

This report describes the programs of 65 private, non-profit U.S. organizations which provide the people of Indonesia with development assistance and material aid. An index of the specific programs appears in chart form at the end of the report. This is one of a series of periodically revised country reports which expand and update Part II of the TAICH 1971 directory, U.S. Non-Profit Organizations in Development Assistance Abroad.

Of the 65 U.S. organizations included in the report, 41 were able to provide TAICH with financial data indicating program expenditures in 1976 of \$15,703,318. These figures should be viewed more as indicators than as exact sums; differences in fiscal year, methods of financial reporting and methods of estimating dollar values of commodities, equipment and material shipped make correlation and absolute accuracy impossible.

Additional and new information on the programs of the organizations appearing in this report is gathered regularly and is available from TAICH. Readers are requested to advise TAICH of any changes or new programs of U.S. private, non-profit organizations in Indonesia. Besides country reports, TAICH publishes directories, bibliographies, a quarterly newsletter and a series of category reports in which descriptions of assistance programs are compiled by functions of development assistance. A publications list is available from TAICH.

The information given on each organization is based on the data supplied to TAICH by that organization. Publication of this information does not guarantee accuracy of content or endorsement by the American Council or TAICH of any organization.

THE AMERICAN COUNCIL OF VOLUNTARY AGENCIES FOR FOREIGN SERVICE, INC. was founded in 1943 for the purpose of providing a forum for cooperation, joint planning and the exchange of ideas and information in order to avoid duplication of effort and assure the maximum effectiveness of the relief, rehabilitation and development programs of American voluntary agencies. Through the mechanism of the Council, member agencies have established relationships not only among themselves but also with non-member agencies and governmental, intergovernmental and international organizations. Council member agencies appearing in this report are identified by a + sign. Since 1955, the Council has operated the Technical Assistance Information Clearing House under contract with the U.S. Agency for International Development.

THE TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE INFORMATION CLEARING HOUSE serves as a center of information on the socio-economic development programs abroad of U.S. non-profit organizations, including voluntary agencies, church missions and foundations. It makes available to organizations, government, researchers and others, source materials from its files for study and research. Through publications and the maintenance of an everyday inquiry service TAICH responds to the need for current information about development assistance with particular reference to the resources and concerns of the private, non-profit sector.

THE ADVISORY COMMITTEE ON VOLUNTARY FOREIGN AID was established in 1946 to serve as a focal point for relations between the U.S. Government and U.S. private and voluntary organizations active in the fields of relief, rehabilitation and development overseas. The Committee's advisory responsibilities are to provide information and advice to A.I.D. and other U.S. Government agencies relating to areas of foreign assistance in which the Government and private and voluntary organizations interact; to provide assistance to the community of private and voluntary organizations working abroad, relative to problems and issues in their relations with A.I.D. and other Federal agencies; to foster public interest in voluntary foreign aid and the activities of the private and voluntary organizations. Through the Foreign Assistance Act, the Committee has the operational function of registering qualified U.S. private, non-profit organizations that have overseas voluntary aid programs and seek to be registered. Such registered organizations (identified by \* in this report) are then eligible to apply for participation in the U.S. Government overseas freight reimbursement, Food for Peace and Government-owned excess property programs. The Advisory Committee is composed of private citizens who serve without compensation; the Secretariat is located in the Office of Private and Voluntary Cooperation, Bureau for Population and Humanitarian Assistance, Agency for International Development.

EDUCATION: Provided a visiting professor to the Agricultural University in Bogor and who also served as an advisor to the Supplemental Program for the Rural Social Sciences (SPRSS). The SPRSS maintains cooperative working arrangements with agricultural universities throughout the country and, with major financial support from the Ford Foundation, has developed a network of research and training activities involving graduate assistantships for young university staff; upgrading workshops at Institut Pertanian Bogor, University of Gadjah Mada and the University of Indonesia; and provided teaching materials to supplement classroom lectures. This program also supports Indonesians in graduate programs at universities in the United States and in Master's degree programs at universities in the Philippines and Australia. The Universities at Bogor and at Gadjah Mada have initiated Master's degree programs in agricultural economics and sociology and the ADC staff assists in these programs. During 1975 the Council, through its New York fellowship office, supported six graduate students in degree programs in the United States and through its Singapore fellowship office, supported two graduate students at Asian universities.

FOOD PRODUCTION & AGRICULTURE: The other Associate and the Specialist assisted in the work of the Agro-Economic Survey, with special attention during the year to the development of a Rural Dynamics Project. The Rural Dynamics Project is an extensive Java-wide research program aiming to secure information about economic and social change in the countryside. Work has gone ahead to refine the central questions of the study and collect data from 300 villages in the Cimanuk River Basin. From these, a selected sample of 20 villages will be studied more intensively by means of surveys conducted four times a year. Major attention is being paid to the distribution and use of resources, labor allocation, sources of income, the impact of technology and household economic behavior. It is hoped that the Project will provide useful information for policy considerations. Other Agro-Economic Survey studies related to the rice intensification program, the production and marketing of livestock, crop production and extension needs for farmers.

COOPERATIVES, CREDIT UNIONS & LOANS: Provides assistance for a timber cooperative in Asmat.

EDUCATION: Assists faculty training programs among various provincial universities. Provides study, research and travel grants, within Indonesia and abroad, to persons in the agriculture, forestry, education, library, legal and judicial fields. Provides support for the linguistics, anthropology and agriculture programs of Cenderawasih, the only university in Irian Jaya. The Surabaya university, Airlangga, receives assistance for its Faculty of Law and Center for Law and Development. Helps with expenses related to the services of American lecturers and consultants at various universities, including Mulawarman University as well as Hasanuddin University in South Sulawesi, where a new campus is being planned to enable the university to pursue its new role as a growth center for provincial universities in Eastern Indonesia--a program involving workshops, exchanges, joint research and closer cooperation for mutual regional development. In Aceh, assists Syiah Kuala University in the development of a Rural Technology Center where research and development of simple agricultural tools and cultivation practices will help to accelerate rural development in the area. A preliminary campus planning project for the university has also been funded. Supports the Jayapura Vocational Training Center and the fundamental education activities in Asmat of the Agats Museum-Library. In FY 1976 provided 36,199 volumes of U.S. books to more than 200 university, governmental and organizational libraries throughout Indonesia.

**POPULATION & FAMILY SERVICES:** Through grants to official implementing agencies of the government's national family planning effort, aids in the production of institutional material, radio and television programs and a journal for Moslem volunteers in rural areas. Also provides 2 U.S. consultants to the Indonesia Council of Churches for technical assistance in promoting production of locally-made informational and educational materials.

**PUBLIC & BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION:** Helps support the establishment of management institutes in provincial areas, such as Samarinda, East Kalimantan and gives operational support to the Andalas University Management Institute, Padang. Makes available a small-scale industry specialist with the Irian Jaya Joint Development Foundation which supports indigenous entrepreneurship.

**FUTURE PLANS:** Plans to integrate community health, food and nutrition projects with family planning efforts to create multi-purpose projects for the national family planning effort in outer provinces. Intends to expand programs of human resource development in the Aceh and Irian Jaya regions.

POPULATION & FAMILY SERVICES: In January 1977, gave a one-year grant of \$59,149 to Dharma Dhutta Foundation to enable them to coordinate all voluntary sterilization service programs in Bali, to assist with male and female voluntary sterilization procedures in government hospitals, to deliver male sterilization services in Bali by mobile clinic, to conduct patient education and to train physicians in the mini-lap female sterilization technique. Grants totalling \$36,930 were given to the Indonesian Society for Voluntary Sterilization (P.U.S.S.I.) for the period of May 1975 to May 1977. One of these grants (\$15,000) was given for the establishment and maintenance of the Society. The second was a program grant for the establishment of an IEC (information, education, communications) service as well as a laparoscopic maintenance and repair service. Assorted small grants were also given to various recipients for equipment and travel expenses (2 physicians were sent to Singapore for training in sterilization techniques).

CARE is concentrating its current programming on improving the nutritional status of lower income groups, improving socio-economic conditions by participating in activities which promote rural development, and in assisting the country in providing school facilities and improved housing. Projects being implemented are described below:

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT: Assisting BUTSI-IVS (Badan Urusan Tenaga Kerdja Surarela Indonesia), an agency of the Indonesian Ministry of Manpower. The intent of the project is to help strengthen the capability of BUTSI as an effective rural development organization. This is being accomplished by improving BUTSI volunteers' understanding of techniques of effective rural development. Provides guidance and assistance in organizing and developing a variety of projects including erosion control, water supply, rabbit, poultry and goat raising, rice and vegetable production, and the construction of sanitary facilities. Also provides material and equipment support for these projects.

CONSTRUCTION, HOUSING & PLANNING: Under an agreement between CARE and the Provincial Government of Bali's Ministry of Public Works (CIPTA KARYA) will construct up to 2,000 earthquake resistant houses for victims of the July, 1976 earthquake. Are participating in planning, implementation and supervision of project activities. The houses will be built by the recipient families on land where their homes were located.

**EDUCATION:** Supporting a school construction project in West Java in cooperation with the Provincial Government. Construction will take place in eleven districts, mainly in rural areas. During FY 1977 it is anticipated that up to 160 classrooms will be constructed. Participating communities provide materials and unskilled labor. In conjunction with this project there will be community development training sessions with local village leaders and groups. Written materials, visual aids, and community participation discussions will be used to assist villagers in the identification, design and implementation of further self-help projects.

**MEDICINE & PUBLIC HEALTH:** Will provide up to 500,000 vitamin A capsules to six counterparts: West Java Provincial Health Department; Bandung Health Department; Kabupaten Lebak Health Department; Kabupaten Pandeglang Health Department; P. T. Parkebunan XII; and P. T. Perkebunan XIII for distribution to infants, pre-school aged children and pregnant/lactating mothers. This distribution will be effected in West Java. An integrated nutrition project is being implemented which combines a nutrition education component with an extruder food production component. The CARE nutritionist has trained cadre and assistant cadre who have returned to villages to instruct villagers in improved nutrition practices. Television programs are given on a monthly basis. Subjects of these programs include vitamin A and eyes, school children's snacks, beans as inexpensive protein and use of left-overs. In September, 1976 a two week training course was conducted in Brady Crop Cooker operation, a low-cost extruder cooker. Consultants from Colorado State University trained two participants from IPB, three from PTP XII and two from CARE. Out of this workshop 11 food combinations were successfully processed. The selection of interested groups for acceptability trials is presently under discussion as are the conditions under which such production and distribution will take place.

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT: CRS/Indonesia channels donations received from agencies abroad to socio-economic development projects scattered throughout the whole Indonesian archipelago. Communities have been helped at the grassroots level to improve their living conditions. Assisted various communities in the construction of community water pumps that ensure a continuous supply of fresh water. In FY 1974 began a U.S. Government/Volag Co-financing Plan Pilot Project. For FY 1976 secured \$165,849 from USAID to co-finance 14 development projects having a total value of \$362,685. These include 8 agricultural projects which vary from chicken raising to modern land cultivation, 4 nutrition improvement projects, a credit union project and a scholarship project. The main goal of the Co-financing Plan is to assist in developing self-sufficient structures and organizations which promote human development.

EDUCATION: Made available a number of scholarships; obtained funds for the production of a series of educational radio programs.

EQUIPMENT & MATERIAL AID: Provided supplies and equipment for water projects, agricultural programs, and schools; animals for husbandry projects; construction material for a pier, and vehicles for health and community development programs. Milk powder donated by Australian Catholic Relief was distributed to East Timor refugees. Used cash grants from Oxfam and Catholic Fund for Overseas Development (CAFOD) for the purchase of injection guns, shelter materials, medicines and other materials as relief aid to war victims.

FOOD PRODUCTION & AGRICULTURE: Supported projects which encouraged people to dig channels or construct aqueducts to irrigate their rice fields. In Kalimantan and Flores, where people still practice shifting cultivation, training is being given in modern farming, fish breeding and stockbreeding. In the more settled areas, cooperatives and credit unions have been introduced.

MEDICINE & PUBLIC HEALTH: Medical supplies and miscellaneous equipment valued at \$254,629 were distributed to clinics and institutions. Distributed 12,213,482 pounds of U.S. Government-donated food valued at \$2,213,482 to 408,276 individuals throughout Java, Sumatra, West Kalimantan, Flores and West Timor. Operates Maternal & Child Health Program of nutrition education and supplementary feeding in provinces of Jakarta, Surabaya and Jayapura aimed at reducing under-nutrition among children in vulnerable age groups, pregnant women and nursing mothers. During FY 1976, 35,000 recipients were continuously fed through this program. Also conducts a weekly 15-minute radio nutrition program in the local language.
