HAITI - Earthquake

KEY DEVELOPMENTS

- According to the Government of Haiti (GoH) Minister of the Interior, as of January 29, more than 482,000 people
 had departed Port-au-Prince for secondary cities, including at least 162,500 people displaced to Artibonite; 9,000
 people displaced to cities in the Central Plateau; 6,000 individuals displaced to Grand-Anse Department; and nearly
 240,000 individuals displaced to other locations.
- On January 30, the U.N. World Food Program (WFP), in collaboration with the GoH and the U.N. Stabilization Mission in Haiti (MINUSTAH), is launching a systematic food distribution system that aims to reach more than 2 million people in Port-au-Prince during the coming two weeks. Distributions of coupons to earthquake-affected populations in Port-au-Prince will commence on January 30 with food distribution at 16 fixed distribution points scheduled to begin January 31. WFP and non-governmental partners, including Agency for Technical Cooperation and Development, Adventist Development and Relief Agency (ADRA), CARE, Catholic Relief Services, GOAL, Samaritan's Purse, Save the Children, and World Vision, are distributing 25 kg rations of rice to female heads of households during the 15-day operation.
- On January 29, one flight with emergency relief commodities from USAID/OFDA warehouses arrived in Port-au-Prince carrying 310 rolls of plastic sheeting to benefit 15,500 people. USAID/OFDA-funded commodities continue to arrive in Haiti via air and sea and overland from the Dominican Republic.

CURRENT SITUATION

According to the U.N. World Heath Organization (WHO) and the Pan American Health Organization (PAHO), a
camp has been established in the town of Fond Parisien, West Department, along the Haiti-Dominican Republic
border to accommodate the repatriation of an estimated 14,000 Haitians who crossed the border following the
earthquake. WHO notes the need for additional humanitarian services at the site.

Emergency Food Assistance

- Since the earthquake, WFP has delivered the equivalent of more that 16 million meals to nearly 600,000 people. In addition, as part of daily mobile distributions, WFP has provided food support to 48 orphanages and hospitals.
- As of January 28, USAID implementing partner ACDI/VOCA had provided food assistance and relief commodity distributions to 15,401 beneficiaries in Côtes-de-Fer, Southeast Department, and Port-au-Prince. The U.S.

Military's Joint Task Force—Haiti and the Haitian National Police provided security at Port-au-Prince distribution locations on January 26, 27, and 28.

Shelter and Emergency Relief Supplies

- The GoH has agreed to the Emergency Shelter Cluster recommendation to limit settlement sites to a maximum of 10,000 people per site, according to the USAID/DART.
- The GoH and the Emergency Shelter Cluster have prioritized the acquisition of plastic sheeting, corrugated galvanized iron, timber, and other fastening fixtures as part of a strategy to provide emergency and transitional shelter to the greatest number of people in need prior to the commencement of the rainy season, according to the U.N. Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs (OCHA).
- On January 29, OCHA reported that exclusive use of plastic sheeting will be necessary at existing settlement sites
 such as Champs de Mars, Place Boyer, and Place Saint Pierre, where tent distributions are not feasible due to high
 population densities.

Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene (WASH)

- The WASH Cluster reached approximately 464,000 people with more than 2.3 million liters of water at 133 sites throughout Port-au-Prince on January 28, according to the U.N. Children's Fund (UNICEF). In addition, the distribution of water to orphanages commenced on January 29.
- UNICEF currently has 24,000 latrine slabs scheduled to arrive in Haiti as part of WASH response efforts, including 1,200 slabs scheduled to arrive in-country by January 30 and the remainder to arrive in regular shipments during the coming weeks, the USAID/DART reports. The figure represents an addition to the 1,000 latrine slabs already in-country.
- To address constraints to latrine construction, including rocky ground, high groundwater levels, concrete surfaces, and sensitive public locations, USAID/DART staff report that the WASH Cluster is reviewing alternative designs, including plans to use surface tanks, which would require sewage pumping capacity for maintenance. The WASH Cluster is working to identify sewage pumping capacity within Port-au-Prince and in the Dominican Republic and is investigating purchase of additional trucks from the private sector.
- USAID/DART staff report that ADRA planned to complete the construction of 60 latrines in Carrefour by January 29. In addition, relief agency Oxfam has initiated latrine construction in Pétion-Ville. USAID/DART staff note that significantly increased latrine provision is required to address sanitation needs in affected areas and spontaneous settlements.

Health

- Medical teams have reported that the number of patients with mental health needs continues to rise while presentation of trauma cases has decreased, according to WHO and PAHO.
- According to OCHA, health workers have determined that previously reported measles cases were instead
 confirmed as chicken pox cases. The GoH Ministry of Health (MoH), with the support of PAHO, WHO, and
 UNICEF are launching an emergency response campaign for immunizations starting the week of January 31 in
 earthquake-affected areas.
- In response to the need for additional beds for incoming patients on the USNS COMFORT, USAID/OFDA is funding the purchase of a federal medical station (FMS) valued at \$455,000 from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS), according to the USAID/DART. Treated patients will be relocated from the USNS COMFORT to the FMS for post-operative care. The FMS provides beds, supplies, and medicines for up to 250 patients and is expected to arrive in Port-au-Prince within the coming 48 hours. USAID/Haiti will provide additional support, including staff, tents, generators, and water and sanitation services, for the facility.
- As of 0300 hours local time on January 29, DoD had provided medical care for 2,116 patients and performed 358 surgeries since the start of earthquake response efforts in Haiti. HHS has reported seeing a total of 20,837 individuals as of late January 29.

Nutrition

• The Nutrition Cluster estimates that approximately 480,000 children under five years of age, at least 120,000 pregnant women, an estimated 120,000 lactating women, and approximately 50,000 non-breastfed infants require nutritional support. USAID/OFDA, in collaboration with UNICEF and the Nutrition Cluster, is procuring limited supplies of ready-to-use, liquid infant formula for targeted and controlled distribution to infants.

U.S. GOVERNMENT (USG) HUMANITARIAN ASSISTANCE

• On January 13, U.S Ambassador to Haiti Kenneth H. Merten declared a disaster due to the effects of the earthquake. To date, USAID has contributed more than \$272 million in earthquake response funding, including more than \$172 million from USAID/OFDA, \$68 million from USAID/FFP, \$20 million from USAID/OTI, more

- than \$11 million from USAID/Haiti, and \$1 million from USAID/DR. In total, the USG has contributed more than \$401 million in earthquake response funding for Haiti to date.
- On January 12, USAID/OFDA activated a Washington, D.C.-based Response Management Team to support the
 USAID/DART that deployed to Haiti early on January 13 to assess humanitarian conditions and coordinate
 activities with the humanitarian community. The 34-member USAID/DART continues to assess priority
 humanitarian needs and identify emergency relief supplies for immediate delivery to Port-au-Prince and other
 earthquake-affected areas.
- As of January 28, DoD's estimated cost for the Haiti earthquake relief effort was \$129.3 million. DoD has been supporting humanitarian efforts through transportation of emergency relief personnel and commodities into Haiti.
