

This report describes the programs of 37 private, non-profit U.S. organizations which provide the people of Jamaica with development assistance and material aid. An index of the specific programs appears in chart form at the end of the report. Of the 37 U.S. organizations included in the report, 24 were able to provide TAICH with financial data indicating program expenditures in 1981 totaling \$4,084,855. These figures should be viewed more as indicators than as exact sums; differences in fiscal year, methods of financial reporting and methods of estimating dollar values of commodities, equipment and materiel shipped make correlation and absolute accuracy impossible.

This is one of a series of periodically revised reports which describe by country the development assistance activities of the U.S. non-profit sector. Additional and new information on the programs of the organizations appearing in this report is gathered regularly and is available from TAICH. Readers are requested to advise TAICH of any changes or new programs of U.S. private, non-profit organizations in Jamaica. Besides country reports, TAICH publishes directories, bibliographies, a quarterly newsletter and a series of category reports in which descriptions of assistance programs are compiled by functions of development assistance. A publications list is available from TAICH.

The information given on each organization is based on the data supplied to TAICH by the organization. Publication of this information does not guarantee accuracy of content or endorsement by the American Council or TAICH of any organization.

THE AMERICAN COUNCIL OF VOLUNTARY AGENCIES FOR FOREIGN SERVICE, INC. was founded in 1943 for the purpose of providing a forum for cooperation, joint planning and the exchange of ideas and information in order to avoid duplication of effort and assure the maximum effectiveness of relief, rehabilitation and development programs of American voluntary agencies. Through the mechanism of the Council, member agencies have established relationships not only among themselves but with non-member agencies and governmental, intergovernmental and international organizations. The Technical Assistance Information Clearing House (TAICH) has been operated by the Council since 1955 with support from the U.S. Government, currently a grant from the Agency for International Development. All agencies that are Council members are noted by a +.

THE TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE INFORMATION CLEARING HOUSE serves as a center of information on the socio-economic development programs abroad of U.S. non-profit organizations, including voluntary agencies, church missions and foundations. It makes available to organizations, governments, researchers and others, source materials from its files for study and research. Through publications and the maintenance of an everyday inquiry service TAICH responds to the need for current information about development assistance with particular reference to the resources and concerns of the private, non-profit sector.

THE AGENCY FOR INTERNATIONAL DEVELOPMENT (A.I.D.), maintains in its Bureau for Food for Peace and Voluntary Assistance a registry of U.S. private and voluntary organizations active in the fields of relief, rehabilitation and development overseas. Registered organizations are eligible to apply for A.I.D. resources, including grants and participation in the U.S. Government overseas freight reimbursement, Food for Peace and Government-owned excess property programs. FOOD PRODUCTION & AGRICULTURE: In the last two years field tested 23 varieties of winged beans; three varieties were selected for further seed multiplication and distribution. The current and final year of this phase of the project involves the multiplication of seeds of the selected varieties and the distribution of small seed packets to farmers. A booklet entitled "Growing and Using the Winged Bean" will be distributed along with the seeds.

EQUIPMENT & MATERIAL AID: In 1981, distributed food provided by the European Economic Community (E.E.C.) Food Program valued at \$300,000; medicines valued at \$120,000; and clothing valued at \$75,000.

FOOD PRODUCTION & AGRICULTURE: Continuing support for two long term food and small livestock production projects in the Above Rocks and Western Hanover areas. Utilizing the resources of the Government of Jamaica and the U.S. Peace Corps, the projects encourage the use of kitchen gardens and the rearing of small livestock to improve dietary intake and reduce the dependence on imported food stuffs. PADF activity centers on financial and technical support for the incipient National Development Foundation of Jamaica, a private-sector, non-profit organization which will provide credit and technical assistance to microbusinesses in an effort to raise incomes and generate employment. Vocational training and health care support are also components of PADF activity.

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COOPERATIVES, CREDIT UNIONS & LOANS: Citizens from the private sector, with the technical support of PADF, initiated the National Development Foundation of Jamaica (JDF) in early 1981. The JDF seeks to strengthen the development of entrepreneurial skills and practices through the provision of business guidance, technical assistance and of non-traditional credit and development financing facilities to small businesses. PADF provides funding to JDF for its development for the first two years with the assistance of \$500,000 from the U.S. Agency for International Development; JDF will raise matching funds locally of \$100,000. Beneficiaries will include members of the Small Business Association in Kingston and, over time, microbusinesses outside the Kingston area which lack basic business management skills and do not have access to traditional sources of credit. The JDF will support businesses which have assets of less than \$10,000 and fewer than ten employees. These businesses represent the garment industry, metal trades, shoe manufacturing and repairing, food distribution, retail and crafts. JDF short and medium term loans will likely generate one to three jobs each on the average.

EDUCATION: Tools for Training, a program of PADF, is a U.S. industry sponsored program which channels donated tools and equipment from American companies to qualified vocational/technical training schools in Latin America and the Caribbean. In addition, Tools for Training programs volunteer short-term technicians from donor companies to provide technical assistance to these schools. In 1981 donated assorted saw blades and metal working hand files to the Vocational Training Division of the Ministry of Education, Youth and Community Development valued at \$45,788. These items were distributed to various training schools around Kingston.

INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT & MANAGEMENT: Donated a 46 foot lobster vessel valued at \$53,000 to the Jamaican Cooperative Union, Ltd. to be used as a carrier boat bringing supplies to several thousand fishermen offshore, to serve as a mother ship handling the catch of these fishermen, and to catch fish herself.

MEDICINE & PUBLIC HEALTH: Solicits and ships donations of hospital supplies and equipment for use locally. In 1980, PADF cooperated with Public Welfare Foundation in providing \$9,500 through the Jamaican Planned Parenthood Association to the St. Ann Homecraft Training Center. During the same year, funds were

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raised in cooperation with the Jamaican Embassy to provide relief to areas affected by Hurricane Allen. In 1981 these funds were appropriated for 2,000 cases of disposable surgical supplies distributed by the Ministry of Health.

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In 1980 the HOPE program, started in 1971, was put in local hands and in 1981 Project HOPE entered into a new agreement with the Ministry of Health and Environmental Control. HOPE established an office in Kingston and assigned faculty to begin training programs preparing local health professionals in specialized fields which the Ministry considers priority.

MEDICINE & PUBLIC HEALTH: A biomedical engineering faculty is establishing a Training Center for Biomedical Technicians at the College of Arts, Sciences and Technology. The faculty is also working with the Ministry of Health to establish a system of maintenance and an infrastructure for administration, and equipment and parts procurement. Project HOPE faculty is working with counterparts to teach family nurse practitioners; the goal is to provide 200 nurse practitioners to furnish primary health care services to decentralized health clinics and secondary hospitals. In 9/81 initiated a program to train nurse anesthetists; they are especially needed in rural hospitals. In early 1982 started a visiting medical specialist program to provide continuing education for practicing physicians, and the teaching of residents and medical students in specialty areas. Specialists from major teaching institutions in the U.S. work with Project HOPE and accomplish these objectives by participating in short courses, grand rounds, lectures and seminars. Ships donated drugs and medical supplies for use in Ministry of Health facilities.

FUTURE PLANS: To initiate a critical care nursing education program in 1982 which will consist of two courses, one each for registered nurses and practical nurses. Also, other programs currently being planned include training of radiologists, radiologic technicians and anesthesiologists, and continuing education in the fields of clinical and anatomical pathology.
