KEY DEVELOPMENTS

- As of September 20, USAID/OFDA grantees had reported completing 5,855 transitional shelters (t-shelters), approximately 45 percent of the 13,500 t-shelters built by international relief agencies and sufficient to house nearly 30,000 individuals.
- USAID/OFDA grantee Pan American Development Foundation (PADF) is meeting with community leaders to finalize selection criteria for yellow house repairs, ensuring community engagement with the beneficiary selection process. PADF also continues to train engineers on methods to repair damaged structures. As of August 29, teams of engineers—from a project funded by USAID/OFDA and the World Bank to assess building structures throughout earthquake-affected areas—had identified approximately 65,000 yellow houses, or houses requiring moderate repairs, of the more than 250,000 assessed buildings.

CONTEXT

- On January 12 at 1653 hours local time, a magnitude 7.0 earthquake struck southern Haiti. According to the U.S. Geological Survey (USGS), the earthquake's epicenter was located 10 miles southwest of the capital Port-au-Prince, West Department. The earthquake killed an estimated 230,000 people and affected approximately 3 million others, according to the GoH. On January 13, U.S. Ambassador to Haiti Kenneth H. Merten declared a disaster due to the effects of the earthquake.
- During the months following the earthquake, humanitarian efforts met the immediate needs of earthquake-affected populations, through the provision of safe drinking water, food, household items, shelter assistance, and health care. USAID continues to work closely with other U.S. Government agencies, the GoH, international organizations, the U.N., and non-governmental organizations (NGOs) to coordinate ongoing efforts and to facilitate the transition from emergency relief activities to recovery operations, while preparing to respond to the potential for further deterioration in humanitarian conditions during the rainy and hurricane seasons.

Nutrition

- During the week of September 19, Family Health International (FHI) began trainings as part of a USAID/OFDAfunded cash-for-work (CFW) program designed to train and employ 500 community health workers to identify malnutrition in children five years of age and under, as well as in pregnant and nursing women. The community workers will also be trained in de-worming, immunization, and advocacy to encourage breast-feeding for infants six months and under, and community sensitization and administration of iron and Vitamin A supplements.
- FHI has identified and mapped 13 camps, which house approximately 54,000 people, and has mapped nearby health care facilities and mobile clinics for malnutrition referrals. FHI is working in partnership with World Vision and Action Contre la Faim (ACF), which will provide the nurses to train and monitor the community workers' trainers, track nutrition indicators, and oversee referrals for malnutrition cases. Nurses conducted the first training of trainers on September 17 and training for community health workers began the week of September 19. Additional trainings will commence on September 30.
- At a September 15 meeting with USAID/OFDA staff, FHI reported identifying three community organizations to manage payroll and personnel issues for the CFW program. The organizations will have a direct link with a local bank to facilitate payments to the CFW teams. USAID/OFDA noted that this system reduces the need to bring large quantities of cash into displacement camps, thereby reducing the potential for protection issues to arise in connection with beneficiary payments.

Hurricane Preparedness

- From September 22 to 24, the U.N. Stabilization Mission in Haiti (MINUSTAH) is conducting a joint hurricane preparedness exercise, testing the U.N. interagency response to a potential hurricane in Port-au-Prince and Jacmel municipalities. Liaisons from the GoH Department of Civil Protection (DPC), U.N. civilian agencies, and U.N. Police are also participating, and USAID/OFDA Haiti Program Office staff and U.S. military representatives are attending as observers.
- By simulating the time period from 48 hours before to 48 hours after a hurricane's landfall in Haiti, the exercise examines interagency coordination at the command level, capacity to use secondary communication systems, field coordination, and the efficiency of systems for deploying engineering assets to regions outside of Port-au-Prince as needed. The September exercise follows a similar July event in Gonaïves, Artibonite Department. MINUSTAH plans to conduct exercises quarterly, with additional drills tentatively planned for Les Cayes, South Department, in December and Cap-Haitien, North Department, in March.
- USAID/OFDA staff noted that the exercise clarifies roles and responsibilities during a hurricane response and motivates key actors to think through potential critical decisions before the onset of a disaster, such as when to activate coordination bodies, ensure information sharing, and determine leadership in situations involving many agencies. USAID/OFDA staff also reported improvements in coordination between U.N. civilian agencies and MINUSTAH during the course of the exercise, indicating that the simulation had helped integrate the response capacities of the two U.N. branches.

Protection

- At a September 21 Protection Cluster meeting, the International Rescue Committee (IRC) reported that the process of updating gender-based violence (GBV) referral cards that provide health and emotional support service information is ongoing. Protection cluster members may request the new cards from IRC for distribution in displacement sites. In addition, IRC plans to conduct a series of trainings on GBV referral systems for camp managers in October.
- The Protection Cluster has identified 10 individuals from member organizations who are on standby to serve as part of an inter-cluster Emergency Response Team (ERT) in case of a hurricane or tropical storm. The protection officers on the ERT will conduct trainings, participate in needs assessments with other members of the team, and ensure that humanitarian agencies consider protection issues during evacuations.
