length of completed cobblestone roads to 13 km.
- Sponsored the participation of five women entrepreneurs from eastern Afghanistan to attend the Rural Handicraft Exhibit in New Delhi, India.
- Conducted consultations with two women's handicraft groups interested in forming a provincial trade association.

II. Sector Activities

A. Agribusiness

Wheat Seed and Fertilizer Distribution Program

During the reporting period, ALP/E finalized the wheat seed and fertilizer distribution in Kunar province and launched the program in Nangarhar. The Deputy Governor of Nangarhar, Provincial Director of Agriculture, district authorities and Shura members, together with ALP/E's representatives, attended the kick-off event in Batikot district. More than 2,000 farmers received seeds, fertilizers and a concise production manual on the first day. ALP/E completed the distribution process in Batikot in four days, directly assisting 5,040 rural households. The distribution continues in the Nangarhar districts of Khogyani, Sherzad and Nazyan of Nangarhar, as well as in Laghman's Alishing, Dowlat Shah and Alingar districts of Laghman. This distribution involves a major logistic undertaking, with some 35 trucks being loaded and dispatched every day.

ALP/E and the Ministry of Agriculture are currently conducting an exhaustive analysis of the remaining lots of wheat seed prior to supplying the districts located in the lower lands of Nangarhar. Upon completion of the distribution process, ALP/E will conduct a field assessment in order to quantify the effective area of planted wheat and identify the communities compliant with the no-poppy agreement.

Vegetable Marketing Program

The program in support of the vegetable subsector involves a series of activities aimed to build robust and sustainable value chains. Activities include: establishing linkages between input suppliers, farmers and traders; and ensuring that the vegetable production meets market requirements of crop selection, varieties, volumes, quality and timing. Within this context, ALP/E's Gender and Micro-Enterprise and Agribusiness Units continued establishing women-operated pilot greenhouses, increasing their number to four during the reporting period. The greenhouses are expected to produce 50,000 vegetable seedlings each in five-week cycles. These plug seedling operations specialize in producing "short-cycle/high-yielding gourmet vegetables" to supply progressive farmers and fruit and vegetable traders supported by ALP/E.

As the plug seedlings are a new approach and technology for Afghanistan, an aggressive promotional campaign is underway to persuade farmers in its benefits. During the first two cycles, ALP/E will support the plug seedling enterprises by facilitating demonstration field days for farmers, establishing demonstration plots, and carrying out other promotional activities. ALP/E anticipates that in the spring of 2007 the greenhouses will produce 3 million plants.


Supported by ALP/E, fruit and vegetable traders from the Eastern Region are progressively penetrating the Kabul-based hospitality market niche, supplying three hotels on a weekly basis. An ALP/E food safety technical expert held several meetings with potential buyers in an effort to explain the safety standards adopted by the traders participating in the Alternative Livelihoods Program. Additionally, during his assignment, the Food Safety Advisor trained and certified in Hazard Analysis and Critical Control Points (HACCP) five ALP/E staff members, two sanitation supervisors, two traders and ten women laborers of the Surkhrod Packing Facility. Due to the training received and the recent introduction of structural amendments to the standard operating procedures (SOPs), the Surkhrod Packing Facility has become the first packing enterprise in the region to meet HACCP standards.

Fruit Marketing Program

A team composed of 15 field technicians, a senior agronomist and a visiting technical expert continued making progress in mobilizing regional fruit producers and facilitating their market linkages. During the reporting period, the Fruit Marketing Program team, in collaboration with the Institutional Capacity Development Unit, facilitated the election of 98 delegates representing more than 4,000 fruit producers to participate at the district-level assemblies and, eventually, form provincial trade associations.



The Fruit Marketing Program also began facilitating market arrangements for citrus farmers. This endeavor has brought together ALP/E's field technicians, several fruit marketing groups and a small number of progressive traders. Farmers who would otherwise sell their orange harvest at Afs5,000/jerib (US\$500/ha) now sell graded and packaged fruit at Afs3/unit, which at the current productivity levels results in a net revenue of US\$2,700/ha, after deducting the cost of packaging and transport. These market arrangements, coupled with increases

in productivity and harmonization of quality standards, have the potential to bring about an average revenue of US\$7,000/ha.

Women-Owned Forestry Nursery Program

ALP/E's Monitoring and Evaluation Unit released the latest performance report on the Commercial Forestry Nursery Program. Launched in March 2006 with the support of the ALP/E's Agribusiness and Gender and Micro-Enterprise units, this women-owned program exceeded its target of 50,000 trees by 50 percent. ALP/E intends to use 50,000 trees in its infrastructure environmental mitigation project, whereas the remaining of 25,000 trees will be channeled to other potential buyers. It is expected that each nursery owner will obtain an average net profit of US\$1,060, which will be the first time in their lives for most women implementing the program to bring income into their household.

Agribusiness Capacity Building

As part of its continuing effort to build the agribusiness capacities in the region and pursuant to the Memorandum of Understanding with the Nangarhar University, ALP/E teamed up with the Agricultural Department to hold a symposium titled "Agribusiness and Rural Economic Development: Constraints and Opportunities." Held on November 12-13, this symposium was the first ever held at Nangarhar University symposium, and brought together 200 last-year students and professors, a number of regional and local government and private sector representatives, and 12 international experts currently working in Afghanistan.

The numerous seminars conducted by both local and international experts during the event contributed to an engaging policy dialogue between the faculty and students and private and public sector representatives. Future activities to strengthen the University's capacities will include its participation in TARAQI SABA - ALP/E's Youth Entrepreneurship Program - and the establishment of a regional forum for the private and public sectors and academia to design a strategy for agribusiness development and economic growth.

Poultry Development Program

In support of the poultry sector, identified as one of the most competitive subsectors in eastern Afghanistan, this reporting period ALP/E continued a comprehensive assessment of risks and opportunities for the commercial

livestock production during this reporting period. As a result of the assessment conducted by an ALP/E technical expert, the Department of Veterinary Services in Kabul lifted the avian-flu-related ban on importation, transportation and retailing of live chickens in November, making possible the industry's recovery and growth.

Following the announcement to lift the ban, ALP/E embarked on establishing a Regional Poultry Producers Association, as a first step toward the poultry subsector's expansion. Future activities in support of the industry will include: providing technical assistance in business planning for potential investors, facilitating linkages with financial institutions, and assisting women entrepreneurs in establishing semi-commercial poultry operations.

B. Infrastructure Development

Productive Infrastructure Projects (PIP)

Capacity Building

On November 6, 2006, 41 local construction workers completed a 30-day course in trade skills at the Construction Trades' Training Center (CTTC). Two days later, the CTTC resumed the program for 37 new trainees, including two people with disabilities.

Additionally, during the reporting period two cobblestone road classes were held at the CTTC, providing skills training to 19 site engineers and assistant engineers, and 16 skilled workers. The training program included a number of site visits to the ongoing ALP/E's cobblestone road projects in Surkhrod and Qarghai districts. At the graduation ceremony, ALP/E's visiting Bolivian technical expert - who received a title of CTTC's honorary member for helping establish the cobblestone training program at the CTCC - handed his teaching responsibilities over to the Center's own trainers. ALP/E is currently finalizing the Pashto version of the Cobblestone Road Training Manual, which will be available at the CTTC for training and reference purposes.

Improving Access to Markets

Mashina Gravel Road, 7.5 km: The improvements of Mashina Road in Quarghai District reached 78% of the project completion and included: five pipe culverts; three box culverts; 30 m of retaining wall; 7,000 m of the road surface scarification; and 5,500 m of compacted fill. Taking into consideration the Eid break, ALP/E rescheduled the initially planned completion date from November 15 to December 15, 2006.

Kama DBST Road, 14.6 km: ALP/E, several key owners of the land along Kama Road, and provincial Shura members negotiated the acquisition of land required to widen the narrow section of the road starting at km 6+100. The landowners demonstrated full cooperation by agreeing to provide additional land at no cost.

Abizai Bridge: The Rural Rehabilitation and Development Department (RRD) of Laghman agreed to take on the rehabilitation of the approach road to the bridge site.

Lal Pur Road, 12 km: ALP/E revisited the designs for Lal Pur Road from Torkham Highway to Checknawer village in order to readjust its initial construction cost estimates.

Sherzad to Hisarak Road, 15.1 km: During this reporting period, ALP/E completed the road design and the draft Technical Feasibility Report.

Barabad to Mangwal Road Section-1, 11.50 km: Having completed the surveys, ALP/E began working on a detailed design for the road and the Technical Feasibility Report.

Barabad to Mangwal Road Section-2, 9.58 km: ALP/E completed the alignment and cross sections surveys from km 11+500 to km 21+080.

Dudrak Road, 6.2 km: Design of longitudinal profile, cross-sections and structures commenced. ALP/E plans to carryout further checks to assess the field condition at structure sites and road reservations.

Cash-for-Work (CFW) Projects

The total number of active CFW projects reached 44 during this reporting period. ALP/E hired 5,013 people providing 57,606 person-days of employment in four provinces of the Eastern Region, with a substantial increase of those employed in Nangarhar. In early to mid November, ALP/E focused on the start up of an expanded cobblestone road program with a target of 100 km. Part of this effort, included putting in place the required QA and QC to ensure good quality work.

The total of 116 approved projects does not include the three suspended projects—two in Torghar, Nangarhar province (canceled for security reasons), and one in Qarghai, Laghman province (a community dispute prevented its implementation). Security issues and community disputes are also holding up three CFW projects elsewhere. Works on Dewagal Road in Chawkay district, Kunar province are interrupted pending an improvement of the security situation, whereas the implementation of two projects in Nemla village, Khogyani district, Nangarhar province is expected to resume shortly as a result of the negotiation between the provincial and local Shuras.

The second sections of both Shamshapor and Darunta By-pass Cobblestone Roads were completed this period, bringing the total length of completed cobblestone roads to 13 km. Following the approval by USAID of four more cobblestone roads, ALP/E held community meetings during the reporting period and began work on three of them, bringing the total length of cobblestone roads in progress in Nangarhar, Laghman and Nuristan provinces to 66 km. ALP/E also held preparation meetings with local Shuras in Kuz Kunar district, and work on the remaining approved road will begin within a week.

Following a series of meetings between USAID, IRD and ALP/E in the first week of November, a team of six road engineers from IRD began site inspections to provide quality assurance of the cobblestone roads implemented under ALP/E. Additionally, the Construction Trades Training Center (CTTC) is ready to begin a quality control

program for ALP/E's CFW projects, including the cobblestone roads, gravel roads, and the Jalalabad Wholesale Market. Testing will consist of road fill materials tests, road surface compaction tests, concrete strength tests, and inspections of installed facilities at the Jalalabad Wholesale Market.

The Governor of Laghman Province made a surprise visit to the ongoing construction sites of Dehziarat to Omarzai Cobblestone Road in Mehterlam and to the Qala Shagee flood protection works. Speaking with the infrastructure engineers who were inspecting the road filling work that day, the Governor expressed his satisfaction with ALP/E's PIP and CFW activities in the province.

The structure for the first half of the Jalalabad Wholesale Market was completed, while waterproofing of the concrete roof and painting of the 70 completed shops are in progress. ALP/E also concluded the concreting of the main parking area for heavy trucks. Penetration tests were made on the compacted sub-base for the road at the back of the market, and work continues on cobblestone laying. In addition, excavation for the septic tanks and demolition of the second half of the market began.

The Private Sector Development Unit (PSD) monitored the progress of the three factories approved to receive the Citizens Network for Foreign Affairs (CNFA's) grants. It is anticipated that the construction of the new facilities will be completed by the early December. In accordance with the agreement between the prospective grantees and CNFA, the former have to make their portion of the investment before the grant disbursements.

Assisting ALP/E's food safety technical expert, the PSD team participated in the risk assessment and visual inspection of ten bakeries, two pickle-producing companies, one tomato paste producer, five oil companies, two snack factories, five butchery shops, and two fish shops in the Eastern Region. Additionally, the technical expert and PSD team visited the following Kabul-based factories: Spinghar Oil Company, Naseeb Foods, Kabul Silo, and several bakeries to assess the possibilities for strategic partnerships and investment in eastern region.

During the reporting period, the PSD team also provided a two-day training session in sanitation and cleaning regulations for ten female workers of the Agricultural Products Marketing Center who are responsible for preparing vegetables and fruit for delivery to the Serena Hotel and other high end outlets in Kabul.

Business Development Center

The Business Development Center (BDC) facilitated the leadership election process of the Small and Medium Enterprise Association of Jalalabad City - the largest trade association organization in the Eastern Region, composed of 66 trade unions and groups and 3,500 individual members. Additionally, at the request of the Afghanistan Investment Support Agency (AISA), the BDC conducted a study on what problems small- and medium-size businesses in the region currently face. The BDC also mediated negotiations between the Afghanistan International Bank and a group of local factory owners concerning possible financing of their product advertising campaign.

During the reporting period, ALP/E conducted a strategic planning workshop for the BDC staff. As a practical exercise, the participants devised the objectives and strategies for their organization and are currently working on developing a comprehensive action plan for the BDC to reach sustainability by the year 2008.

D. Gender and Micro-enterprise Development

The Gender and Micro-Enterprise (GME) Unit facilitated the participation of a group of five women entrepreneurs from eastern Afghanistan at the Rural Handicraft Exhibit, in New Delhi, India. The exhibit will run from November 14 through November 27, 2006. Dr. Raheen, Afghanistan's Ambassador to India, attended the trade fair opening and inaugurated the Afghan booth. The products presented by the ALP/E-supported craft-makers received a great deal of attention among Indian news media. This event constitutes an important step toward the promotion of handicrafts from the Eastern Region in the international marketplace.

In close cooperation with ALP/E's technical expert in natural resource management, the GME team is currently developing a vegetable seedling production work plan. As part of this effort, three training sessions were conducted during the reporting period at the vegetable seedling sites, and two more three-day programs are scheduled for the upcoming weeks. Another training activity took place on November 4-9. Several ALP/E's staff members attended a six-day training-of-trainers course offered by the Afghan Inkishafi Tarbiawee Markaz, and now are ready to pass their time management and team building knowledge on to ALP/E's beneficiaries throughout the region. ALP/E and the Afghanistan Women's Business Association also conducted two days of training in entrepreneurship for 20 women in Nangarhar.

In close cooperation with ALP/E's technical expert in natural resource management, the GME team is currently developing a vegetable seedling

The Kawayan Business Development Services (KBDS) released the findings of the survey conducted with the assistance from ALP/E to gauge the situation of female entrepreneurs in Nangahar, Langhman and Kunar provinces. The KBDS surveyed 300 businesswomen across the three provinces. Despite certain limitations caused by security and language barriers, the study sheds light on the needs and constraints of women-owned businesses. Areas that require support: including basic business management, bookkeeping, marketing, and access to financing. The GME will incorporate these recommendations in its future activities.

E. Institutional Capacity Development

Support to Associations

During this reporting period, the Institutional Capacity Development (ICD) Unit selected members from the Jalalabad Wholesale Market, the Afghan Agricultural Development Association and the Input Suppliers Association to attend the ALP/E-sponsored computer and language classes. Meanwhile, the Livestock Development Association's members continued their computer and language training.

The Carpet Producers Association (CPA) is taking part in the ongoing international handicraft exhibition in India (see section D. Gender and Micro-enterprise Development above). In addition, the Association is cooperating with "Afghan Carpets Made by Women," the Afghan Women Business Fund-sponsored program, which aims to help Afghan carpet producers gain access to U.S. markets. To supplement the effort, ALP/E will facilitate the CPA's participation in a carpet exhibition, which will take place in New York City.

In conjunction with the Nangarhar Department of Women's Affairs, the ICD Unit conducted consultations with two women's handicraft groups interested in forming a provincial trade association. In the upcoming weeks, ALP/E will continue working with women craft-makers on setting up the new organization.

Support to the Ministry of Agriculture's Directorates

During this reporting period, the ICD team moved forward with organizing a study tour to Pakistan. The itinerary, visits and meetings, as well as the logistics for the tour were finalized; however, because of the difficulties that the provincial directors face in obtaining travel documents, the travel dates have yet to be established.

Support to Provincial Directorates of Women's Affairs

Employees of the Directorates of Women's Affairs of Nangarhar, Kunar and Laghman provinces began English Language classes on November 1, 2 and 5 respectively. The computer training will start as soon as solar electrical panels will be installed in the directorates' offices. Additionally, ALP/E interviewed candidates for the positions of liaisons with the Departments of Women's Affairs in Laghman, Nangarhar and Kunar provinces.
