


This report describes the programs of 8 private, non-profit U.S. organizations which provide the people of Angola with development assistance and material aid. An index of the specific programs appears in chart form at the end of the report. Of the 8 U.S. organizations included in the report, 7 were able to provide TAICH with financial data indicating program expenditures in 1979 totaling \$351,254. These figures should be viewed more as indicators than as exact sums; differences in fiscal year, methods of financial reporting and methods of estimating dollar values of commodities, equipment and material shipped make correlation and absolute accuracy impossible.

This is one of a series of periodically revised reports which describe by country the development assistance activities of the U.S. non-profit sector. Additional and new information on the programs of the organizations appearing in this report is gathered regularly and is available from TAICH. Readers are requested to advise TAICH of any changes or new programs of U.S. private, non-profit organizations in Angola. Besides country reports, TAICH publishes directories, bibliographies, a quarterly newsletter and a series of category reports in which descriptions of assistance programs are compiled by functions of development assistance. A publications list is available from TAICH.

The information given on each organization is based on the data supplied to TAICH by the organization. Publication of this information does not guarantee accuracy of content or endorsement by the American Council or TAICH of any organization.

THE AMERICAN COUNCIL OF VOLUNTARY AGENCIES FOR FOREIGN SERVICE, INC. was founded in 1943 for the purpose of providing a forum for cooperation, joint planning and the exchange of ideas and information in order to avoid duplication of effort and assure the maximum effectiveness of the relief, rehabilitation and development programs of American voluntary agencies. Through the mechanism of the Council, member agencies have established relationships not only among themselves but with non-member agencies and governmental, intergovernmental and international organizations. The Technical Assistance Information Clearing House (TAICH) has been operated by the Council since 1955 with support from the U.S. Government, currently a grant from the Agency for International Development. All agencies that are Council members are noted by a +.

THE TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE INFORMATION CLEARING HOUSE serves as a center of information on the socio-economic development programs abroad of U.S. non-profit organizations, including voluntary agencies, church missions and foundations. It makes available to organizations, government, researchers and others, source materials from its files for study and research. Through publications and the maintenance of an everyday inquiry service TAICH responds to the need for current information about development assistance with particular reference to the resources and concerns of the private, non-profit sector.

THE AGENCY FOR INTERNATIONAL DEVELOPMENT (A.I.D.), part of the United States International Development Cooperation Agency, maintains in its Bureau for Private and Development Cooperation a registry of U.S. private and voluntary organizations active in the fields of relief, rehabilitation and development overseas. Registered organizations are eligible to apply for A.I.D. resources, including grants and participation in the U.S. Government overseas freight reimbursement, Food for Peace and Government-owned excess property programs. MEDICINE & PUBLIC HEALTH: Provides support for three major leprosy centers at Catala, Kalukembe and Jamba. Emphasis is on out-patient care, but the centers are equipped to treat in-patients if necessary. The program includes regular treatment of patients, leprosy control, physical therapy, vocational and social rehabilitation, shoe-making (to provide the special footwear required by leprosy patients), surgery and training for doctors and nurses.

Supports the Lutheran World Federation, Department of World Services' (LWS) program, known as Zambia Christian Refugee Service (ZCRS), in the following activities:

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT: Operation of a rural refugee settlement at Meheba, Zambia, where at the end of 1978 there were 11,000 people, 92% Angolan. Aids thousands of Namibian refugees in Angola in two settlements located in the Niaba and Kasinga areas; this program is operating out of Lusaka, Zambia in close coordination with the South West African People's Organization (SWAPO), which is attempting to care for these people. Basic needs are being taken care of, and they are cultivating land to provide their own food. Schools, dispensaries and storage facilities have been established.

EQUIPMENT & MATERIAL AID: In 1979 LWS/ZCRS supplied clothing, blankets, food, cooking facilities and medicines to the Namibian refugees.

FUTURE PLANS: In 1980 hopes to meet the immediate needs of the Namibians in Southern Angola, and to promote agriculture, health and community development.

PERSONNEL: Several international (Australia, Finland, Netherlands, Norway).

Lutheran World Federation (LWF) acts here on behalf of the World Council of Churches (WCC) and in consultation with the Christian Council of Zambia, various United Nations agencies, the Red Cross and agencies of the Government of Zambia. In Angola LWF cooperates with the South West African People's Organization (SWAPO).
