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INTRODUCTION

The A.I.D. Participant Training Program is a vital element of U.S. foreign assistance. Its primary goal is the development of the human resources potential of citizens of developing countries. High-level training is important to meet more effectively the changing needs for managers, scientists, technicians, teaching faculties, and institutional leaders in all sectors.

More than 15,000 A.I.D.-sponsored participants received academic or technical training in the United States in the past Fiscal Year. Slightly less than half of these were enrolled in academic programs in U.S. colleges and universities, while more than half received technical, non-degree training. Most A.I.D. participants are professionals already engaged in an occupation or career.

The Office of Housing and Urban Programs (PRE/H) uses U.S. participant training to support shelter and urban development institutions in developing countries. Given the seriousness of shelter and urban problems in developing countries and A.I.D.'s strong relationships with key housing and urban development institutions in those countries, we know that there are many individuals who need and would be appropriate candidates for relevant training and education in the U.S. Several subjects are important for this purpose: national housing policy, national urban development policy, land policy, public/private collaboration in urban service delivery, housing finance, housing needs assessment methods, urban and regional planning, real estate development, urban land management, municipal management, municipal finance, feasibility assessment methods, project planning and project implementation.

PRE/H has prepared this catalogue to assist A.I.D. field personnel identify U.S.-based training programs that are appropriate to the training needs of the countries in which they are working. The catalogue should be a handy reference not only for Regional Housing and Urban Development Offices (RHUDOs) and Mission Housing Advisors, but Mission Training Officers and other Mission officers working in related sectors.

THE CATALOGUE

The material on the pages that follow was collected by PRE/H during the past six months. We intend to publish this catalogue annually.

The training programs included here are of two types. The first section provides an information sheet for degree programs of one or two year duration at the graduate level. The second section provides an information sheet for short term courses, seminars, and workshops. These programs do not grant degrees, but may grant certificates.


The list of institutions from which PRE/H requested information about relevant courses and programs includes those with which PRE/H already has an established relationship, those with which at least some communication has been established, and those which were otherwise suggested to PRE/H or whose program announcements had been received, or which were known by name, affiliation, or reputation to have programs of interest to PRE/H. Altogether, PRE/H inquired of some 100 institutions about their programs.

In the initial solicitation of course offerings, subject areas were limited to traditional urban development disciplines. As a result of this, there may be some fields of study which may not be represented here, but which are connected to shelter and urban development issues. If demand warrants, we will investigate courses offered in other topic areas, and incorporate the findings where possible.

PRE/H recognizes that this catalogue does not include all relevant training programs available in the U.S. It is particularly difficult to collect timely information on short courses offered in the very near future. We ask, therefore, that any reader who is aware of an appropriate institution or scheduled course not included here, to please inform PRE/H.

In our search for participant training courses, it was discovered that there are in fact very few courses which are specifically geared towards candidates from developing countries. However, as the catalogue develops and more information is acquired, we will be able to replace those entries with more specialized courses, more applicable for such candidates.

The information provided should be sufficient for the A.I.D. field officer to make an initial determination of the suitability of a course or program. To find out more, the reader should make contact with the institution, although the PRE/H Central Training Unit may be able to provide assistance if necessary.
