




SUMMARY AND PARTICIPANT EVALUATION

Statistics in International Trade in Services Workshop  
Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia (September 4-6, 2006)





On September 4-6, the Facility, with the assistance of the Malaysian Statistical Agency in Kuala Lumpur, sponsored a workshop on statistics in international trade in services (SITS). The training proceeded a workshop sponsored by AusAid aimed at developing national work plans to improve the collection of services trade statistics. The training served as a foundation for the workshop providing an in-depth discussion of the collection and measurement of trade in services statistics.

Approximately 35 experts from ASEAN Member Countries and the Secretariat attended the sessions. Patricia Abaroa from the US Bureau of Economic Analysis and Michael Dipplesman of the International Monetary Fund (IMF) made the presentations. The first day covered the importance of services statistics, examined global trends in services trade with a focus on ASEAN Member Countries, and introduced the basic framework of services statistics and data collection systems. Main concepts for services statistics were introduced, including the IMF Balance of Payments Manual, the Manual on Statistics of International Trade in Services, and the GATS modes of supply. The presenters facilitated an animated discussion about remittances and compensation of employees. The first day ended with a presentation on the concepts and principles underlying transportation statistics and compilation issues.

Other sessions covered concepts and principles underlying statistics and compilation issues for travel, communication, construction, insurance, financial, and computer & information services, royalties & license fees, other business services, personal, cultural, and recreation services, and government services. The speakers also addressed the use of surveys to collect services data, including survey design issues, problems with the International Trade in Services Reporting System and issues regarding reconciliation of data between two trading partners. Participants asked questions about medical services and education, about data on number of travelers, and the ITA In-Flight Survey. With respect to the survey, they were interested in the length and frequency, and how the survey is conducted.

Participants were most engaged in discussions regarding possible changes to the IMF BOP manual and the design and use of surveys. Services trade is growing and the ability of statisticians to measure this growth needs to be developed. The BOP manual recognizes how trade has changed through the provision of services by creating new line items for transactions. Surveys are often the best way for trying to gather data on trade in services which means relying on the good faith of firms to supply the data. Participants were very interested in survey data collection, asking questions about the entire process from setting exemption levels to compliance to estimation. Securing responses to the questionnaires is difficult and labor intensive in the US, according to Abaroa. Thus, participants took away a realistic impression of the difficulty in using surveys and an appreciation of how these data necessarily have to be based on estimates.

At the workshop following the training ASEAN Member Countries agreed to develop a work plan over the next three years to improve international trade in services statistics. Viet Nam volunteered to chair this effort. The leader of the Viet Nam delegation asked the Facility for additional assistance, particularly on survey methods.

Participants ranked all presentations a 5 out of a possible 6. The most popular segments of the training were on travel and transportation statistics and survey techniques to collect data. Participants would like to have more discussion on foreign affiliate trade statistics, an area that was new for some. For follow up activities, participants would like more training on statistics measurement and more exchanges of experiences among countries. The Facility's Fifth Semiannual Work Plan includes projects to address several of these suggestions.
