#### KEY DEVELOPMENTS

- On March 15, a USAID/OFDA flight delivered 750 rolls of plastic sheeting to Haiti. To date, USAID/OFDA has
  provided 16,230 rolls of plastic sheeting to meet post-earthquake shelter needs, benefiting approximately 811,500
  people.
- As of March 15, the second phase of food distributions conducted by the U.N. World Food Program (WFP) and non-governmental organization (NGO) partners in the Port-au-Prince metropolitan area had reached more than 980,000 individuals since distributions began on March 6.

## **CURRENT SITUATION**

- On March 12, USAID Disaster Assistance Response Team (USAID/DART) and USAID/Haiti staff conducted an assessment of humanitarian conditions for displaced persons and host families in and around Cap-Haïtien municipality, North Department. The assessment found that the presence of an estimated 40,000 displaced individuals in the area had affected host families' livelihoods, straining limited pre-earthquake household resources. Local officials and residents cited food assistance as the primary remaining need. The GoH Department of Civil Protection (DPC) reports that more than 40,000 displaced persons from earthquake-affected areas are currently residing with host families in North Department.
- Displaced individuals in Cap-Haïtien are residing with host families rather than in spontaneous settlements. The USAID assessment indicated that hosting arrangements have placed considerable economic strain on households in Cap-Haïtien. Increased pressure on host family incomes has caused some individuals to cease small business activities due to a loss of monetary resources available for such ventures, according to USAID staff. As a result, the USAID assessment team recommended the implementation of augmented cash-for-work and other economic recovery and market systems interventions in the Cap-Haïtien area to help support displaced and host families.
- On March 11, USAID/DART staff and representatives from USAID/OFDA partner CARE visited the Village
  Gaston spontaneous settlement in Carrefour municipality, metropolitan Port-au-Prince, which hosts approximately
  8,000 displaced persons.
- With support from USAID/OFDA, CARE is implementing latrine construction and waste collection through a cash-for-work project in several Carrefour settlements, including Village Gaston. CARE seeks to place women in leadership roles in the project and currently employs women as waste collection supervisors in Village Gaston.

#### Shelter and Settlements

- On March 12, USAID/DART staff met with USAID/OFDA partners World Vision, Catholic Relief Services (CRS), and CHF International to discuss plans to address potential needs related to the upcoming rainy and hurricane seasons.
- Partners noted that the Camp Coordination and Camp Management (CCCM) Cluster continues to plan to move displaced families from crowded spontaneous settlements to new transitional shelter sites to address concerns regarding potential flooding and the spread of waterborne diseases. On March 12, the GoH authorized the CCCM Cluster to construct a transitional settlement at Tabarre 2 ISSA site. The CCCM Cluster has identified agencies to provide camp management, shelter, nutrition, and water, sanitation, and hygiene (WASH) services at the site.
- The Shelter Cluster plans to provide 240,000 to 300,000 households with temporary shelter materials, such as plastic sheeting, and construct 120,000 transitional shelters over the coming nine to 12 months.
- Identifying available land and securing rights to build remain the primary challenges to constructing transitional shelters, according to USAID/DART staff and partners.

## WASH

- On March 11, the WASH Cluster circulated results from a recent inter-cluster assessment of the five potential GoH-recommended resettlement sites. Representatives from the CCCM, Shelter, and WASH clusters assessed Villages des Orangers, Sibert, Corail, and Villages des Antilles sites and plan to assess Tabarre 2 ISSA site in the coming days.
- The report indicates that the risk of minor flooding at Sibert site could be easily addressed through digging of drainage ditches. However, the WASH Cluster notes significant impediments to sanitation management at the site due to the high water table. The WASH Cluster recommended the remaining three assessed sites for resettlement use, noting that the land is suitable for sanitation infrastructure. Canal clearing and construction of drainage infrastructure would address flooding concerns prior to the onset of the rainy season.

#### Health and Nutrition

- USAID/DART health staff note a transition from earthquake-related trauma medical treatment to basic service
  provision in areas of displacement. A USAID/DART visit to a clinic run by USAID/OFDA partner Relief
  International (RI) also indicated a transition from earthquake-related treatment needs to primary health care
  consultations, including some patients reporting generalized pain, which medical staff attributed to post-earthquake
  stress and trauma.
- The GoH and Health Cluster members, with support from the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, are working to enhance monitoring and surveillance mechanisms, including a sentinel surveillance system that includes 51 health facility monitoring sites. To date, no diseases have exceeded baseline rates or epidemic levels.
- On March 11, USAID/DART staff visited mobile and fixed health clinics operated by RI, which currently operates two mobile health clinics and supports two fixed health centers in Carrefour municipality, Port-au-Prince metropolitan area. Between January 15 and March 11, RI staff treated 1,163 patients at mobile health clinics and approximately 6,800 patients at the Carrefour health center.
- On March 15, the U.N. Children's Fund (UNICEF) reported a sufficient stock of ready-to-use therapeutic food to
  meet current NGO requests. Nutrition Cluster partners currently operate a total of 23 infant and young child
  feeding programs in Haiti, according to UNICEF.

# U.S. GOVERNMENT (USG) HUMANITARIAN ASSISTANCE

- On January 13, U.S. Ambassador to Haiti Kenneth H. Merten declared a disaster due to the effects of the
  earthquake. To date, USAID has contributed more than \$494 million in earthquake response funding, including
  nearly \$335 million from USAID/OFDA, \$68 million from USAID/FFP, \$35 million from USAID/OTI, more than
  \$53 million from USAID/Haiti, and \$3 million from USAID/DR. In total, the USG has contributed more than
  \$779 million in earthquake response funding for Haiti to date.
- On January 12, USAID/OFDA activated a Washington, D.C.-based Response Management Team to support the
  USAID/DART that deployed to Haiti early on January 13 to assess humanitarian conditions and coordinate
  activities with the humanitarian community. The USAID/DART continues to assess and identify humanitarian
  needs and coordinate delivery of emergency relief supplies to Port-au-Prince and other earthquake-affected areas.
- As of February 23, DoD's estimated cost for the Haiti earthquake relief effort was \$285 million. DoD has been supporting humanitarian efforts through transportation of USG personnel and relief commodities into Haiti, as well as the provision of health and medical services.
