Describes French policy toward the Vietminh and the pro Bao Dai parties between 1945 and 1953.

An attempt to describe the complex background of recent developments in Viet-Nam by tracing Vietnamese history back to the fifteenth century, when the Vietnamese proclaimed their independence from China.

Thompson, Virginia. French Indochina. New York: MacMillan. 1942. 517 p.
Description of the French colonial regime in Indochina. A well-balanced account of its achievements and short comings.

Unified and fairly complete description of most aspects of North Vietnamese society.

Account of journey by authors Tom Hayden and Staughton Lynd to Hanoi in December 1965. Presentation is in line with Marxist thinking.

Burchett, Wilfred G. Viet-Nam North. 1st ed. New York: International Publishers. 1966. 191 p.

Description of the achievement of the Hanoi regime.

Cameron, James. Here Is Your Enemy; Complete Report From North Viet-Nam. 1st ed. New York: Holt, Rinehart and Winston. 1966. 144 p.

Liberal British journalist, first Western correspondent to be admitted to North Viet-Nam, describes the North Vietnamese administration, defense systems, people, and leaders based on his 1965 visit.

Background and events, 1930 to present, in the growth of the Communist Party and its influence in Vietnamese Affairs.

North Vietnamese defector reports on development of communism in North Viet-Nam, describing methods used by Communists to eliminate genuine nationalists, Ho Chi Minh's career, rise of the Communist Party, and Land Reform Campaign of 1953-56.

Ho-Chi-Minh. On Revolution; Selected Writings, 1920-66. Edited with an introduction by Bernard B. Fall. New York: Praeger. 1967. 389 p.

Based largely on the four-volume Selected Works of Ho Chi Minh. It has been expanded to include recent writings.

Honey, Patrick J., ed. North Viet-Nam Today; Profile of a Communist Satellite. New York: Praeger. 1962. 166 p.

Contains nine articles previously published in The China Quarterly. Assesses the country's current strengths and weaknesses.

Lacouture, Jean. Ho Chi Minh, A Political Biography. Trans. Peter Wiles New York: Vintage. 1968. 313 p.

Pike, Douglas. Viet Cong; The Organization and Techniques of the National Liberation Front of South Viet-Nam. Cambridge, Massachusetts: M.I.T. Press. 1966. 490 p.

Comprehensive study done on the nature and organization of the enemy. Covers the period from 1950 to 1965 when the war was escalated to North Viet-Nam.

— War, Peace and the Viet Cong. Cambridge: M.I.T. Press, 1969. 186 p.

Author examines major contenders in the Vietnam struggle and documents their objectives, real desires, and stated demands. Also updates to 1969 appraisals contained in Viet Cong: The Organization and Techniques of the National Liberation Front of South Vietnam.

The authors make clear the fact that meaningful economic, social, and political change can be accomplished only in areas which have been pacified.

West, F. J., Jr. "The Fast Rifles: A Strategy for Grass Roots Pacification in Vietnam," Public and International Affairs, 5 (Spring 1967). Pages 99-109.

Discusses an experiment begun in 1965-66 to determine whether a 12-man Marine squad living in a village with a few squads of popular forces could provide security for the village and improve the combat effectiveness of Vietnamese farmers who fight part-time for the central government.

Discussion of Water resources development in the Mekong Valley. Professor Fifield of the University of Michigan discusses the general environment and political climate of the region and Dr. Schaaf, a U.N. official explains the physical characteristics of the Mekong and of the work projected along it and its tributaries.

Author examines and appraises the effectiveness of the strategic hamlet program in South Vietnam while comparing it with the resettlement operation in Malaya during the 1950s.

Account of the evolution of the Viet-Nam conflict.
