HAITI - Earthquake

KEY DEVELOPMENTS

- On February 11, the Government of Haiti (GoH) National Direction for Potable Water and Sanitation (DINEPA), in cooperation with the U.N. Children's Fund (UNICEF), released the Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene (WASH) Cluster strategy for accelerated latrine construction. To support the WASH Cluster strategy, USAID/OFDA plans to procure 3,000 portable toilets and 20 de-sludging trucks for consignment to UNICEF in order to meet urgent sanitation needs in locations where trench latrines are not viable. USAID/OFDA also plans to provide an additional \$2.5 million to UNICEF for portable latrine operations, maintenance, and management.
- According to shelter material distribution estimates released by the International Organization for Migration (IOM), nearly 100,000 households, or approximately 500,000 people, had received some form of shelter material as of February 14. The USAID Disaster Assistance Response Team (USAID/DART) shelter and settlements advisor notes that the figure represents an increase from an estimated 32 percent of the affected population with basic shelter coverage as of February 11 to approximately 42 percent as of February 14, due to augmented distribution in recent days.

CURRENT SITUATION

- On February 15, four teams—comprising a total of 14 USAID/DART and USAID/Haiti staff members—are scheduled to conduct multi-sectoral assessments of hosting cities in Haiti, including Jacmel, Gonaïves, Jérémie, and Les Cayes.
- On February 14, the U.N. World Food Program (WFP) reported the opening of new sub-offices in Saint-Marc, Léogâne, and Les Cayes, in addition to existing sub-offices in Jacmel, Gonaïves, and Cap-Haïtien, according to the USAID/DART. The new sub-offices will help facilitate food distributions to areas outside of Port-au-Prince.
- The USAID/DART continues to emphasize trench latrine construction, where possible, as well as portable latrine installation and intensive hygiene promotion activities in certain difficult-to-reach locations.

Shelter and Settlements

According to the USAID/DART shelter and settlements advisor, the Emergency Shelter Cluster estimated that
approximately 42 percent of the affected population had received basic shelter material as of February 14;
however, the USAID/DART shelter and settlements advisor notes that an estimated 60 percent of affected

- individuals may have coverage as a result of increased rates of official distributions, out-of-pipeline distributions, and out-migration from Port-au-Prince.
- In response to USAID/DART assessments emphasizing the need for the formulation, adoption, and implementation of a debris management plan, the first inter-agency Coordination Support Committee Debris Management Task Force was convened on February 14. The U.N. Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs (OCHA), the GoH, and USAID jointly chair the committee, which is hosted by the U.S. Military Joint Task Force—Haiti Joint Operations Center (JTF—H).
- The meeting aimed to identify engineering expertise among various organizations now present in Haiti. Meeting participants also identified a need for appropriate public messaging regarding debris disposal, particularly in flood plains and drainage areas, according to the USAID/DART.

Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene

- According to the WASH Cluster strategy, an estimated 18,000 latrines are needed in Haiti to meet the sanitation
 needs of affected populations, including 9,000 in Port-au-Prince. However, within Port-au-Prince, several sites are
 difficult to serve due to overcrowding, concrete paving, or landownership issues that require portable toilets rather
 than trench latrines.
- As a result, of the 9,000 latrines needed in Port-au-Prince, the USAID/DART WASH advisor reports that approximately 4,500 will likely be portable toilets. USAID/OFDA plans to provide 3,000 of the required 4,500 portable toilets, as well as 20 of the required 40 to 45 de-sludging trucks. In addition, USAID/OFDA plans to provide \$2.5 million to UNICEF for portable latrine operations, maintenance, and management.
- The USAID/DART notes that an interim solution is necessary to provide sanitation support in the four- to six-week period before the purchased trucks and portable latrines arrive. In response, USAID/OFDA partners Catholic Relief Services (CRS) and Action Contre La Faim (ACF) are currently renting 400 portable latrines and UNICEF plans to rent 1,000 latrines beginning in mid- to late February.
- To improve data collection regarding remaining WASH gaps, USAID/DART staff have developed an assessment tool as part of a 10-day WASH Cluster assessment of 300 settlement sites within Port-au-Prince and immediate surrounding areas, which is scheduled to commence on February 16. GoH DINEPA, UNICEF, Oxfam, the USAID/DART, and the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention plan to participate in the assessment.

Emergency Food Assistance

- On February 14, relief agencies distributed emergency food assistance benefiting approximately 98,000 people in metropolitan Port-au-Prince, the USAID/DART reported. Since the earthquake, WFP and partners have provided emergency food assistance to more than 3.1 million people, including more than 2.3 million people to date through the 16-site distribution system.
- During the morning of February 14, USAID/DART staff observed an orderly food distribution at one Port-au-Prince distribution site, located in a densely populated catchment area of earthquake-affected individuals. Distributions in the area are targeting approximately 3,000 households per day through February 20.

Health

- The USAID/DART is working with the Nutrition Cluster, UNICEF, and WFP to develop a plan for the expansion of blanket supplementary feeding in settlement sites. On February 15, the Nutrition Cluster is expected to present the plan, which assigns geographic responsibility to partners for distributions.
- On February 14, the USAID/DART nutrition advisor and UNICEF nutrition coordinator visited three feeding tents targeting orphaned infants and children without breastfeeding possibilities. Concern Worldwide and USAID/OFDA partner ACF are managing infant feeding operations in the tents, located in the Place Boyer and Canape Vert neighborhoods of Port-au-Prince. The nutrition advisor reported that the tents were fully operational, although overall infant feeding coverage remains low in settlement sites.
- As of February 14, JTF–H reported that DoD medical personnel had treated 4,832 patients since the earthquake response began, including 1,205 patients treated onboard U.S. ships, such as the USNS COMFORT, and 3,627 patients treated on the ground in Haiti. As of February 14, USAID/OFDA-supported U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) medical staff had also seen a total of 29,582 patients.

U.S. GOVERNMENT (USG) HUMANITARIAN ASSISTANCE

On January 13, U.S Ambassador to Haiti Kenneth H. Merten declared a disaster due to the effects of the earthquake. To date, USAID has contributed nearly \$344 million in earthquake response funding, including nearly \$223 million from USAID/OFDA, \$68 million from USAID/FFP, \$20 million from USAID/OTI, more than \$30 million from USAID/Haiti, and \$3 million from USAID/DR. In total, the USG has contributed nearly \$599 million in earthquake response funding for Haiti to date.

- On January 12, USAID/OFDA activated a Washington, D.C.-based Response Management Team to support the
 USAID/DART that deployed to Haiti early on January 13 to assess humanitarian conditions and coordinate
 activities with the humanitarian community. The USAID/DART continues to assess humanitarian needs and
 identify emergency relief supplies for immediate delivery to Port-au-Prince and other earthquake-affected areas.
- As of February 15, DoD's estimated cost for the Haiti earthquake relief effort is \$255 million. DoD has been supporting humanitarian efforts through transportation of USG personnel and relief commodities into Haiti, as well as the provision of health and medical services.
