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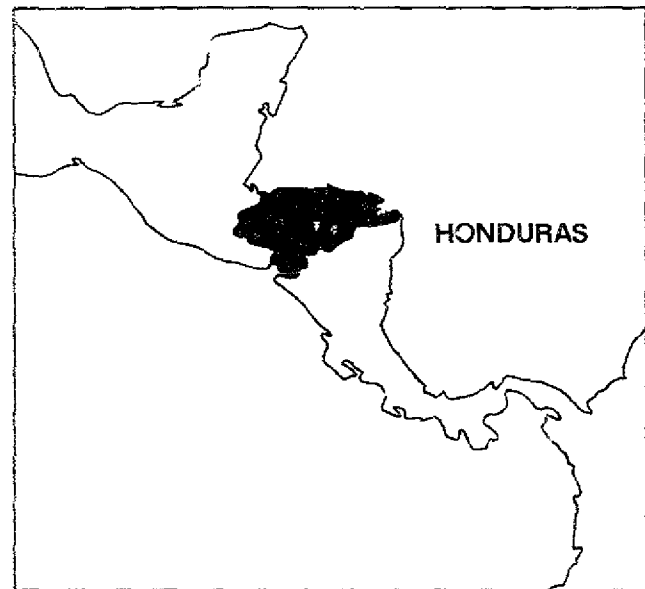
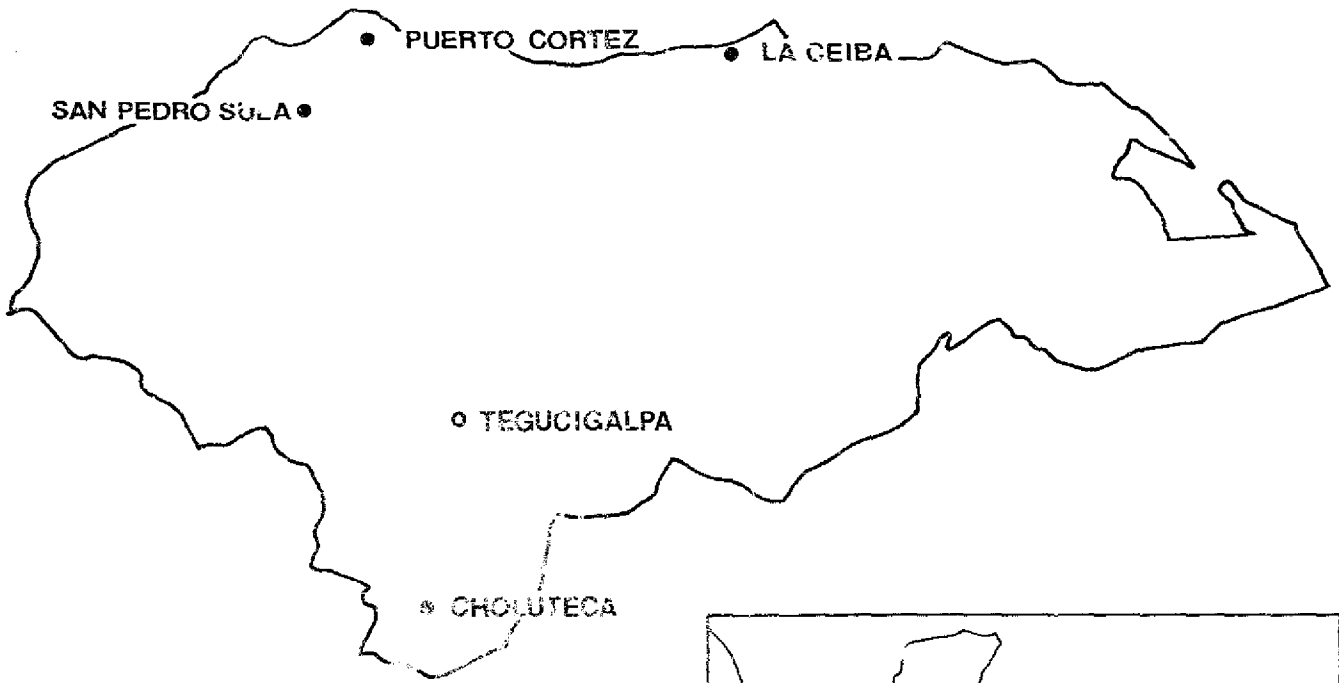

This report describes the programs of 59 private, non-profit U.S. organizations which provide the people of Honduras with development assistance and material aid. An index of the specific programs appears in chart form at the end of the report. Of the 59 U.S. organizations included in the report, 39 were able to provide TAICH with financial data indicating program expenditures in 1979 totaling \$7,879,895. These figures should be viewed more as indicators than as exact sums; differences in fiscal year, methods of financial reporting and methods of estimating dollar values of commodities, equipment and material shipped make correlation and absolute accuracy impossible.

This is one of a series of periodically revised reports which describe by country the development assistance activities of the U.S. non-profit sector. Additional and new information on the programs of the organizations appearing in this report is gathered regularly and is available from TAICH. Readers are requested to advise TAICH of any changes or new programs of U.S. private, non-profit organizations in Honduras. Besides country reports, TAICH publishes directories, bibliographies, a quarterly newsletter and a series of category reports in which descriptions of assistance programs are compiled by functions of development assistance. A publications list is available from TAICH.

The information given on each organization is based on the data supplied to TAICH by the organization. Publication of this information does not guarantee accuracy of content or endorsement by the American Council or TAICH of any organization.

Through publications and the maintenance of an everyday inquiry service TAICH responds to the need for current information about development assistance with particular reference to the resources and concerns of the private, non-profit sector.

THE AGENCY FOR INTERNATIONAL DEVELOPMENT (A.I.D.), part of the United States International Development Cooperation Agency, maintains in its Bureau for Private and Development Cooperation a registry of U.S. private and voluntary organizations active in the fields of relief, rehabilitation and development overseas. The program concentrates on improving the health, education and agricultural practices of the Moskito tribe living in the state of Gracias A Dios.

COMMUNICATIONS: Operates a radio broadcast station in Puerto Lempira which provides public health and agricultural information.

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COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT: In cooperation with state and local governments and the Baptist Mission provides supplies for the electrification of the village of Puerto Lempira. Operates a small agricultural loan program to provide funds to local farmers to clean, dry, store and market their produce. The following program is carried out by a team of U.S. families in the village of La Joya on the Guayape River about 85 miles from Tegucigalpa. The program is designed to serve several neighboring villages.

EDUCATION: Conducts English classes for youth and adults. Sponsors training in the U.S. for several of the best students and makes arrangements for special programs for them in U.S. schools. Subject areas include practical nursing, clerical work, welding and small motor repair, as well as regular academic studies. Operates a community center and vocational-technical school where classes are taught in cooking, sewing, food preservation, sanitation, basic carpentry, furniture building and leather crafts. About half of the staff is local, some of whom were trained in the U.S.

MEDICINE & PUBLIC HEALTH: Operates a small medical and dental clinic staffed by U.S. volunteers. Supplies medicines and equipment to the clinic.

POPULATION & FAMILY SERVICES: The International Program of the Association for Voluntary Sterilization (IPAVS) supported through subgrants five programs under the auspices of the Honduras Family Planning Association (HFPA); they were consolidated into one program in 1980. The programs are located at Tegucigalpa, San Pedro Sula and ten other cities. Activities include: voluntary male and female sterilization; training of physicians and nurses; conducting seminars, information and education campaigns; renovating special hospital facilities; supervising and evaluating the programs; and establishing a repair and maintenance service for all publicly donated endoscopes.

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CONSTRUCTION, HOUSING & PLANNING: In cooperation with FEHCOVIL (Federation of Honduran Housing Cooperatives) during fiscal year 1980 will construct 100 units of housing. Beneficiaries repay loans over a period of years; repayments become part of a revolving fund which started in 1975.

Constructs water systems in rural communities with populations of less than 3,000. During fiscal year 1980 approximately 45 gravity flow water systems will be constructed with preference given to the southern part of the country. In addition, water maintenance training will be provided. CARE and Servicio Autonomo Acueductos Alcantarillados (SANAA) implement this project. The community contributes all the skilled and unskilled labor, material transport, locally available materials and system maintenance.

In cooperation with the Department of School Construction of the Ministry of Education provides procurement, delivery, self-help and general management expertise for the construction of approximately 300 classrooms during fiscal year 1980.

MEDICINE & PUBLIC HEALTH: In cooperation with the Ministry of Education provides a daily snack, normally prepared as a drink at schools or at nearby homes, for approximately 220,000 school-aged children in 3,000 schools. In cooperation with the Ministry of Health approximately 57,000 mothers and pre-school children at almost 650 centers are fed from one to three meals a day at the center, or are given a take-home ration through health centers administered by the Ministry of Health. In addition, approximately 3,000 children under 14 years of age who consume all their meals at either orphanages or boarding schools will receive food supplements.

FUTURE PLANS: During 1980 - 1982 it is anticipated that the Department of School Construction of the Ministry of Education will assume greater responsibility for classroom construction.

Works with intermediary agencies to promote economic and social improvement, with emphasis on community self-determination.

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT: Provides technical advice and credit to groups involved in the agrarian reform program and supports the development of successful models in the "Asentamiento" (land reform) program. Identifies and supports groups and movements with potential for effecting structural changes in society. Supports the introduction of educational components to further agricultural knowledge and to facilitate communication links among rural groups with similar problems and goals.

COOPERATIVES, CREDIT UNIONS AND LOANS: Makes available low interest loans to women fruit and vegetable vendors in the municipal markets of Tegucigalpa and Comayagua to assist them organize a cooperative which they will administer and control. Supports a federation of consumer cooperatives in north-central Honduras. Constructed a warehouse to assist 13 agricultural cooperatives store and market their grains more effectively. Supports a bakery cooperative by the purchase of equipment, and a vehicle for transportation and distribution.

U.S. Claretians help support the programs of the Claretian Spanish Province, located in La Ceiba, Tela and Masica in the Atlantida area. Approximately 70 small villages, with 138,000 inhabitants, are assisted by an integrated community development effort from the three base stations.

EDUCATION: Many of the programs sponsored by the Claretians at community centers which they operate at the three bases are those promoted by governmental and private agencies, with an emphasis on adult education. Leaders have been chosen from the surrounding small villages to attend classes at the centers; they then return to their villages and are responsible for social development programs in their own areas.

FOOD PRODUCTION & AGRICULTURE: An agricultural training program designed by the government is sponsored by the centers. Agronomists from the Department of Agriculture give classes and encourage the improvement of crops and increased production.

MEDICINE & PUBLIC HEALTH: Program stresses preventive medicine, nutrition and child care. Housewives attend classes and are organized into small clubs to facilitate the transferal of information and the initiation of programs. Caritas provides nurses and teachers to give courses and sponsors a nutrition program.

IVS technicians are concerned with research on the best varieties of soybeans for the country, training Honduran nationals and passing the results of the research on to subsistence farmers.
