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SNAPSHOT

- TATTs hosted an El-Niño Workshop in November 2015 bringing together BPBD representatives from each TATTs province and national specialists including climatology and social scientists.
- TATTs in Southeast Sulawesi implemented an accredited training program in partnership with the BNPB Training and Education Center (Pusdiklat).
- TATTs worked in partnership with other USAID/OFDA partners in Indonesia to implement joint trainings including an emergency tent warehouse assembly training in Papua in collaboration with the World Food Programme.
- TATTs field teams received Basic-Intermediate Incident Command System (ICS) training by the United States Forest Service.
- TATTs consortium partner ASB played a lead role in the National DRR Month celebration events in Solo, Central Java, resulting in inclusion and disability mainstreaming into key government declarations.

INTRODUCTION

This report covers achievements and challenges during Quarter 5 of the 'Institutionalizing Disaster Preparedness and Management Capacity of BPBDs in Indonesia through Technical Assistance and Training Teams' (TATTs) program for the period 01 October to 31 December 2015. During Qtr 5 (the first quarter of the second year of TATTs) teams in the target provinces focused on a range of disaster management capacity building activities in the lead up to the slower Christmas season. The TATTs teams continued implementing provincial work plans and gathered in Makassar, South Sulawesi, during November for a series of key activities: 1) A one-week Basic-Intermediate Incident Command System training implemented by USAID/OFDA whole-of-government partner the United States Forest Service; 2) Biannual TATTs Planning Meeting and Internal Program Progress Review; and 3) Workshop for TATTs BPBD partners on the causes, impacts and response capacity against the El Niño weather phenomena.

Technical training conducted by TATTs included:

1. **Strategic Planning Support** was provided in North Maluku. TATTs provided external consultants to assist the BPBD to develop its five-year strategic plan and work plan. These plans are designed to integrate with broader provincial strategic planning managed by the Planning Department (Bappeda) and are now under review;
2. **Logistic Management Training** was held in Papua. The training included planning and simulated activities in line with BNPB regulations;
3. **Disabled People's Organizations** in Central Java were trained in disaster risk management by TATTs consortium partner ASB. ASB bridges DPOs with disaster management stakeholders to enhance inclusion in local DRM activities and planning;
4. **Training of Facilitators** in Southeast Sulawesi involved BPBD trainers from West Papua previously trained by TATTs;
5. **Planning and budgeting training** for BPBD staff in West Papua;

6. **Training of Facilitators in Community Based Disaster Risk Management** was conducted in Southeast Sulawesi as part of their strategy to develop a robust pool of facilitators;
7. **Training on the Development of Local Disaster Management Regulations** was held for Central Java BPBD staff to assist the BPBD with its program to strengthen DRM regulations at the district and city level;
8. **Emergency Response Warehouse** assembly simulations were held in Papua in collaboration with the World Food Programme;
9. **Basic Disaster Risk Management** training was held in Southeast Sulawesi in collaboration with the BNPB Pusdiklat. This represented the an accredited training for TATTs beneficiaries and included a Round Table Discussion on provincial disaster management planning led by the Head of the Provincial Parliament.

CHALLENGES

Christmas: In Eastern Indonesia Christmas is celebrated by the significant Christian population and results in government office closures.

Local Government Elections: Held throughout Indonesia in December, these elections impacted government staff availability and disrupted BPBD leadership with some Heads of BPBD required to act as temporary district regents.

End of Year Activities: Local governments plan many activities at the end of the Indonesian financial year to expend outstanding budget. This also impacts on availability and possibilities to arrange additional trainings or activities.

Disaster events: During this quarter, unforeseen disaster events such as swarm earthquakes in North Maluku, forest fires in Papua with smoke hazards affecting many airports in Eastern Indonesia, wide spread drought due to El Niño in all of the targeted provinces, earthquakes in Nusalaut of Maluku, etc. resulted in BPBD staff busy responding to the impacts as well as TATTs staff monitoring the situation and supporting BPBDs. TATTs has creatively used these opportunities to provide technical assistance and coaching to the BPBD staff.

TATTs OVERVIEW: QUARTER 5

The current reporting period (01 Oct – 31 Dec 2015) marked a continued increase in formal and in-house training and capacity development activities based on joint work plans with local government partners. The table below reports on the status of activities from Qtr 5.

TATTS INTERNAL MID-TERM REVIEW

As part of the biannual TATTs planning meeting, the teams were facilitated through a review and reflection process. Using an external facilitator, teams discussed the specific contexts of each provincial BPBD, identified key stakeholders, mapped achievements and used this information to identify the knowledge already generated by the program in each province. Through this process, each of the teams identified change strategies required to help build capacity in the separate BPBDs. This included understanding and identifying motivations, identifying changes in behaviors (different ways of doing business) and how the TATTs teams could influence this through informal and formal activities. While TATTs is designed around a component of technical skills delivery, the teams identified that their programs focused on public sector reform - assisting the BPBD to operate more effectively within the local governance context; building the credibility of the BPBDs as an agency; assisting in promoting the importance of supporting DRM activities; and engaging the BPBD in better planning and budgeting to enable more beneficiaries to benefit from the technical training inputs.

As a result of the reflection process, field teams are reviewing their provincial work plans for 2016 together with the BPBDs and a TATTs Harmonization Workshop is planned with consortium partners for Qtr 6. TATTs also reviewed its monitoring system, reviewing data and introducing new coding for activities to better reflect the reality of field outcomes as well as to avoid any double counting. In this report, the TATTs M&E Specialist has revised data against the key performance indicators to provide a more complete and realistic picture of program performance (See Annex 1).

CONSORTIUM PARTNER ACTIVITIES

ARBEITER-SAMARITER-BUND (ASB)

ASB had major success in influencing and mainstreaming inclusion into key national DRR forum during Qtr 5. ASB utilized the opportunity provided by the National DRR Month held in Solo, Central Java, in October, to ensure active participation of Disabled People's Organizations (DPOs) in the lead up to the event as well as providing space for DPOs to actively advocate for inclusion to be included in key policy statements. The result was clear references to inclusion and disability within the *Deklarasi Surakarta* (Solo Declaration), a national policy statement launched by BNPB at the end of the DRR Month celebrations. According to BNPB Deputy for Prevention and Preparedness Wisnu Wijaya, the Solo Declaration will become one of the key statements guiding Indonesia's implementation of the Sendai Framework for DRR and the Sustainable Development Goals.

ASB held two capacity building workshops for DPOs in Semarang and Solo, Central Java, in the lead up to National DRR Month. These workshops involved close to 60 participants representing almost 30 DPOs and provided training on 1) Inclusive DRR and policy frameworks; 2) Introduction to DRR and disaster risk in Central Java; 3) Safety procedures for earthquakes, volcanoes, floods, whirlwinds and landslides; 4) Indoor safety; 5) Evacuation drills; and 6) The role of DPOs in DRR activities. Through these workshops the DPOs were able to provide input to BNPB on new Damage and Loss Assessment software, which had not previously accommodated the needs of people with a disability in disasters. The workshops also resulted in 30 DPO members being invited by BNPB to join volunteer events at the DRR Month. During DRR Month celebrations ASB in collaboration with Mercy Corps Indonesia, Plan International and Oxfam hosted a special session on the 'Implications of Social Inclusion in the Sendai Framework for DRR'. Overall more than 100 DPO participants actively participated in Solo, setting a new record for the highest number of people with a disability to attend a DRR event. As a follow-up activity, in December ASB assisted BNPB in organizing DRM volunteer training for people with disabilities. ASB reviewed the curriculum and training delivery. The 98 participants passed the training and are now recognized as national DRM volunteers.



CARDNO EMERGING MARKETS USA, LTD.

During Qtr 5, Cardno assisted with the deployment of 14 national (Indonesian) specialist consultants to support training in the six TATTs provinces and to assist with national level inputs. These inputs included specialist training of facilitators; strategic planning and legal drafting; El Niño workshop facilitator; EOC assessment tool design; and internal TATTs review.

LINGKAR ASSOCIATION & NATIONAL UNIVERSITY FORUM FOR DISASTER RISK REDUCTION (UF-DRR)

Lingkar Association was due to begin working with the BNPB Training and Education Center (Pusdiklat) in Qtr 5. Mercy Corps is now waiting on approval from USAID/OFDA to create a new sub-grant for Lingkar. TATTs Jakarta management team is reviewing and finalizing the UF-DRR proposal for a new sub-grant as a follow-up to the provincial university capacity assessment. A pre-award assessment will be conducted in early Qtr 6.

NATIONAL ACTIVITIES

El Niño Southern Oscillation Workshop

The El Niño weather pattern currently affecting Indonesia is considered to be the worst since 1997/98 with experts warning that dry weather may continue through April 2016. While El Niño is impacting most of Indonesia it is having considerable impact on the eastern provinces where TATTs is predominantly based. On 9-10 November 2015, TATTs brought together El Niño-La Niña experts and representatives from each of the TATTs BPBDs to discuss impacts, responses and planning, and to share experiences. The two-day event will be followed up by TATTs teams in the field who are continuing to monitor the situation and influence local planning to help mitigate some of the potential impacts.

It was clear from the workshop that El Niño was having impact in the provinces with ice-storms in the highlands of Papua, fires in Papua, West Papua and North Maluku, and drought in Maluku and Central Java. The BPBD shared their responses to the weather-related disasters, including coordinated delivery of water to affected villages in Central Java. The workshop explored issues of early warning challenges, risk assessment and potential future impacts including poor crop yields, increased health issues (particularly dengue fever and malaria) and disruptions to sea transport.



PROVINCIAL ACTIVITIES

Throughout Qtr 5 the embedded TATTs specialist teams within the provincial BPBD offices continued to organize and implement a range of capacity development activities, adopting both an coaching and mentoring role and facilitating the implementation of technical training.

In collaboration with other USAID/OFDA partners, TATTs team members were also offered capacity building opportunities. The entire team was trained in Basic-Intermediate Incident Command System by the US Forest Service, while 7 members of national and provincial TATTs teams joined World Food Programme logistics facilitation and training programs. In both cases, TATTs specialists will assist other USAID/OFDA partners to roll-out activities to the provincial level.

Mentoring & Support

The TATTs teams engage with the BPBD staff on a day-to-day basis providing advice on DRM issues, reviewing local policy and supporting the BPBD with planned district activities including providing assistance as technical resource persons. This provides opportunity to influence DRM practice and policy. During Qtr 5, these internal activities included follow up support for trained facilitators with coaching and mentoring of facilitators in simulated trainings at the district level.

Facilitators Put to the Test in Sulawesi

Disaster risk assessment is critical for disaster management and planning and represents a major preparedness task for local BPBDs. Under the Indonesian Disaster Management Law, BPBDs are required to undertake local disaster analysis as a basis for developing disaster management plans and for targeting disaster management activities. In Southeast Sulawesi, the TATTs team has been focusing on basic disaster risk analysis at the provincial level creating a local pool of facilitators with the competency to carry out training in the Southeast Sulawesi districts.

In October 2015, the TATTs team followed up on its provincial-level disaster risk assessment training by supporting the new facilitators to conduct their own practical training in the vulnerable Southeast Sulawesi island of Wakatobi. Three BPBD facilitators, representing the Preparedness and Rehabilitation and Reconstruction Units, were supported by the TATTs program to lead the technical risk assessment process.

According to TATTs Team Leader Tanty Thamrin, the three facilitators were happy with the outcome; they gained practical experience and were able to build their confidence in delivering technical training. The training enabled the Wakatobi BPBD to develop a risk assessment strategy, link this strategy to the district disaster management plan and combine with in-house training on producing a community-based risk map as well as a 1:10,000 scale technical map.

This activity is core to the TATTs capacity development approach, where technical training is combined with coaching and mentoring to improve skills, motivate the trainers and model training implementation to the provincial BPBDs.



Participatory Strategic Planning

The North Maluku BPBD has identified improved strategic planning as a key priority for ensuring disaster management is better supported at the provincial level and to improve overall implementation of disaster management activities. Between 07-13 October 2015, TATTs supported three planning events designed to facilitate more professional drafting of the North Maluku BPBD Five-Year Strategic Plan (Renstra 2015-2019). First a multi-stakeholder coordination workshop brought together more than 30 participants representing the police, military, government departments (Planning, Health, Public Works), science agencies, the search and rescue agency, local NGOs, the Red Cross, private sector and the media. This was followed by a 2-day internal BPBD Renstra drafting workshop and finished with a day of consultations to finalize the draft. TATTs provided two key specialists to support and facilitate the process.



According to TATTs Team Leader Ray Mathias, the North Maluku Planning Board (Bappeda) praised the BPBD for being one of the few provincial government agencies to produce its Five Year Plan through the involvement of multi-sectoral partners and public consultations. Changes to the strategic plan as a result of this participatory approach included:

- A shift from general socialization activities to more focused school-based disaster preparedness and the need for BPBD to coordinate with government and non-government stakeholders to develop material for these activities;
- Develop a partnership with local universities to implement the Resilient Villages Program. This partnership will include MoU with local universities to ensure that field research opportunities for university students link with the Resilient Villages Program;
- The development of Implementation and Technical Guidelines for the adaptation of national disaster management training curricula in order that it can be more easily understood in the local context;
- The need to develop competency mapping for BPBD staff and other potential DRM facilitators;
- The need to initiate the creation of a provincial DRR Forum;
- Undertake public education campaigns for disaster risk awareness and disaster preparedness.

Building upon this, in Qtr 5 TATTs began supporting the BPBD to facilitate the formation of a new provincial DRR Forum.

Mainstreaming Inclusion in National DRR Month Celebrations

Indonesia's 2015 National DRR Month was held in Solo, Central Java, in October 2015 with the theme 'Disaster Risk Reduction for Sustainable Development'. The event, organized by BNPB, adopted a DRR World Conference format with main events, special sessions and side events, and was attended by government, academia and DRR practitioners from all over Indonesia. A key outcome for National DRR Month was a national policy statement called the Solo Declaration. TATTs played a key role in supporting 2015 National DRR Month with provincial team assistance to the Central Java BPBD for disaster simulation events and specific inputs from consortium partner ASB to ensure that inclusion was mainstreamed through the event and to influence the drafting of the Solo Declaration.

Solo, the home town of Indonesian President Joko Widodo, is recognized nationally as an inclusive-city. This provided a strategic opportunity for ASB to raise the issue of disability and DRR at the national level. ASB joined a coalition of Disabled People's Organizations (DPOs) from Yogyakarta, Solo and other parts of Central Java to host a series disability-inclusive DRR events. ASB, on behalf of the TATTs consortium assisted BNPB to ensure that people with disabilities could actively participate by providing recommendations on the provision of physical accessibility, assistance and assistive devices. With relevant accessibility provided, DPOs actively raised their voices in formal meeting events as well as informal discussions with national and regional policy makers. A dedicated special session on inclusion as part of a collaboration between ASB, Plan International Indonesia, Oxfam and Mercy Corps Indonesia provided recommendations to the Solo Declaration. DPO representatives were complemented for their active contribution during the event.



As a result the Solo Declaration, launched during the closing ceremony, accommodated inclusion and provided specific references to people with disability taking an active role in DRR. BNPB called on local government, national government, international government and organizations to take the spirit of the Solo Declaration as a guide to implementing the Sendai Framework for DRR (SFDRR) and Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) in Indonesia. The Solo Declaration will be brought to the 6th Asian Ministerial Conference on DRR in Thailand in 2016.

Technical Training

Throughout Qtr 5, 10 key technical trainings were conducted across the six TATTs provinces. These trainings included psychosocial support, logistics management and logistics simulations in Papua; strategic planning technical workshop in North Maluku and basic disaster management in Southeast Sulawesi. During November, TATTs staff joined a one-week Incident Command System training supported by OFDA partner the US Forest Service, while TATTs also implemented a national level workshop on the causes and impacts of the El Niño Southern Oscillation weather pattern currently causing drought and other weather-related disaster events in TATTs provinces.

Disaster Preparedness Simulations

Simulation trainings are important for enabling local facilitators and BPBD staff to gain practical, hands-on experience. In Papua, TATTs supported a number of practical training simulations to build local BPBD capacity in emergency response skills. TATTs provided technical assistance for a two-day rapid response team exercise and supported a five-day logistics workshop and simulation exercise in partnership with the World Food Programme to help prepare for future large-scale logistics operations in the province. The focus of this simulation was on the practical assembly of large mobile storage units (MSUs) used as temporary emergency logistics warehouses.

The Papua TATTs team was involved in the design, planning, field support and evaluation of the rapid response team sea evacuation exercise in November involving 184 participants. The team worked with BPBD to ensure a robust scenario was developed and that a rapid assessment was conducted in line with national regulations.

The MSU warehouse simulation in December was jointly funded and implemented by the Papua BPBD, TATTs and WFP and provided an opportunity for provincial and district BPBD staff to learn about the mobile warehouses and how to assemble them for an emergency response. The workshop and simulation exercise included 34 staff from Papua BPBD and 16 staff from the districts. The provincial BPBD has now recorded these staff as local facilitators to assist with future training and is planning to involve other district BPBD in simulations in 2016.

The WFP-donated MSUs can be established as ready-to-deploy logistics hubs and are large enough to provide secure temporary storage solutions during emergency, recovery and rehabilitation activities. Working in teams, warehouse tents were assembled in two locations over two days. It took another two days to disassemble the tents.



Nationally Accredited Basic Disaster Management Training

The TATTs team in Southeast Sulawesi has been focusing on developing a strong pool of local DRM facilitators who can be utilized by the provincial BPBD for training at the district level. Throughout Qtr 5, the team implemented a range of internal Training of Facilitator (ToF) activities including contingency planning, search and rescue, post-disaster needs assessment, and information and data collection. Between 18 and 22 December 2015, TATTs Southeast Sulawesi partnered with the national BNPB Training and Education Center (Pusdiklat) to provide accredited basic disaster management training to the provincial BPBD and other important stakeholders.



At the same time, the TATTs teams used this opportunity to engage the local parliament (Southeast Sulawesi DPRD) in order to generate recommendations for a multi-stakeholder Disaster Management Plan for Southeast Sulawesi. The Basic DM training was kick-started with a Round Table Discussion led by the Head of the DPRD and supported by the Pusdiklat trainers. The Head of the DPRD presented on the upcoming Provincial Disaster Management Plan, while the Pusdiklat presented the first two training modules on Disaster Management Planning and the Disaster Management System in Indonesia. The TATTs team strategy was to leverage the Basic DM training to provide more institutional support for disaster management in the province including future improved budget and activity implementation.

Basic DM training participants included representatives from provincial and district BPBD, the provincial Social Department, military, Red Cross and civil society. All participants successfully received a BNPB certificate and will go on to further strengthen the pool of facilitators in Southeast Sulawesi.

Annex 1: TATTs Program Performance Indicators

The Program Performance Indicators matrix shows a continued increase in formal and informal training and these increases demonstrate the maturity of the program as provincial work plans are implemented. While new monitoring coding methods meant a marginal decrease in the overall number of direct beneficiaries reached, there were substantial increases in technical trainings held and number of training participants (up more than 30%) and an almost three-fold increase in the number of people taking part in simulations. Qtr 5 also saw the start of cross-visits between provinces and provincial facilitators assisted with trainings in other provinces, while TATTs encouraged and supported the formation of multi-stakeholder committees or DRR Forum at the provincial level.


Annex 3: Capacity Development Activities

Capacity Development Activities represent the day-to-day support provided by the TATTs teams in the province and include areas where TATTs teams have directly supported the BPBD through technical inputs, planning support, technical meetings, reviews of plans etc. and also include informal interactions that provide opportunities for the teams to influence better practice and different ways of considering disaster management activities at the provincial level. Sometimes these interactions are difficult to monitor. TATTs has a robust reporting system that enables teams to report on the outcomes of important meetings, focus group discussions and in-house trainings. However, often the TATTs teams are able to influence through more subtle means. The matrix below captures focus group discussions, in-field real-time technical assistance provided during emergency response operations, and in-house facilitator trainings conducted by TATTs teams using national curriculum and/or regulations.

Annex 4: Gender

While BPBDs in the TATTs target provinces are predominantly staffed by males, TATTs teams endeavor to encourage female participation in all trainings and activities. During Qtr 5 there was an average female participation rate of 21% up from a 13.3% average in the previous quarter.
