KEY DEVELOPMENTS

- Beginning February 12, the Government of Haiti (GoH) is observing a three-day mourning period to mark the onemonth anniversary of the earthquake. The U.N. World Food Program (WFP), following consultations with the GoH, reported no anticipated food assistance disruptions at distribution sites during the mourning period. In addition, USAID Disaster Assistance Response Team (USAID/DART) members expect no significant impacts on humanitarian activities during the period.
- On February 12, USAID/Haiti reported the reprogramming of nearly \$19 million to support the earthquake response effort, bringing total USAID/Haiti-provided funding to more than \$30 million. To date, USAID has provided nearly \$323 million for the earthquake response.

CURRENT SITUATION

• The Camp Coordination and Camp Management (CCCM) Cluster reported 10 organized settlement sites, 19 priority sites for decongestion, and eight GoH-identified sites for the establishment of organized settlements as of February 11. The CCCM Cluster notes that the 19 priority sites for decongestion host a total of approximately 180,000 people.

Emergency Food Assistance

- On February 11, relief agencies distributed emergency food assistance benefiting approximately 184,400 people in metropolitan Port-au-Prince, the USAID/DART reported. Distributions took place at 15 of 16 fixed sites. Since the earthquake, WFP and partners have provided emergency food assistance to nearly 2.7 million people, including more than 1.8 million people to date through the 16-site distribution system.
- WFP has received nearly \$243 million of funding for emergency food operations in Haiti, of which more than 30 percent has been provided by USAID. USAID/FFP has provided \$68 million of P.L. 480 Title II Emergency Food Assistance to support WFP operations and USAID/OFDA has contributed \$10 million for logistical support.

Population Movement

• OCHA reports the need to identify resettlement locations, taking into account flood risk, congestion, rubble clearance, and proximity to services at identified sites. The CCCM Cluster continues to work with the GoH to

identify land for relocation of individuals—in addition to the eight sites already identified—prior to the upcoming rainy season in April.

- The CCCM Cluster reports that cluster partners plan to prioritize 19 sites, hosting more than 5,000 people per site, for decongestion activities. The CCCM Cluster notes that the priority sites include four of the total 10 organized settlements. The CCCM Cluster highlights that partners plan to relocate individuals only on a voluntary basis.
- On February 11, the U.N. Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs (OCHA) reported that the U.N. Country Team from the Dominican Republic recently completed an inter-agency assessment of the Dominican Republic—Haiti border. According to the team, approximately 168,000 displaced persons are residing along the Haitian side of the border, primarily with host families. The team also identified individuals residing in spontaneous settlements, including more than 1,000 people residing in Anse-a-Pitre and 400 individuals in Ganthier.

Protection

- On February 9, the USAID/DART protection officer met with USAID/OFDA partner Save the Children/U.S. (SC/US) to discuss child protection issues. SC/US reported that on February 8, non-governmental organization (NGO) staff and representatives from the GoH child protection office launched operations at the separated and unaccompanied children registration call center. SC/US plans to establish similar call centers in Léogâne and Jacmel, pending an evaluation of the effectiveness of the Port-au-Prince center.
- On February 10, the USAID/DART protection and program officers met with representatives of the Women's Refugee Commission and WFP to discuss the USAID/OFDA-funded Safe Access to Firewood and Alternative Energy (SAFE) initiative. Representatives from the two organizations are conducting a rapid assessment of fuel availability and the impact of the earthquake on traditional fuel practices. The assessment will inform a strategy to address immediate fuel needs and long-term changes in practices.

Shelter and Settlements

- The International Organization for Migration (IOM) reports that to date, the 24 relief agencies reporting to the Emergency Shelter Cluster have distributed shelter materials to approximately 366,000 people, or 31 percent of the affected population in need of emergency assistance. According to broader informal estimates, approximately 592,000 individuals—or 50 percent of target beneficiaries—have received some form of shelter assistance.
- On February 10, the GoH formally endorsed the cluster strategy to provide basic shelter assistance—including one plastic sheet and supplemental inputs—to each affected household by May 1.
- According to the USAID/DART shelter and settlements advisor, the shelter assistance pipeline contains sufficient quantities of plastic sheeting to provide each affected household with one sheet. The advisor also reports that ongoing expansions in capacity should allow partners to complete plastic sheeting distribution by the May 1 target date.
- The USAID/DART shelter and settlements advisor emphasizes that transitional shelter operations continue to face key obstacles, including the need for rubble removal and identification of vacant or underutilized land for settlement.

Health and Nutrition

- From February 9 to 10, the supplementary feeding pilot program benefited a total of 1,000 households through nutrition assistance to children less than five years of age and pregnant and lactating women. WFP has identified seven partners to expand the supplementary feeding program, although the agencies have not yet announced a start date for program activities.
- On February 11, USAID/DART staff met with the U.N. Children's Fund (UNICEF) to discuss methods to expand supplementary feeding and infant feeding site coverage. Current impediments to expansion include a lack of trained national staff and a limited number of potential implementing partners, according to the USAID/DART. UNICEF and USAID/DART staff are developing a strategy for enlisting trained staff through partnerships with the GoH Ministry of Health and local NGOs.

U.S. GOVERNMENT (USG) HUMANITARIAN ASSISTANCE

- On January 13, U.S Ambassador to Haiti Kenneth H. Merten declared a disaster due to the effects of the earthquake. To date, USAID has contributed nearly \$323 million in earthquake response funding, including nearly \$202 million from USAID/OFDA, \$68 million from USAID/FFP, \$20 million from USAID/OTI, more than \$30 million from USAID/Haiti, and \$3 million from USAID/DR. In total, the USG has contributed more than \$564 million in earthquake response funding for Haiti to date.
- On January 12, USAID/OFDA activated a Washington, D.C.-based Response Management Team to support the USAID/DART that deployed to Haiti early on January 13 to assess humanitarian conditions and coordinate

activities with the humanitarian community. The USAID/DART continues to assess humanitarian needs and identify emergency relief supplies for immediate delivery to Port-au-Prince and other earthquake-affected areas.

• As of February 12, DoD's estimated cost for the Haiti earthquake relief effort is \$241.5 million. DoD has been supporting humanitarian efforts through transportation of USG personnel and relief commodities into Haiti, as well as provision of health and medical services.
