KEY DEVELOPMENTS

- On February 5, U.N. Special Envoy for Haiti and former U.S. President Bill Clinton visited Port-au-Prince to observe ongoing emergency humanitarian efforts and meet with Government of Haiti (GoH) and U.N. officials. According to media reports, the Special Envoy noted significant progress in food, shelter, and security interventions and highlighted the need for increased sanitation and health services.
- On February 5, lead non-governmental organizations distributed food to 165,654 people at all 16 fixed distribution points without incident—bringing the total number of people reached through the new system to approximately 784,000. The new system has increased the U.N. World Food Program (WFP) beneficiary total to approximately 1.5 million people to date.

CURRENT SITUATION

- The Logistics Cluster continues to report a steady reduction from the peak 120 to 150 flights arriving per day at the Port-au-Prince airport to approximately 80 to 90 flights currently arriving per day. The cluster reports no airport delays, although significant congestion at the Jimani border crossing point between Haiti and the Dominican Republic continues to slow overland deliveries of emergency relief commodities.
- On February 5, the U.N. Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs (OCHA) reported seven organized settlements hosting more than 42,500 people. Camp Coordination and Camp Management (CCCM) cluster partners managing the sites indicate the need for increased shelter materials and latrine access. Information regarding spontaneous settlements remains limited, although CCCM Cluster partners have identified 315 settlement sites to date.

Emergency Food Assistance

- In addition to distributions at the 16 fixed points, WFP reported augmenting food assistance to meet food needs of displaced populations residing in South, West, North, and Artibonite departments. In cooperation with the GoH Department of Civil Protection and the Haitian Red Cross, WFP provided food to 14,000 displaced persons residing in Cap-Haïtien in Carrefour neighborhood of Port-au-Prince on February 3. WFP is organizing the provision of two month rations for a school feeding program in Gonaïves, the capital of Artibonite Department, following the re-opening of schools in affected areas.

Shelter

- The Shelter Cluster estimated that more than 24,000 families had received emergency shelter assistance as of February 5. Shelter Cluster partners have identified a gap in available tarpaulins, shelter kits, and transitional shelter materials. To date, USAID/OFDA has provided 3,600 rolls of plastic sheeting to augment shelter assistance efforts.
- According to the Shelter Cluster, an estimated 80,000 people in Léogâne and approximately 30,000 individuals in Jacmel require shelter assistance. To meet ongoing shelter needs, USAID/OFDA is providing plastic sheeting for transitional shelter construction.
- According to the USAID's Disaster Assistance Response Team (USAID/DART), the International Federation of Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies (IFRC)—the new Shelter Cluster lead—plans to deploy 10 to 12 staff to Port-au-Prince to assume coordination of emergency shelter activities on February 10. The USAID/DART shelter and settlements advisor has discussed shelter assistance strategies with new IFRC technical advisors, emphasizing the importance of linking plastic sheeting for emergency shelter purposes to broader transitional shelter assistance goals.

Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene (WASH)

- As of February 5, WASH Cluster members had constructed 847 latrines in Port-au-Prince, Jacmel, and Léogâne since the earthquake, according to OCHA. In addition, OCHA reported that approximately 250,000 people have benefited from distribution of hygiene kits by humanitarian agencies to date.
- To prioritize locations for WASH interventions, the GoH National Potable Water and Sanitation Authority and the U.N. Children's Fund (UNICEF), with assistance from the USAID/DART, are planning a series of WASH assessments in 200 large spontaneous settlements in and around Port-au-Prince currently receiving water from tankering trucks. Teams plan to collect data on water, latrine, and hygiene kit quantities and coverage gaps, as well as solid waste collection efforts.

Health

- U.N. World Health Organization (WHO) and Pan American Health Organization (PAHO) officials report no significant disease outbreaks to date, according to OCHA.
- The PAHO-run PROMESS warehouse has distributed medicine and medical supplies valued at approximately \$700,000 to 250 organizations, according to the Health Cluster. The USAID/DART reports that the cluster responds to an average of 35 requests daily for medicine and supplies from partners and health facilities. Health Cluster partners are currently working to restock the PROMESS facility, according to OCHA.
- On February 5, OCHA reported that the Health Cluster is in the process of deploying mobile health clinics to 250 GoH-identified spontaneous settlements to address health needs of affected populations and enhance surveillance mechanisms.
- As of February 5, the U.S. Military Joint Task Force–Haiti reported that DoD medical personnel had treated 3,950 patients since the earthquake response began, including 912 patients treated onboard U.S. ships and 3,038 patients treated on the ground in Haiti.

Early Recovery

- On February 6, USAID/OTI approved new cash-for-work projects, implemented through Development Alternatives Inc. (DAI), which are scheduled to begin on February 8 and provide income for nearly 160 people in Cité Soleil and Carrefour. The Carrefour project will employ individuals to clean a drainage canal to prevent flooding at a field hospital in the area.
- In addition, USAID/OTI implementing partner Chemonics has initiated cash-for-work activities in Canapé Vert neighborhood in Port-au-Prince, with five teams clearing debris from a collapsed school located at the center of the community. The project provides income to a total of 105 people on five teams.

U.S. GOVERNMENT (USG) HUMANITARIAN ASSISTANCE

- On January 13, U.S. Ambassador to Haiti Kenneth H. Merten declared a disaster due to the effects of the earthquake. To date, USAID has contributed nearly \$299 million in earthquake response funding, including nearly \$197 million from USAID/OFDA, \$68 million from USAID/FFP, \$20 million from USAID/OTI, more than \$11 million from USAID/Haiti, and \$3 million from USAID/DR. In total, the USG has contributed nearly \$467 million in earthquake response funding for Haiti to date.
- On January 12, USAID/OFDA activated a Washington, D.C.-based Response Management Team to support the USAID/DART that deployed to Haiti early on January 13 to assess humanitarian conditions and coordinate activities with the humanitarian community. The USAID/DART continues to assess humanitarian needs and identify emergency relief supplies for immediate delivery to Port-au-Prince and other earthquake-affected areas.

- As of February 2, DoD's estimated cost for the Haiti earthquake relief effort was nearly \$168.3 million. DoD has been supporting humanitarian efforts through transportation of USG personnel and relief commodities into Haiti, as well as provision of health and medical services.
