KEY DEVELOPMENTS

• On February 10, a flight transporting 90 rolls of USAID/OFDA plastic sheeting arrived in Port-au-Prince, bringing the total USAID/OFDA-provided plastic sheeting to 3,690 rolls—benefiting approximately 147,600 people. In the coming days, additional USAID/OFDA plastic sheeting is expected to arrive in Port-au-Prince via overland transport from Santo Domingo, Dominican Republic.

CURRENT SITUATION

• On February 11, the USAID Disaster Assistance Response Team (USAID/DART) water, sanitation, and hygiene (WASH) advisor and a USAID/Haiti program officer are traveling to Léogâne to monitor a distribution of emergency relief commodities, as well as to conduct rapid WASH assessments in spontaneous settlement sites. The U.N. Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs (OCHA) sub-office in Léogâne reports that an estimated 80,000 to 120,000 people require humanitarian assistance in Léogâne commune, particularly shelter, sanitation, food, and safe drinking water.

Emergency Food Assistance

- On February 10, relief agencies distributed emergency food assistance benefiting approximately 170,000 people in metropolitan Port-au-Prince, the USAID/DART reported. Since the earthquake, the U.N. World Food Program (WFP) and partners have provided emergency food assistance to more than 2.5 million people, including more than 1.5 million people to date through the 16-site distribution system.
- According to the USAID/DART, lead non-governmental organizations (NGOs) at several sites where distributions commenced after the official January 31 start date plan to continue general distributions beyond the scheduled February 13 completion date, in order to finalize distributions to all identified households. The USAID/DART also reported that the lead NGO at one of the sites plans to divide the area into three sections—with one distribution point for each section—in order to accommodate a greater number of households per day, as the NGO attempts to reach the total number of affected households in the area.

Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene

- On February 9, the USAID/DART WASH advisors conducted a follow-up to a previous assessment of the Delmas 33 settlement site, where more than 8,000 people currently reside on the school grounds. The assessment revealed that, due to recent increases in the site's population, new arrivals now occupy an area previously identified by the USAID/DART for latrine placement, compounding sanitation concerns.
- The USAID/DART WASH advisors recommended that relief agencies and school authorities coordinate to identify appropriate locations for additional latrine construction and improve solid-waste disposal at Delmas 33 settlement.
- On February 9, the USAID/DART WASH advisors also conducted a second assessment of the expanding Petionville Club settlement site. The WASH officers reported progress in ensuring the population's access to sanitation facilities and clean water at the site, where Oxfam has installed a small water distribution network and constructed two sets of shower stalls and 61 latrines.
- The WASH advisors noted that the new water distribution network will improve potable water access at the site through tanker truck operations, barring further population increases and associated resource strains. USAID/DART staff also observed cash-for-work beneficiaries cleaning the waste disposal site at the settlement.

Early Recovery

- On February 9, the GoH approved the establishment of sub-working groups focused on small NGO partnering arrangements for expanded food distributions; rural interventions; food assistance impacts on local economies; cluster coordination with local governments; local food purchase; and food assistance impacts on long-term programs, such as cash- and food-for-work, among other issue areas.
- According to the USAID/DART, a team comprising 18 staff members from 11 humanitarian agencies is conducting an emergency market assessment (EMA) to examine the suitability of cash grants, market support mechanisms, and advocacy for addressing food and shelter needs and providing income-generating opportunities. The team expects to release preliminary EMA results on February 17.
- On February 9, USAID-funded cash-for-work programs employed nearly 10,100 people at 188 sites, including earthquake-affected areas of Port-au-Prince, Petit Goâve, and Les Cayes, as well as cities to which displaced populations have migrated, including Cap-Haïtien, Gonaïves, and Saint-Marc.

Shelter and Settlements

- On February 10, the International Federation of Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies assumed the Shelter Cluster lead role, according to the USAID/DART shelter advisor. The former cluster lead, the International Organization for Migration (IOM), will continue to serve as the Non-Food Item Cluster lead.
- During the formal cluster lead transition, IOM reported that approximately 366,335 people, or approximately 30 percent of displaced individuals, had received shelter assistance as of February 10. IOM noted that the figures are based on reports from 24 humanitarian agencies, although the number of individuals having received shelter assistance is likely higher due to ongoing distributions unreported to the Shelter Cluster lead.

Health and Nutrition

- As of February 9, nearly 90 community outpatient centers and mobile units for the treatment of severe acute malnutrition had resumed operations throughout Haiti, according to the Nutrition Cluster. Cluster partners also relayed plans to open 52 additional sites within the next two to three weeks. To date, centers have received 131 severely malnourished children, including 40 children admitted in the last week, as reported by nine out of 40 cluster partners.
- Current nutrition support to the affected population includes approximately 60 sites established to provide counseling to caregivers on infant and young child feeding practices. Nutrition partners report counseling more than 7,800 caregivers in affected communities and nearly 1,200 people residing in spontaneous settlements.
- As of February 10, the U.S. Military Joint Task Force–Haiti reported that DoD medical personnel had treated 4,652 patients since the earthquake response began, including 1,118 patients treated onboard U.S. ships and 3,534 patients treated on the ground in Haiti.

U.S. GOVERNMENT (USG) HUMANITARIAN ASSISTANCE

- On January 13, U.S Ambassador to Haiti Kenneth H. Merten declared a disaster due to the effects of the earthquake. To date, USAID has contributed nearly \$304 million in earthquake response funding, including nearly \$202 million from USAID/OFDA, \$68 million from USAID/FFP, \$20 million from USAID/OTI, more than \$11 million from USAID/Haiti, and \$3 million from USAID/DR. In total, the USG has contributed nearly \$538 million in earthquake response funding for Haiti to date.
- On January 12, USAID/OFDA activated a Washington, D.C.-based Response Management Team to support the USAID/DART that deployed to Haiti early on January 13 to assess humanitarian conditions and coordinate

activities with the humanitarian community. The USAID/DART continues to assess humanitarian needs and identify emergency relief supplies for immediate delivery to Port-au-Prince and other earthquake-affected areas.

• As of February 9, DoD's estimated cost for the Haiti earthquake relief effort is \$234 million. DoD has been supporting humanitarian efforts through transportation of USG personnel and relief commodities into Haiti, as well as provision of health and medical services.
