1. INTRODUCTION

This quarter saw an overall deterioration in the security situation, nationwide with reports of guerrilla attacks on main access roads and on villages and periurban centers from all over the country. The UN estimates that three million people have been internally displaced since January 1998. The province of Bie has an increasing number of recently displaced with urgent needs for food rations. New nutritional rehabilitation feeding centers have been opened in Kuito but there is no access to Camacupa as yet, where large numbers of people are reported to be in urgent need of assistance. Huambo, Huila and Uige has also seen an increase in the number of displaced but there continues to be limited access to the areas with displaced people in Huila. The number of cargo flights to Uige has been reduced because of the poor state of the airstrip. The airstrip in Kuito continues in a state of disrepair. In Malange, the shortage of fuel restricts humanitarian activities.

OCHA led a Rapid Assessment of Critical Needs during the month of July. The highlights of this assessment were;

- Contrary to expectations, access for humanitarian interventions has not expanded.
- Intensified conflict has created large scale population displacements.
- Practically none of the hospitals visited had adequate quantities of essential medicines or a sufficient number of staff in place.
- Education opportunities remain limited because of inadequate facilities, no teachers and no teaching materials.
- Overall, 70% to 90% of populations lack official documentation of identity.

2. Follow up on the development program interventions

This current quarter corresponds to the last period of active program implementation. The remaining period of the extension will be dedicated to negotiations with local community groups on concrete plans for the post project period.

2.1 Psychosocial Training

Twenty training seminars were held for four hundred and fifty five adults and seven training seminars were held for one hundred and sixteen adults. The total achievements for the project period corresponded to 83.6% of the planned training activities and 79% of the planned number of training participants. The shortfall is mostly accounted for by the fact that both Uige and Moxico offices suspended their training programmes in May of this year. The number of teachers trained is also less than that planned because it was only possible

to train teachers in the holidays. During the holidays, the project also had to compete for the teachers time with in-service training exercises run by the Ministry of Education. See Table 1 with the accumulated indicators.

2.2 Community Projects

The following community projects were completed during this quarter

- five childrens playgrounds, two in Benguela, two in Huila and one in Luanda.
- three primary schools, one in Benguela, one in Huila and one in Uige.
- three jangos, two in Benguela and one in Huila.
- three community football pitches, all in the province of Huila.
- seven basketball courts, all in the province of Huila.

The shortfall in the achievements over the lifetime of the project (77% of planned projects were completed) were for the following reasons

- a) some of the identified projects were much too complex to be implemented as small projects during the project lifetime. The proposed water project for the community of Mina and Cambanjela in Benguela was an example of one such project.
- b) negotiation with government counterparts for the land to build schools took much longer than anticipated, in many cases.
- c) In many cases, the communities required a much longer lead time of mobilisation and preparation in order to be able to organise themselves collectively to participate actively in the proposed projects. Many agencies continue to operate in emergency models of intervention. Many communities and the government counterparts were initially resistant to the idea that the community should participate in the intervention.

2.3 Professional Training

One hundred and seventy seven adolescents finished the professional training in the last quarter. A total of two hundred and thirty nine adolescents participated in training programmes over a period of one year. (See Table 2). Forty boys trained in carpentry, welding and mechanics and one hundred and ninety nine girls learned to sew. The number of girls was high because it includes girls in collaborating projects in displaced peoples camps. The number of boys was less than that planned because the activity only began in the second half of 2000. The intervention also required considerable mobilisation and preparation of the apprentice masters. Five of the forty boys trained continue to work in the workshops where they trained. All trainees received a toolkit when they completed the training.

2.4 Income Generation

Forty four adolescents were selected to participate in the microcredit programme in the provinces of Benguela and Huila. Some of the participants in the province of Huila had reached their fourth cycle by the month of August, 2001.

2.5 Adolescents working in community based activities

The adolescents continued to be involved at the level of the community with activities for

younger children. Following the construction phases of the projects, they were actively involved in supervision at the playgrounds and collaborated with the project team in learning games for smaller children.

2.6 Orphans and Displaced Children

The training of parents in displaced peoples camps and of NGOs and government staff working with displaced people continued. Overall, this intervention surpassed the planned result, see Table 5. The number of training sessions was somewhat greater than that planned because of strong demand from government institutions. The Ministry of Education in particular showed strong interest in integrating psychosocial themes into the training curriculum for teachers and requested a number of one day workshops for in-service training for teachers. Training of staff in orphanages and reception centers also exceeded the planned training because of demand for this training in the provinces.

2.7 Influencing Public Policy

In March 2000, CCF participated in the National Conference on Social Assistance and presented a paper on "The Role of Traditional Institutions in the Reintegration of Vulnerable Groups". The CCF team successfully lobbied for the inclusion of a recommendation that where possible traditional institutions, knowledge and practice should be used to understand and respond to psychological trauma caused by experiences lived in conflict situations.

CCF also lobbied for the consideration of underage soldiers as a specific vulnerable group with needs which were not catered for in the demobilisation program.

3.ACTIVITIES STATUS: REVIEW OF MARCH/2001- MAY/2001

3.1.Follow up of the Emergency Support for ADPP children and teachers.

Following the earlier work with the teachers and children in the ADPP school in Caxito, the mobile training team continued with a two day workshop for fourteen teachers. The objective of the workshop was to provide a structured space for the teachers to discuss their fears and concerns in relation to the children. The participants were also introduced to specific techniques and exercises to facilitate communication with children.

The teachers described the main problems for the children as:

- Insomnia, nightmares
- Persistent feelings of insecurity
- Hallucinations, particularly children who had been kidnapped.
- Poor concentration
- Aggression among the children and between children and teachers.
- Irritability

The teachers became more aware of the fact that these were normal reactions for the children and not due to any lack of care on the part of the teachers. Specific techniques were

suggested to deal with the problems described. The teachers were clearly quite traumatised also and had feelings of guilt and impotence because they had not been able to protect the children. They also feared transmitting their own sense of insecurity to the children. One teacher said,

"I want to speak of my sad life... all because I am angolan and was born in angola...it began when I was six years of age in 1975. The last train which left Luso (Luena) in the direction of Silva Porto (Kuito) was attacked during the journey. After the missiles, four cars were left but nobody survived...I lost my father in that attack. In 1997, in Kamacupa, where there was a parade of children who were joining the OPA (the organisation of angolan pioneers linked to the MPLA)... I still remember. UNITA attacked and many children died there. Sometime later there were renewed attacks and mortars fell on my house. When I was seven or eight, I saw people's bodies that looked like roast big and people being buried that looked like burned wood.

I am thirty years of age... until when? Young people fleeing... fleeing the army. I know what that is like. Now they attack orphanages. Kidnap small children... until when? For the time that I have lived in suffering, I ask you... is it my fault that I was born angolan? Grew up in the war? Grow up in the war, work with orphans, work for orphans... until when? A threatened future.... if a man of thirty has still not organised his life... his life is finished. How long will it take to change the attitudes of our leaders? Our leaders who are doctors and engineers...."

The CCF team followed up with further group meetings with the teachers to discuss specific problems arising with the children, how to respond to them. The meetings also provided group support for the teachers and a controlled space in which to express their own feelings and responses.

3.2. Workshop and Launching of Study "Let us Light a New Fire"

The study, "Let us Light a New Fire" was launched in collaboration with INAC, The National Institute for Children, on the 29th August. This study presented an analysis and discussion of the information and experience acquired by CCF during the demobilisation process of the underage soldiers and was the first of its kind in Angola. The participants at the launch included The Vice Minister for Social Affairs, the Minister for Health, the Minister for the Promotion of Women and Family Affairs and the Minister of Defence. The launching ceremony was accompanied by an exposition of childrens drawings and photographs of CCF work with children affected by conflict in Angola.

3.3. Preparation of a new project

The CCF team prepared a detailed situation analysis in four provinces during the month of July. DECOF sent a two person team, Lynn Cripe and Danuta Lockett, to help the CCF team work on the vision and outline of follow-up work in the current context of on-going conflict and deepening poverty. The joint CCF-DECOF team did one field visit to Kuito and worked

primarily on the analysis of the situation and the development of a project proposal which would build on the CCF Angola team strengths and correspond to the current community needs. The deadline established for the presentation of the new proposal to DECOF was 31st of September.

3.4. CCF's Angola National Director replacement

Dr. Márcia Jovanovic was replaced by Dr. Mary Daly as the new CCF Country Director. Dr. Daly and Dr. Jovanovic worked together through the month of August, to ensure a smooth, comprehensive handover.

3.5. Close down of IACYF operations in Uige and Moxico Provinces

The CCF operations in Moxico and Uige were closed during the months of June and July respectively. In both cases, one person in a parttime posting closed the offices and ensured that equipment belonging to CCF was returned to Luanda.




