1. OVERVIEW

This report describes the progress of the Periperi U Consortium of Universities from 01 July - 31 September 2019, as required in terms of USAID Agreement AID-OFDA¹-G-16-00115. It describes the consortium's progress with specific reference to the eight key focus areas of the Periperi U programme. These eight key focus areas fall within two sub-sectors, namely:

Sub-sector 1: Global advocacy and engagement in disaster risk reduction (DRR) – focus on higher education

- Focus Area 1: Strategic advocacy to define higher education as a crucial player in DRR education, capacity building and research, reframing Higher Education Institutions (HEI) engagement from its current peripheral, implicit and under-utilised position
- Focus Area 2: Identification and mobilisation of funding mechanisms for both developing country HEIs to advance DRR education and research and for students (especially women)
- Focus Area 3: Promotion of disaster risk (DR)-related education and research as legitimate domains in contemporary scholarship in Africa

Sub-sector 2: Integration/Enhancement of DRR within Education and Research Programmes

- Focus Area 1: Institutional effectiveness, maturation and sustainability of the Periperi U partnership including stability of funding arrangements
- **Focus Area 2:** Strategic scaling-up of DRM/DRR educational activities across Africa to extend capacity-building, technical support and DR research services
- Focus Area 3: Institutional embedding of active DRR scholarship in each partner including sustainability of staffing and financing
- Focus Area 4: Establishment and/or enhancement of core DR activities in each partner, including academic programmes, short courses, risk research and community outreach at local/national scales to advance understanding risk and DR governance as well as strengthen preparedness and resilience-building.
- **Focus Area 5:** Strategic engagement by each partner to advance robust DRM policy and practice from local to global scales

During this reporting period, 220 staff contributed to research, teaching, research and/or administrative activities across the consortium. 1 231 students were enrolled across 20 academic programmes, 16 modules and three courses across the 12 partner universities. Five short courses were hosted by three partners and attended by a total of 78 people. Periperi U partners also attended and engaged in 16 strategic and technical meetings held at international, regional, national and local levels, attended by an estimated 1144 people. Tables appended at the end of this report also provide details on activities undertaken by individual partners from 01 July - 30 September 2019.

2. SUB-SECTOR 1: Global advocacy and engagement in DRR – focus on higher education

As reported in the previous quarterly report, in May 2019, several Periperi U staff were selected to become members of the newly established African Science and Technology Advisory Group (A-STAG) and the Africa Youth Advisory Board on Disaster Risk Reduction (AYAB - DRR) for the implementation of the DRR in Africa (see table 1 below).

These staff attended a second three-day meeting of Af-STAG and AYAB-DRR in Addis Ababa Ethiopia between 16 - 18 and 19 - 21 September 2019 respectively. The event was a joint training workshop on DRR terminology, themes and governance, as well as meeting to discuss and deliberate on their constitution, action plans and strategic activities of each two groups until 2022. At the time of reporting, both groups are currently formulating their Sendai Framework Voluntary Commitments, which will be made publicly available on the United Nations Office for Disaster Risk Reduction (UNDRR) website²

During her visit to Mozambique to view the devastation caused by recent cyclones earlier in the year, Mami Mizutori, the director of UNDRR accompanied by Amjad Abbashar, Chief Office of UNDRR Regional Office for Africa. visited UDM to deliver a lecture on Implementation of Sendai Framework for Disaster Risk Reduction to **UDM** and Universidade Eduardo Mondlane students.

3. SUB-SECTOR 2: Integration/Enhancement of DRR within education and research programmes

3.1 Focus Area 1: Institutional effectiveness, maturation and sustainability of the Periperi U partnership including stability of funding arrangements

Overall consortium staffing remained largely unchanged from the previous quarter, with 220 teaching/research/ support staff (including 66 women, 30% of those engaged). However individual partners such as **UDM** saw a significant decrease in staff levels this quarter as they brought on no contributing staff, reducing their overall contingent from 17 to four. Conversely **Makerere** experienced an increase in staff from 33 to 43 staff. A breakdown of staffing, including category and gender of each of the partners, is available in table 2 in the appendices.

3.2 Focus Area 2: Strategic scaling-up of DRM/DRR educational activities across Africa to extend capacity-building, technical support & DR research services

During this quarter the Secretariat/**SU** continued to collaborate with the World Bank on two projects focused on enhancing DR related education, research and capacity building, which included;

- 1. Assisting to facilitate and teach into the 'Disaster Risk Finance Capacity Building Program for Africa' which was hosted in Stellenbosch South Africa between 2 6 September. The workshop was attended by 32 participants who included senior officials from Ministries of Finance from across the African continent.
- 2. Strengthening the DRR Coordination Planning and Policy Advisory Capacity of the Southern African Development Community' project, which seeks to facilitate action research related to regional DRR policies in Southern Africa and support capacity building for regional experts, media, legislature, civil society organizations and the private sector to better contribute in the implementation of DRR activities in the Southern Africa. This projected is a collaborative project between partners based at ARU, Tanà, UDM, the National University of Science and Technology (NUST) in Zimbabwe and the Malawi University of Science and Technology (MUST) and the AU/NEPAD Southern African Network of Water Centres of Excellence (NEPAD SANWATCE).

From 1 - 20 July 2019 **Makerere** collaborated with Boston University to implement a summer school titled "Humanitarian Engineering and Refugees Studies Design Solution for Health Challenges in Protracted Crises" in Kampala, Uganda. Students and staff from various fields, science, social science, psychology, biomedical engineering at Boston University interacted with Students from **Makerere's** Undergraduate degree in Biomedical Engineering as well as their masters in Disaster management students. The school was designed to provide students in the health sciences both theoretical and field experience understanding of the health challenges for refugees in Uganda and across Africa.

Throughout the quarter, **SU** and **BDU** have been working together to organise a second African Risk Methods School (ARMS 2), which is being funded by UNESCO to be taught from 28 October – 1 November³. Throughout this quarter, partners have been establishing contract with UNESCO, organising travel and venue logistics and developing curriculum for the ARMS 2 courses. ARMS 2 will offer one compulsory two-day course on 'Integrated Disaster Risk Reduction Science & Action', then participants will have the option to attend one of two courses, either 'Urban Geophysical Risks' or 'Urban Hydrological Risks'. Figure 2 provides a visual depiction of the layout of the courses.

3.3 Focus Area 3: Institutional embedding of active DRR scholarship in each partner including sustainability of staffing and financing

Several partners are working together with the World Food Program to implement the Integrated Context Analysis (ICA) of the Three-Pronged Approach (3PA) in their respective countries. During this quarter, staff from several participating partners underwent training in order to be taught how to correctly and effectively implement the 3PA according to WFP standards. Two staff from **ARU** attended a practical training on the 3PA organized by **Makerere** University and the WFP country office from 12-16 August 2019 in Moroto district, Karamoja region in Uganda. Five staff from **Tanà** received GIS capacity building training with 10 other focal points of the WFP's 3PA programme in Antananarivo.

Between 12 – 14 September, staff from **UDM** participated in the seminar on DesInventar Sendai with other DRR stakeholders from within Mozambique. The seminar included training on how on how to complete disaster tickets on the DesInventar Sendai database, an Information Management System that is a sustainable arrangement for the systematic collection, documentation and analysis of data about losses caused by disasters associated with natural hazards.

3.4 Focus Area 4: Establishment and/or enhancement of core DR activities in each partner, including academic programmes, short courses, risk research and community outreach.

3.4.1 Academic Programmes

Consortium-wide enrolment

During this reporting period, 1,231 students (including 432 women, 35.1% of those enrolled) were enrolled in 20 academic programmes and 16 modules across the 12 Periperi U universities. Most students are continuing their studies from the previous quarter, while **Makerere** saw 13 new students enter their Masters of Public Health, and **ABU** seeing 20 of their students graduating during this quarter.

Developing and restructuring curricula

ARU has had the curriculum two of its Master of Science in Disaster Risk Management (MSc. DRM) and Master of Disaster Risk Management (MDRM) under review. Unfortunately, due to delays in the approval process and accreditation by the Tanzania Commission for Universities (TCU), the proposed master's curriculums under review will not be implemented for the 2019-2020 academic year. However, the original curriculum will be re-implemented for this upcoming academic year, with reviewed curriculum being rolled out for the 2020-2021 academic year.

The BDU staff have received approval from the university senate for the development of a new MSc course on 'livelihood and food security'. After receiving feedback from Periperi U Partners as well as by external academic reviewers at a curriculum workshop, **BDU** submitted their proposed PhD Curriculum on Disaster Risk Science for approval from the university's curriculum mandate committee. It is expected they will receive feedback from the committee in the next quarter.

Makerere held several meetings with university staff and greater stakeholders involved in DRR research and practice to review the curriculum for the Master of Public Health disaster Management. During this quarter, a revised curriculum was submitted to the academic board at Makerere university for approval before it is forwarded to the University Council for review and final approval.

UDM were successful in meeting the necessary criteria, for its BSc Course on 'Environmental Engineering and DRM', required by the Ministry of Science and Technology, Higher Education and Technical Professional (MCTESTP) Training's National Quality Assessment Council, for their course to be renewed for the 2020 academic year, thereby allowing it to be implemented for another two years before needing to be renewed again.

Internships and student funding

UBuea have been scouting for internship opportunities to place their master's students in the following quarter. During the internships, students are expected to develop research topics for their thesis as well as begin to undertake research whilst working.

3.4.2 Short Courses and Training

During this quarter, five short courses were implemented by the partners, three of which delivered by BDU. In total, 78 people attended these courses, of which 46.2% were women.

From 19 - 23 August **ABU** organized a workshop on DRR for 12 staff of the National Emergency Management Agency (NEMA), Abuja on the theme "Mainstreaming Disaster Risk Reduction (DRR) and Climate Change Adaptation (CCA) into Development Process".

Simultaneously, **ARU** in collaboration with WFP offices in Tanzania organized two 3PA training workshops at Vocational Education Training Authority (VETA), Dodoma. These two training workshops took place in Bahi and Kongwa Districts in Dodoma Region with 34 and 28 participants attending respectively. A second workshop was hosted in Dodoma City from 26-30 August 2019 involving 33 participants drawn from the government institutions working in the districts/city, community representatives from different socio-economic groups, Non-governmental institutions, private sector and religious institutions.

BDU conducted three one-week fire risk management training courses during this quarter. The first group was conducted for a group of 21 undergrad and postgraduate students, the second for local disaster management personnel in Bahir Dar, and the third group for safety officers of the East Africa Coca-Cola Bottling Company.

Moi were planning to run a short course on Community Based Disaster Risk Reduction (CBDRR) for the local administration - chiefs and sub chiefs in the region, however due to limited funds they were unable to host it.

UDM hosted a Workshop to provide a follow-up on flood forecasting to some hydro-meteorologists who participated in a 1-month placement at the University of Reading in July 2019. Participants from ARA-Sul (Regional Water Management institution) joined the group and found it useful. **UDM** had also planned a short course on Industrial Safety, however the course was cancelled due to insufficient number of applicants to warrant the cost of implementing it.

3.4.3 Risk research and Publications

PPU staff research and Publications

In September **ABU's** Centre for Disaster Risk Management and Development Studies launched their own Journal of Disaster Risk Reduction. Unfortunately, the ABU team did not provide any other information concerning the launch of this new journal.

Partners based at **ARU**, **BDU**, **Makerere** and **Tanà** have been collaborating with the World Food Programme (WFP) during this quarter to conduct pilot studies of implementation of their adapted version of the Three-Pronged Approach (3PA) to assess vulnerability and resilience within urban, displaced and refugee settings in their respective countries. **Makerere** are continuing to roll out the 3PA project to various urban and rural districts. This will include broader engagements to develop the capacity of district authorities to use the products of the 3PA process.

Makerere, **SU** and **UDM**, in collaboration with the University of Reading, have been conducting the 'Forecasts for Anticipatory Humanitarian Action" (FATHUM) 2017-2020 Research Project' which focuses on the prospect on implementing forecast-based financing (FbF) within their respective countries to reduce risk.

Tanà concluded their analysis of data on microfinance, social protection and resilience within the Toamasina and Brickaville districts in Madagascar. From this research, the **Tanà** team plans to write several journal articles and respond to conferences call of papers from this research.

In the previous quarter, **UBuea** set a team of water experts to in response to conduct an analysis for contamination and pollutants in Limbe Cameroon after an explosion that took place at a local oil refinery. During this quarter the results from the samples taken during the analysis showed no chemicals or pollutants from the accident which could have contaminated the local water sources and deemed there was no danger of hazardous pollutants.

Student Research

During this quarter over 348 student theses were being undertaken across the consortium. A brief illustrative list of student theses and research projects are available in table 9. On 21 September 165 Masters and PGD students from **ABU** participated in fieldwork among local communities examining their levels of vulnerability to hazards, analysing their resilience against disaster events as well as local Emergency Preparedness Response.

3.4.4 Community Outreach

UDM staff participated in a round table with UK HEIs and Mozambique DRM, Water Management and Meteorological institutions took place to assess local needs in terms of forecasts and showcase the possibilities of collaboration in the areas of hydrology and meteorology.

Between 17 – 19 July the **UG** Project Coordinator served as a consultant for National Disaster Management Organisation (NADMO) during this quarter, attending several community sensitization workshops in Accra Metropolis Ashaiman Municipality, Adenta Municipality and Ga East (Abokobi). UG estimates that these workshops reached over 1000 community members over the three days.

3.5 Focus Area 5: Strategic and Technical engagement by each partner to advance robust DRM policy

During this reporting period, Periperi U consortium members engaged with a variety of stakeholders across multiple scales. Opportunities for these engagements were created at various events including meetings, conferences and technical workshops. Partners reported attending 9 strategic and 18 technical engagements each with an estimated 530 and 614 participants respectively. Details of all strategic and technical engagements undertaken by partners during this quarter is available in tables 10 and 11 respectively, in the appendices

3.5.1 International engagements

From 26 – 27 September Makerere staff attended and participated at the in a conference at Boston University (Boston, MA, USA) titled 'The Role of the University in the Crisis of Forced Displacement: Ethics, Innovation and Immersive Learning".

3.5.2 Continental/Regional engagements

On 11 July, **BDU** staff member and Af-STAG secretary attended a data collection workshop for the development of the Biennial on the programme of action for the implementation of the Sendai Framework for Disaster Risk Reduction (2015-2030) in Africa, organized by AUC in Mombasa, Kenya. From 12 – 26 August the same staff member also attended a 'Seasonal Livelihoods Programming' (SLP) learning session held in Moroto, Uganda by the WFP.

A staff member of **Tanà**, and member of the AYAB DRR was invited to participate in the 'Southern Africa Region for the Data Collection Workshop' for the bi-annual report on the programme of action for the implementation of the Sendai Framework for disaster risk reduction (2015-2030) in Africa.

From 14 – 16 September **UDM** hosted the Forecasts for Anticipatory Humanitarian Action Research Meeting (FATHUM) annual meeting. Rrepresentatives from **Makerere** and Redding University attended the event to showcase latest research and progress on the FATHUM project. The representative from the **SU** FATHUM research team was unfortunately unable to attend due to unforeseen circumstances.

3.5.3 National and local level engagements

On 2 September 2019, **ABU** staff was invited by NEMA to attend a meeting focussed on deliberating on how to mainstream the Nigerian Meteorological Institutes (NIMET) research and data on seasonal rain prediction into DRR.

From 21 - 23 August two **Tanà** staff members participated in a workshop organised by the Cellule de Prévention et Gestion des Urgences (CPGU)⁴. The meeting focused on updating the African Risk View software parameters by considering new data and new research results to establish the risk profile of drought in Madagascar.

On 29 August, **UBuea** assisted in hosting a technical meeting was held on "The design and enforcement of an earthquake building code and building regulations for the councils within the Mount Cameroon Area". The meeting brought together 35 experts from the engineering, architectural, scientific, regional and local administrators to finalize and approve the designed building code for the region. It is expected that the building code will be officially launched in October 2019.

3.5.4 Periperi U Annual Consultative Meeting

Between 30 July – 2 August, **Tanà** hosted the Periperi U Annual Consultative Meeting (ACM) in Antananarivo Madagascar and attended by representatives of 11 of the Periperi partners.

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Unfortunately, the representative of ABU was unable to attend due to missing his flight to Madagascar.

The ACM was opened by the director of the **Tanà** team, as well as her Excellency Prof. Blanche Nirina Richard, the Minister of Higher Education, Scientific Research and Innovation of Madagascar. The ACM agenda was divided into three segments over four days; The first two days of the ACM were open to external stakeholders who were invited to learn more about the partners, identify synergies and discuss strategies and approaches that advance capacity building and skill development in the field of DRR. These first two days were attended by a number of high-level delegates and representatives from government departments, disaster risk related agencies and international and local NGOs based in Madagascar, showcasing the interest and commitment to disaster risk within the country.

The third day, the Periperi U partners went on a field excursion to the outskirts of Antananarivo to observe risks faced by local communities. The fourth and final day was reserved for internal consortium matters including reflections on the earlier external meetings, a report from each of the partners of their activities, accomplishments as well as discussing challenges and obstacles faced. The internal meeting also focussed on discussion concerning the final USAID close-out which is to be completed by end of November 2019.

4. SECRETARIAT REPORT

4.1 Operational Support

The secretariat's operational support included assistance for the day-to-day running of the consortium, including financial management, assisting in travel logistics for major strategic engagements as well as data capturing and reporting of partner activities to USAID.

4.2 Preparatory work towards forthcoming engagements, training and evaluation

The secretariat coordinated travel arrangements and logistics for events such as the Periperi U ACM held between 30 July – 2 August 2019 in Antananarivo Madagascar. Preparations for the ACM included booking of flights, accommodation and visa letters for representatives from each of the partners, as well as a meeting venue for an internal meeting for the partners. During this period the secretariat is organising travel arrangements and logistics for upcoming events such as for ARMS 2 from 28 October – 1 November 2019

4.3 Periperi U Online Platforms

During this reporting period, the number of searches performed on the Online Resource Centre (ORC) increased between July and September from 377,898 to 507,163 searches. However, PDF views saw a slight decrease between July and September from 20,099 to 18,523 views. Overall, this quarter had 1,324,241 searches performed and 57,385 views, with an average of 14 393.9 searches and 623.8 PDF views per day respectively.

In addition to the ORC, the secretariat continued to manage and update the www.riskreductionafrica.org website and its Facebook page to ensure a strong online presence. In January and February, the partners were called upon to review the website and provide updated information of their individual partner pages and academic activities where need be. These platforms provide information on each of the partner's academic programmes, advertise short courses as well as report on consortium related events and news.

5. PROBLEMS AND OBSTACLES REPORTED

This reporting period took place when many of the partners were on their mid-year break or before the beginning of a new academic year so activities of most partners were more limited than in previous quarters

Both **Makerere** and **UG** stated that they have been experiencing challenges of their graduate students not completing their dissertations timeously, as well as not publishing their dissertation research projects in peer review journals. In response the partners have collaborated with their respective university administrations have been making efforts to organise writing workshops to enable students not only write their dissertations but also publish manuscripts in peer reviewed journals.

UBuea stated that due to limitations to funding for their academic programmes, there are contemplating whether to postponing the start of their second class of master's students for the upcoming year, instead waiting for the current class of Masters students (who began in January 2019) to complete the programme before admitting new students. In that case, all those who applied and will be admitted by the Admissions Board of the University, their admissions will be deferred to the 2020/2021 academic year.

Moi also cited limited funding as the cause for them to be unable to fund their proposed CRA short course programme and research projecting the county. They have been seeking alternatives from the public and private sector to assist with funding but with limited success. **UDM** had issues launching a proposed short course on Industrial Safety but was unable to implement it due to insufficient interest.

UDM also had similar issues concerning enrolments for students in their academic programmes, in which they one had one new student enrol in contrast with the expected 70 new students that had envisioned. **UDM** stated that the course was losing popularity at their university due to new courses focussed on engineering related to oil and gas exploration and refining launched at their university.

6. HIGHLIGHTS AND PLANS GOING FORWARD

The Periperi U partnership will participate in several major events next quarter. These include:

- Makerere will hold the short course on 'Public Health in Complex Emergencies' which is expected to run between 4 9 November in Kampala, with participants coming from across the continent to attend.
- **SU** and **BDU** in cooperation with UNESCO will implement the second African Risk Methods School (ARMS) from 28 October 1 November in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia
- **USTHB** will participate in the National delegation for Major Risks and the UNDRR Arab Bureau in Cairo in Algiers to discuss the elaboration of the Algerian National Strategy for DRR.
- Several partners will see the end of their academic year with exams and graduations taking place.
