

SCHEDULE

A. Purpose of Grant

The purpose of this grant is to provide support for UNICEF/Kenya's program to control the malaria outbreak affecting twelve districts in Kenya. The grant will be applied to the procurement of second and third-line anti-malarial drugs for the most severely affected districts of Kisii, Nyamira, Narok, and Kuria, as described in greater detail in Attachment 2 to this grant entitled "Program Description".

B. Period of Grant

The effective date of this grant is the date of the covering letter. The expiration date of this grant is October 15, 1994.

C. Amount of Grant and Payment

1. AID hereby obligates the amount of \$25,000 for the purposes of this grant.
2. Payment shall be made to the Grantee in accordance with the procedures set forth in Attachment 3 - Optional Standard Provision No. 2, entitled "Periodic Advance".

D. Grant Budget

The following is the budget for this grant. The Grantee may not exceed the total obligated amount. The Grantee may adjust line item amounts within the grand total as may be reasonably necessary for the attainment of project objectives, consistent with restrictions in Attachment 3 -- Standard Provision 3 of this Grant entitled "Revision of Grant Budget".

The total grant of \$25,000 will support the immediate procurement of critically needed second and third-line anti-malarial drugs for the most severely affected districts of Kisii, Nyamira, Narok and Kuria. The final budget is outlined below:

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E. Reporting and Evaluation

1. Financial Reporting

Financial reporting by the Grantee will be in accordance with the Standard Provisions of the Grant entitled "Payment - Periodic Advance," as delineated in Attachment 3. All financial reports shall be submitted to:

Grantee agrees to consult with the USAID Controller concerning further details for submitting financial reports and estimates.

Grantee is required to submit a Financial Status Report (accompanied by Form 1034 "Public Voucher for Purchases and Services other than Personal") with copies of the receipts for all expenditures no later than 30 days after the close of the grant.

2. Program Evaluation Reporting

The Grantee shall immediately inform USAID of events which may occur during the project implementation. For example, problems, delays, or adverse conditions which may materially affect the ability to obtain program objectives and thereby prevent the meeting of time schedules and goals, or preclude the attainment of the project work. Notification may be by any means of written communication.

Grantee is required to submit five copies of a final Program Report to USAID's Project Office within 30 days of the estimated completion date of this grant. The report should document the number of beneficiaries reached and the impact of drugs provided and a statement of significant problems or events occurring during the grant period.

F. Special Provisions

1. This grant exercises the option to follow the Grantee's procurement policies and procedures.
2. As this grant is to an public international organization, only those Standard Provisions which pertain to grants to public international organizations shall apply. The Standard Provisions which shall apply to this grant are contained in Attachment 3, entitled "Standard Provisions for Grants to Public International Organizations".

G. Authorized Geographic Code

PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

This grant will provide assistance to approximately 60,000 victims of chloroquine resistant malaria in the four most severely affected districts of Kisii, Nyamira, Narok, and Kuria with second and third-line anti-malarial drugs.

Background

Following prolonged rains conducive to their reproduction, the mosquito population in Kenya increased significantly, spreading to areas not usually affected by malaria and where the populations possess low immunity. Chloroquine is ineffective in most areas because the parasite has developed resistance, but second line drugs are in very short supply. There is a total population of 6.5 million people in the twelve affected districts.

The situation is aggravated by the failure of those affected to seek early medical treatment. The major cause of death is severe anemia as a result of receiving medical attention too late. Due to limited financial resources, district health teams have been unable to mobilize in rural communities. In Kisii alone between 300 and 500 in-hospital deaths have been reported and about 1,000 patients are currently hospitalized for malaria. In Nyamira, 75% of the inpatients are being treated for malaria. These statistics are only indicators, as many deaths occur outside of hospitals. While all ages have been affected, children suffer more severe symptoms and are at greater risk due to less-developed levels of immunity.

Project Implementation

Medical supplies will be procured locally by UNICEF, transported by UNICEF trucks and delivered to the Medical Supplies Coordinating Unit for distribution to the districts.
