Introduction

The seven-year Bangladesh Counter Trafficking-in-Persons (BC/TIP) Program, funded by the U.S. Agency for International Development (USAID) and implemented by Winrock International, works in up to 20 trafficking-prone districts to address the trafficking problem. BC/TIP provides robust interventions in all four USAID areas of emphasis (Prevention, Protection, Prosecution, and Partnership), as well as in Child Marriage. The project connects local and national government representatives, non-governmental organizations, citizens, and community leaders to prevent trafficking-in-persons (TIP). The project also works to protect survivors and reverse the damage done to them; prosecute perpetrators; prevent child marriage; and engage all levels of society as change agents in curbing TIP.

The purpose of this report is to outline project achievements and activities undertaken in Quarter 3, Year 6 (April 2020 – June 2020). The report includes information on the current situation in Bangladesh and the challenges addressed by the BC/TIP project. The report also identifies priority tasks for the upcoming quarter.

The report demonstrates BC/TIP's contingency planning with the impact of COVID-19 pandemic that allowed limited stakeholders to continue to be involved in the implementation of project activities. For example, the team adapted by rapidly developing a comprehensive contingency plan aimed at maintaining project continuity, including the provision of some activities in Cox's Bazar under a redirection program to save people at-risk, victims, and survivors of TIP from further vulnerability during the pandemic.

During the reporting period, which was heavily impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic, the project-maintained communication with volunteer groups Peer Leaders, ANIRBAN, and the network of CTCs, enabling the delivery of emergency support to vulnerable people. The project also organized important trainings focused on counseling, legal aid, and laws preventing child marriage, using online resources and tools.

Executive Summary

This quarter, the Bangladesh Counter Trafficking-In-Persons (BC/TIP) program made significant efforts to keep continuity of implementation of the project activities as well as achieve results, despite being impacted heavily by COVID-19 pandemic. BC/TIP was aware that in such a

difficult situation, people would become susceptible to trafficking and child marriage and a more careful approach would be needed to address these issues. Accordingly, the project adapted a changed approach and made volunteer networks (such as peer leaders, ANIRBAN, and CTCs) more active and effective in reducing the vulnerability of people at risk as well as victims and survivors of TIP and child marriage (CM). At the same time, the project continued its support to protect the victims and survivors of TIP and CM by providing them with shelter home-based support.

The BC/TIP prevention component mobilized communities to prevent trafficking incidents and linked people at risk of trafficking to service providers with support from peer leaders, ANIRBAN and members of CTC. The project motivated these groups either by providing them with training or by maintaining constant communication using online tools and resources ensuing proactive role played by these groups that helped prevent the incidents of TIP and CM in the project area.

The BC/TIP protection component continued its efforts to provide holistic assistance to survivors of human trafficking. The project also carried out activities to increase the capacity of service providers, especially to address the psychosocial impacts. The project provided training to relevant service providers both from government and NGO sectors and continued its work to further strengthen the capacity of ANIRBAN as a platform with its distinctive voice and a unique space where survivors can spearhead efforts to improve themselves.

The BC/TIP program built the capacity of justice sector actors to contribute to the prosecution of traffickers using online mechanisms during the COVID-19 pandemic. Despite some difficulties, the project continued communication with justice sector actors including high officials within police, judges, and panel lawyers to highlight the importance of prosecution of human trafficking cases. After the brutal murder of 26 Bangladeshi people in Libya, the project's panel lawyers helped some of the victims' families to file cases and currently following up those for speedy resolution of the cases.

The project continued developing partnership with different government and private organizations. Partnerships with health centers have been established to provide health care support to TIP victims and survivors. BC/TIP also works with Liberty Shared to identify trafficking gangs and to take immediate actions against them.

The BC/TIP's Cox's Bazar program continued engaging with local level stakeholders and employing a coordinated approach to survivor services to prevent TIP. It also continued protection services to people at-risk, victims and survivors of TIP and CM through the provision of three safe spaces in Ukhia and Teknaf. The project continued its collaboration with UN agencies and other national and international stakeholders to effectively address the issues of TIP, CM and Gender Based Violence. In the COVID-19 pandemic situation, BC/TIP redirected part of its program activities and funding to provide support to vulnerable families of people at-risk, victims and survivors of trafficking and child marriage.

By the Numbers

Prevention

- **155 peer leaders** participated in 10 planning, review and coordination meetings during COVID-19 pandemic.
- **BDT 216,000** raised in funding and 357 vulnerable families supported by Peer Leaders.
- **353 CTC members** participated in 19 follow-up meetings organized to strengthen the functionality of CTC.
- **6,000,000 people** (approximately) were made aware of TIP and safe migration through community radio programs.

Protection

- **523 services** provided to survivors. This support included life skills training for 37 survivors and entrepreneurship training for 30 survivors.
- **ANIRBAN referred 33 TIP survivors** for comprehensive support; ensured Covid- 19 support for 610 people at-risk and survivors of TIP and CM; and 592 people received awareness-raising-information on human trafficking, safe migration, and child marriage issues.

Prosecution

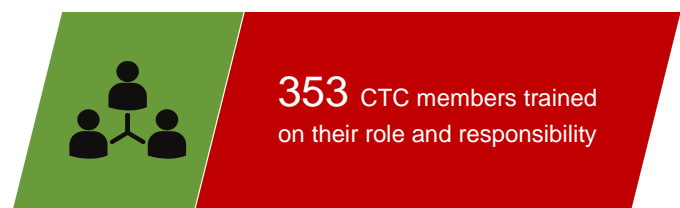
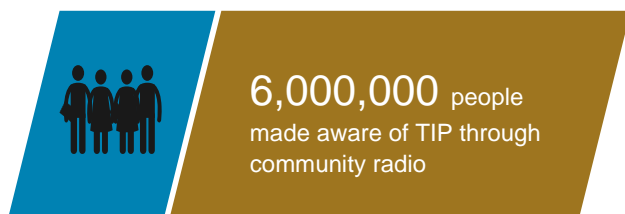
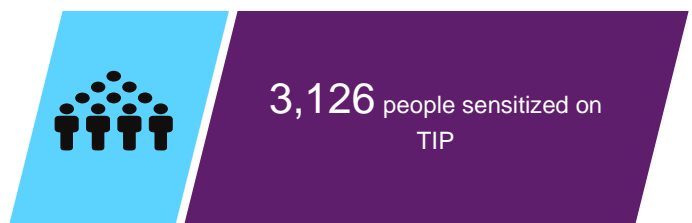
- **19 justice sector actors (F-8, M-11)** received training in “Trafficking in Persons and Protection of Victims’ Rights in Bangladesh” and became sensitized about their role and responsibility as District Legal Aid Panel Lawyers.
- **25 survivors** received direct legal support from the program; BC/TIP also filed 22 legal cases and 3 BMET cases; the program followed up 47 legal and 35 BMET cases to ensure justice.
- **42 group/individual online meeting** conducted with stakeholders to strengthen the referral mechanism.

Child Marriage

- **464 duty bearers** including marriage registrars and locally elected representatives received orientation on CM issues to prevent child marriage.
- **5,488 community members** became aware of the impact of the child marriage on the lives of the victims and engaged themselves in preventing child marriage.
- **91 persons at-risk** and **21 victims** of CM have been identified. The project provided them with shelter home services and linked them to relevant service providing organizations.

Cox’s Bazar

- **550,000 persons** from the Rohingya population and host community in Teknaf and Ukhaia became aware of TIP, safe migration and GBV through community radio.



IR 1: Prevention

The BC/TIP prevention component focuses on enhancing the capacity of target communities to identify and prevent TIP incidents. It builds the capacity of local government institutions that in turn prevent TIP incidents and refer people at-risk, victims, and survivors of TIP to appropriate service providers. BC/TIP works to empower and equip communities with tools and innovative methods and mobilizes them to prevent TIP. These activities allow the relevant players to identify and address the root causes of TIP, GBV, child marriage and unsafe migration.

Strategically, BC/TIP's prevention component works in six core areas: i) strengthening peer leader volunteer groups; ii) enhancing the capacity of communities to identify and address the root causes of TIP; iii) orienting potential migrants on safe, informed and orderly migration and TIP related risks and vulnerabilities associated with migration; iv) strengthening CTCs at various levels; v) sensitizing incumbent government counterparts, private TTCs, and other service providers to combat TIP and promote safe and orderly practices of labor migration; and vi) availing support and services for the people at-risk, victims and survivors of TIP.

STRENGTHENED COMMUNITY CAPACITIES TO IDENTIFY AND PREVENT TIP

Peer Leaders Follow Up and Coordination Meetings

In Quarter 3 of Year 6 (Q3Y6), BC/TIP's sub-grantee Proyas, RDRS, Rights Jessore, Agrogoti Sangstha and BITA organized 10 planning, follow up, and coordination meetings to reinvigorate the activities of peer leaders. A total of 155 peer leaders (F-73, M-82) participated in these meetings. The meetings developed leadership and facilitation skills and mobilized peer leaders to increase their efforts at the community levels in preventing TIP, which resulted in identifying 129 people at-risk for trafficking.

The BC/TIP prevention component includes peer leaders' community awareness activities, identification of people at risk and victims of TIP, mobilizing CTCs, and referral activities providing support and services for victims and those at risk. Peer leaders exchanged lessons learned, challenges, and the way forward. In Q3 of Y6, Peer leaders identified 129 people at-risk for TIP and referred them to various service organizations. Additionally, they raised BDT 216,000 in

funds and supported 357 vulnerable families and people at-risk of TIP during the COVID pandemic. These activities assisted the project to achieve key targets and results.

Enrollment of People at Risk for TIP

During the reporting period of Y6, BC/TIP's sub-grantees Proyas, RDRS, Rights Jessore, Agrogoti Sangstha and BITA identified 163 people (F- 56, M-107) who were at risk of TIP.

The identification of at-risk people by peer leaders, members of CTCs, members of ANIRBAN contributed towards reducing the incidents of trafficking in the areas where BC/TIP works.

It is one of the prime objectives of the project to identify people at-risk and victims of trafficking and to refer them to service providers. This activity helped enhance the socio-economic standards and well-being of all the people at risk for TIP and at the same time, victims of TIP received comprehensive support/services enabling them to be reintegrated into society with self-respect and dignity. For example, 36 of the identified people at risk for TIP received Vulnerable Group Development (VGD) and Vulnerable Group Feeding (VGF) services from the government's safety-net programs.

CTC Follow-up Meetings

In Q3 of Y6, BC/TIP (through its sub-grantees) organized 19 follow-up meetings to strengthen the functionality of CTCs. A total of 353 CTC members (F- 116, M- 237) participated in these meetings.

These meetings enhanced the capacity of CTC members to work at the community levels to prevent TIP episodes and to protect people at-risk and victims of TIP as well as to refer them to services in accordance with the instructions of the National Plan of Action for Prevention and Suppression of Human Trafficking 2018 - 2022.

Capacity building of local institutions is another key component of the project. To achieve this goal, BC/TIP sub-grantees organized meetings enhancing the capacity of CTC members to combat human trafficking at the community level. CTC members identified 786 at-risk persons, victims and survivors of TIP and linked them to government safety net programs and relief support during the COVID-19 pandemic. Furthermore, advocacy during the meetings resulted in the Union Parishad's allocation of resources from their own budgets to the CTCs to implement their regular activities.

Cox's Bazar

Capacity Building Training for Peer Leaders

In Q3 of Y6, BC/TIP subgrantee BITA conducted one training session for capacity building of peer leaders, enabling them to effectively fight against TIP, CM and GBV. A total of 20 (M-15, and F-5) peer leaders attended the training. Peer Leaders who receiving the training were better equipped with knowledge and skills to play a proactive and effective role in preventing human trafficking, promoting safe migration, preventing child marriage, and GBV, improving connectivity with service providers and extending services to people at-risk and survivors of TIP and CM in their communities.

Stakeholder engagement is one strategic entry point to address the gaps in support of victims and people at-risk of trafficking and child marriage. Peer leaders work as stewards in the promotion of safe migration and reducing stigma, which empowers survivors. In Q3 of Y6, peer leaders collected a total of BDT 25,000 to support 60 vulnerable families, contributing their own funds and providing *iftar* items to poor families in their communities amid the COVID-19 pandemic. They visited 50 families disseminating awareness messages on COVID-19 on EID day. They maintained communication with the local administration so that extremely poor people within their communities could be enlisted and receive support under the Government safety net programs during the COVID-19 situation.

Mobilizing CTCs at different levels

In Q3 of Y6, BC/TIP's sub-grantee YPSA organized three CTC mobilization meetings for 51 CTC members (M-41 and F-10). The CTC members at the unions and upazila levels prepared their action plans, focused on raising awareness and monitoring TIP and safe migration in their communities, and provided critical support to people at risk and victims of TIP and CM based on their needs.

One of the important strategic entry points of the BC/TIP project is to engage local level stakeholders and employ a coordinated approach to survivor services to prevent TIP. A priority of this includes the CTCs since they are the most effective key actors in reaching groups at-risk or victims of TIP and in mobilizing their communities to promote safe

migration, reduce stigma, and empower survivors. In Q3 of Y6, CTC members identified 15 persons at-risk of CM and 7 TIP victims.

Community radio continues information dissemination on TIP, Safe migration, Child Marriage, and GBV

The BC/TIP program – in association with radio ACLAB – disseminated public service announcements (PSAs) in cooperation with NAF community radio. The PSAs focused on human trafficking, safe migration, and gender-based violence (GBV) and reached an audience of 550,000 (M-200,000, and F-350,000) from host communities and the Rohingya populations in Ukhia and Teknaf Upazila.

The PSAs were broadcast in the Chittagoinian language, improving awareness and understanding of TIP, safe migration, and GBV of the local community and the Rohingya population living in refugee camps. Community radio is an effective media reaching host communities and Rohingya populations living in camps. The radio content is proven an effective strategy to create awareness and in engaging large populations in the fight against TIP and GBV in a creative way.

IR 2: Protection

The BC/TIP protection component provides comprehensive assistance to survivors. Support includes shelter services, an inclusive referral mechanism, survivor leadership development, and community-based reintegration support.

BC/TIP firmly believes all protection services should be victim/survivor centered and trafficking victims offered high-quality individualized assistance that supports them in regaining control of their lives and empowers them to make informed decisions about the options available to them. BC/TIP ensures the following support services are available to victims of trafficking:

- Provision of shelter accommodation.
- Immediate health care assessment and treatment.
- Psychological assessment and counseling.
- Interpretation of procedures in the first language of the victim.
- Legal advice and support.
- Livelihoods support and social reintegration.

IMPROVED ACCESS OF TRAFFICKING VICTIMS TO ASSISTANCE

Comprehensive Support for TIP victims and survivors

In Q3 of Y6, BC/TIP protection sub-grantees enrolled and supported 81 victims of trafficking (F-23, M-58). The program provided 523 services to survivors.

Loan support through referral mechanisms provided a total of 22 survivors with 335,000 BDT from different service organizations. through the referral mechanism.

BC/TIP identified and enrolled victims of human trafficking

referred by communities, government, and other stakeholders based on the existing comprehensive referral mechanism. BC/TIP also provided needs-based support to survivors of human trafficking both directly and through the use of district-level service directories developed by the project. Support includes life skills training, entrepreneurship training, shelter support, counseling, health care, linkages with safety net programs, loan support, small business support, and legal support. These comprehensive services allow survivors to regain control of their lives and empower them to make informed decisions about their reintegration into society.

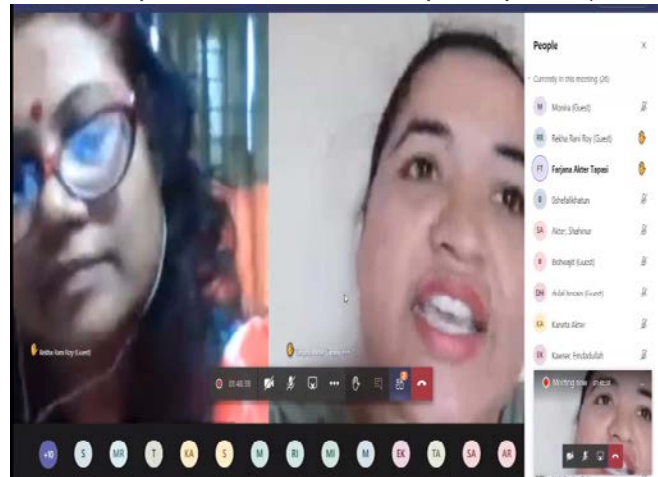
This activity is in line with the IR emphasizes access to assistance. Accordingly, BC/TIP protection sub-grantees provided needs-based and comprehensive support services to victims of trafficking following a coordinated approach and protection against revictimization for trafficked victims.

Basic Counseling Training

In Q3 of Y6 BC/TIP organized a training entitled “Basic counseling: working with survivors” for government officials, partner staff, and representatives from service providing organizations. This virtual training was conducted using the Microsoft Teams platform. A total of 25 participants (F-10, M-14, transgender-1) participated from different service-providing organizations, including the Department of Social Services (DSS) under the Ministry of Social Welfare.

BC/TIP’s goal is to enhance the knowledge of counseling support providers, promoting improved counseling services for survivors of trafficking at the local level. The training improved the capacity of BC/TIP partners and other service providers, including government officials, and enabled them to increase their understanding and provide comprehensive support to the survivors of human trafficking. The participants also learned the “victim centered approach” preparing them to provide an adequate response to victim’s needs.

Providing psychosocial counseling is one of the major focuses of the project. Accordingly, to increase the access of trafficking victims to psychosocial assistance, BC/TIP is strengthening mental health support for victims through capacity building of first responders such as social workers and counselors. The training enhanced the service providers’ knowledge and skills to address the psychosocial issues of victims of human trafficking, who are working in the frontline.

ANIRBAN leads awareness and advocacy at the local level

In Q3 of Y6 ANIRBAN members referred 33 victims of trafficking to the BC/TIP protection partners in the program area. They also provided family level counseling services to ensure the victims’ sustainable reintegration. ANIRBAN members successfully conducted a total of 22 community meetings in Satkhira and Rajshahi with 592 members of the community (F- 461, M-131) .

In Q3 of Y6, ANIRBAN members provided support to a total of 610 survivors, people at-risk of TIP, and vulnerable people. Out of the 610 persons, 484 people at risk for TIP and CM including some other vulnerable families received relief support under the social safety net program of the government, and ANIRBAN raised their own funds to support 126 out of 610 people at risk of TIP and CM.

In addition, through effective referral by ANIRBAN, 33 survivors of human trafficking received comprehensive support from different service providing organizations and were reintegrated into the society with respect and dignity.

Community people received awareness-raising messages from ANIRBAN and became aware of human trafficking, safe migration, child marriage issues and learned the importance of reintegration of TIP survivors. As part of its social responsibility, ANIRBAN members led the awareness-raising program and continued its advocacy with local governments to ensure relief support for vulnerable survivors during the COVID 19 pandemic.

ANIRBAN is a group that voluntarily works for the rights of survivors and utilizes the referral mechanism to ensure a needs-based approach for people at-risk and victims and survivors of TIP. BC/TIP contributed to build ANIRBAN as a platform with its distinctive voice and a unique space where survivors can make choices to improve their lives, take responsibility, and request protection and services. Therefore, ANIRBAN programs have been an integral part of the project's strategy to create increased access to assistance for TIP survivors. They are also contributing towards reducing the prevalence of human trafficking, which is the goal of the project.

Cox's Bazar

Life skills training conducted in safe spaces for adolescent girls

In Q3 of Y6, BC/TIP's sub-grantee BITA organized one safe space-based life skill training session with 20 adolescent girls maintaining social distancing and hygiene rules according to COVID-19 restrictions.

The main objectives of the training session were: 1) build communication and decision-making skills, establishing and maintaining relationships, stress management, and controlling emotions; 2) enhance their knowledge of livelihood planning and techniques to overcome social and personal challenges; and 3) create awareness on human trafficking, safe migration, child marriage, and gender-based violence (GBV) issues. As a result of the training, the girls increased their self-confidence, ability to make informed decisions concerning the options available to them, and ability to set a positive example for other girls in their community by playing a role in preventing TIP, CM, and GBV in their community.

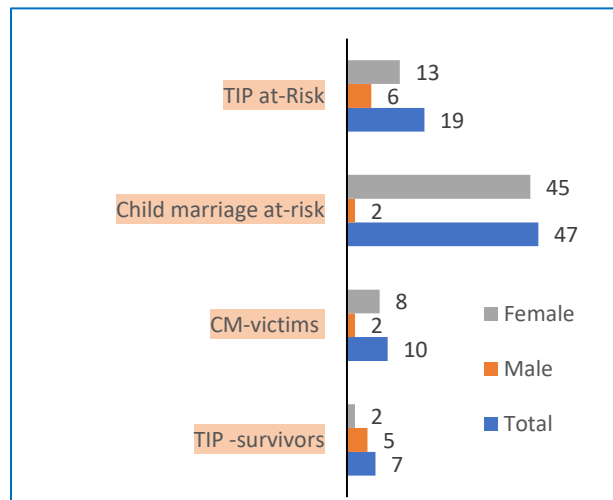

Enrollment of survivors of TIP and CM and people at-risk

In the Q3 of Y6, BC/TIP program’s sub-grantees YPSA and BITA identified 19 people at risk of TIP (M-06 , F -13), 47 people at risk of CM (M-2, F-45), 7 TIP victims (M-05 and F-02), and 10 child marriage victims (M-02 and F-08).

Peer leaders, CTCs, and ANIRBAN members contributed to identify people at-risk for TIP and victims of TIP and CM resulting in reducing the incidents of trafficking in Cox’s Bazar. All people at-risk for TIP and CM and victims of TIP and CM were referred to various services including awareness information on TIP, safe migration, child marriage, counseling support from safe spaces, health support from the One Stop Crisis Center and the camp hospital, and legal support from BC/TIP’s sub-grantee NONGOR.



At-risk persons’ and survivors’ data

One of the major objectives of the BC/TIP program is to identify people at-risk for TIP and victims of trafficking and CM and to support them through comprehensive referral mechanisms and community-based reintegration. The project builds their capacities according to their situation so they can recover their confidence and reintegrate within the family and society with self-esteem and protect them from re-victimization. In Q3 of Y6, 47 people at-risk (M-2, F-45) of CM, 19 people at-risk (M-6, F-13) of TIP, 07 TIP survivors (M-05 and F-02) and 10 child

marriage victims (M-2 and F-08) received individual and family counseling support services from the safe spaces of YPSA and BITA. Four TIP survivors and 6 CM victims received health care support from the OCC and in the camp hospital through referral mechanism.

Convene Stakeholder forum for key actors in camps and host communities planning

In Q3 of Y6, BC/TIP sub-grantee BITA conducted a follow-up discussion via phone with 10 officials (M-5, F-5) from government and non-government organizations reviewing their action plans preventing trafficking-in-persons developed with support from BC/TIP.

Key stakeholders reviewed their previous harmonized action plans within the COVID19 pandemic situation as the risks for trafficking, child marriage, and GBV issues increased in their communities. The main objective of this stakeholder forum was to review the action plans and take joint and coordinated initiatives to protect survivors and people at-risk of human trafficking, child marriage, and gender-based violence. The participants also expressed commitment to assist the BC/TIP program in identifying at-risk persons and victims of trafficking and child marriage and refer them for services. Stakeholder engagement remains a key priority for the BC/TIP program in supporting trafficking and child marriage survivors and people at-risk for TIP and CM and reducing stigma during their reintegration into their communities.

IR 3: Prosecution

BC/TIP enhances the capacity of criminal justice actors to investigate TIP cases, prosecute traffickers, and assist trafficking victims through technical assistance. The program also coordinates advocacy initiatives to expand government oversight, increase the rates of arrests and prosecutions, and monitor labor recruitment agencies. To improve and expedite prosecution of traffickers, BC/TIP implemented multi-disciplinary trainings, networking events, and capacity-building activities focused on the laws governing TIP and the NPA for Prevention and Suppression of Human Trafficking 2018 - 2022.

BC/TIP monitored filed cases and continued communication with the Solicitor Wing, Ministry of Law, Justice and Parliamentary Affairs (MoLJPA); the Director (Training) of the Judicial Administration Training Institute (JATI); the Director of the National Legal Aid Services Organization (NLASO); Assistant Inspector General (AIG) and the Deputy Inspector General (DIG) (Organized Crime) from the Police Headquarters; the additional DIG (Forensic training Institute, Criminal Investigation Department) special crime management division.

International and national media reported on several high-profile human trafficking cases involving Bangladeshis in Kuwait, Libya, and Vietnam. BC/TIP and partners assist victims and their families filing cases under the Prevention and Suppression of Human Trafficking Act of 2012, and report to USAID on the proceedings in the BC/TIP bi-weekly reports.

INCREASED RESPONSIVENESS OF CRIMINAL JUSTICE ACTORS

District Legal Aid Panel Lawyers Capacity development

In Q3 of Y6, BC/TIP's prosecution component organized a virtual training session with District legal Aid panel lawyers on June 27, 2020. A total of 19 legal aid panel lawyers (F-8, M-11) participated in the training. The objectives of the training were to increase the understanding and responsiveness of the District Legal Aid Panel Lawyers in dealing with the trafficking-related cases, and to enhance their skills in identifying TIP cases and dealing with victims and their families in line with the Prevention and Suppression of Human Trafficking Act-2012 & Rules 2017 and National Legal Aid Services Act 2000 and its rules.

The participants were able to increase their understanding of the TIP situation in Bangladesh. They also learned in depth about human trafficking and human smuggling, the relevant national legal frameworks and legal aid in Bangladesh and about victims' rights and protection. They were made aware of their roles and responsibilities as justice sector actors in ensuring

prosecution of traffickers and speedy resolution of TIP cases. It is expected because of the training, the process of establishing justice for trafficked victims will be improved.

One of the major focuses of the BC/TIP prosecution component is to increase the responsiveness of criminal justice actors. To this end, BC/TIP conducts various trainings to build the capacities of these stakeholders. Accordingly, this training was organized for the justice sector actors so they can play an instrumental role in ensuring justice in TIP cases.

Legal Support provided to trafficking victims

In Q3 of Y6, BC/TIP provided legal assistance to 25 survivors of TIP by filing 22 legal cases at the court to ensure justice three BMET cases to realize compensation from recruitment agencies or individuals through the arbitration process of BMET. Additionally, BC/TIP followed up 47 legal cases and 35 BMET cases to expedite the process to ensure justice.

Ensuring justice for victims of TIP is the main objective of BC/TIP's prosecution component and in line with the provisions of legal assistance as outlined above. The support from BC/TIP increased the victims' confidence in the judicial system to fight for their right and in ensuring justice while increasing the rate of TIP convictions in TIP.

BC/TIP supports case management and monitoring mechanisms, which include a comprehensive prosecution process that covers filing of cases, representing victims in court through panel lawyers, ensuring the attendance of witnesses in proceedings, attending hearings, and following up on cases at every stage through the District Legal Aid Committees and expert local legal aid organizations. This contributes to increasing the number of cases (acting as a deterrent against TIP incidents) and increases the number of convictions as victims and witnesses testify against traffickers.

Discussions with Key Justice Sector Actors

During the reporting period, BC/TIP's sub-grantees conducted 42 group/individual online meetings with Public Prosecutors (PPs), Assistant PPs, Senior Lawyers, Panel Lawyers, Investigation Officers, UP Chairmen, CTC members, victims, plaintiffs, and witnesses. The meetings were held to strengthen the referral mechanism, as well as monitoring and enhancing the review of the trafficking and child marriage cases.

BC/TIP maintained regular communication with relevant stakeholders through its sub-grantees. These meetings reminded the stakeholders of their roles and responsibilities in identifying TIP cases, supporting and protecting victims through referral mechanisms that reduced trafficking incidents in BC/TIP working area.



Discussion on human trafficking, GBV, CM and the COVID- 19 situation

Some of the major areas of concentration by BC/TIP included maintaining collaboration with different stakeholders, raising awareness in the local communities, ensuring CTCs function, improving the efficiency of investigations and establishing cooperation and coordination between police and prosecutors. BC/TIP counseled witnesses to ensure their attendance in court. Sometimes courts ordered the CTC members to investigate TIP cases in their areas so proper investigation reports become available; this is also supported by BC/TIP.

Cox's Bazar

Meetings with Public Prosecutors, Assistant Public Prosecutors, and Panel Lawyers

In Q3 of Y6, BC/TIP organized one group meeting via skype with Public Prosecutors (PPs), Assistant PPs, and three individual meetings with senior Lawyers, Panel Lawyers, Investigation Officers of the Police Bureau of Investigations (PBI) to review and study trafficking cases. BC/TIP also maintained regular communication with Public Prosecutors, Assistant Public Prosecutors, senior lawyers, and General Registrar Officer in Cox's Bazar, Chattogram to follow up on TIP cases.

Additionally, BC/TIP organized meetings with frontline justice sector actors to build rapport and monitor cases.

During the meetings, BC/TIP worked to raise awareness among the participants concerning their roles and responsibilities in combating human trafficking. BC/TIP promoted their cooperation to protect the victim's right in obtaining justice. BC/TIP's appointed Panel Lawyers worked in a committed manner and assisted victims, informing them of the case court dates with the victims/plaintiffs, worked for witness preparation, and maintained effective cooperation with Police (IO) and PP's. During the COVID-19 pandemic, because courts remained closed, BC/TIP

sub-grantees organized online meetings to continue monitoring mechanisms so proceedings of human trafficking related cases could re-start immediately with the reopening of courts.

Regular visits and interactions in public venues

In Q3 of Y6, BC/TIP's sub-grantees continued regular visits and interaction in public venues while practicing physical distancing (e.g. police stations, airports, hospitals, and truck stops) amid the COVID-19 pandemic. BC/TIP sub-grantees conducted three field visits to raise awareness of human trafficking, child marriage, and hygiene standards to protect them from COVID-19. BC/TIP's sub-grantee staff addressed people in order to educate them in preventing TIP, GBV, and child marriage.

BC/TIP is focused on awareness-raising in the community to prevent human trafficking with BC/TIP sub-grantees in regular field visits in intervention areas distributing leaflets, brochures, and informing them to call 999 or 16108 if human trafficking or child marriage occurred in their areas, and to provide information on COVID-19.

IR 4: Partnership

EFFECTIVE AND COORDINATED PARTNERSHIP AMONG STAKEHOLDERS TO COMBAT TRAFFICKING

Memorandum of understanding with Jharna Clinic and Diagnostic Center

In Q3 of Y6, BC/TIP prevention component signed a (MoU) with Jharna Clinic and Diagnostic Center located in Jashore district through sub-grantee Rights Jessore. This partnership promoted referral mechanisms and ensured primary healthcare services for TIP survivors, potential migrants, returnee migrants and victims of child marriage and GBV. BC/TIP established this partnership to ensure access to maximum health care facilities for people at risk, victims, and survivors of TIP. This also helped raise awareness among community people which resulted in increasing people's capacity to identify and prevent human trafficking.

STRENGTHENING PUBLIC -PRIVATE PARTNERSHIPS

During the reporting period, BC/TIP's prevention component organized networking meetings with different service providers and followed up with various government, non-government and private stakeholders to strengthen partnerships. Objectives of these meetings included: a) promote discussions related to TIP in the respective areas, b) create awareness among communities related to the risks and vulnerabilities of TIP and the labor migration cycle, and c) creating an understanding of the significance of collaboration and networking among all stakeholders in preventing TIP cases and protection of survivors.

During these advocacy and networking meetings, BC/TIP introduced different provisions of the NPA for the Prevention and Suppression of Human Trafficking (2018- 2022) and the U.S. State Department's TIP report. As a result of these meetings, stakeholders improved their understanding of TIP and became motivated to prevent TIP episodes, identify traffickers, protect people at-risk, victims, and survivors of TIP through establishing a functional referral mechanism.

With the intention to increase the capacities of local institutions BC/TIP arranged these meetings, fostering a coordinated effort to combat human trafficking. As a result of these meetings, government and private organizations identified 16 people at-risk for TIP and referred them to various service assistance organizations.

MoU with Smiling Sun Clinic: increasing access to health care for trafficking survivors

In Q3 of Y6, BC/TIP sub-grantee Dhaka Ahsania Mission (DAM) signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with Smiling Sun Clinic (Surjer Hashi Clinic) located in Jashore district under its protection component.

Through this MoU, a partnership developed between BC/TIP and Smiling Sun Clinic (Surjer Hashi Clinic) promoting a functional referral mechanism and ensuring healthcare services for TIP survivors and victims of child marriage, especially those who are at high risk of sexual exploitation and human trafficking.

To develop partnerships among the stakeholders in combatting human trafficking, BC/TIP signed several MoUs with different service organizations and continued its partnership with relevant private sector entities. Through this partnership, collective efforts will be established to reduce the prevalence of human trafficking by increasing access to reintegration

including health support of the trafficking survivors as well as by reducing the re-victimization of survivors.

Cox's Bazar

United Nations protection Cluster

In Q3 of Y6, BC/TIP program staff attended six online meetings of the UN protection working group organized by United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR), four online meetings of Anti-Trafficking working group (ATWG) co-chaired by IOM and UNHCR and BC/TIP subgrantee staff attended two inter-sector coordination online group meetings during COVID-19 pandemic. The meetings helped create coordination among members of the groups in terms of providing support to people at-risk; victims and survivors of TIP; and CM and GBV. The coordination assisted in avoiding duplication of effort and in some cases complement each other in service provisions.

BC/TIP is a member of the UN protection Working Group and attends their meetings on a regular basis to harmonize protection activities. The BC/TIP program staff have expressed solidarity with the protection working group, ATWG, and inter-sectoral group in Cox's Bazar by taking appropriate measures in camps and in host communities for the protection of TIP, CM victims, and people at-risk for TIP and CM. During these meetings, gaps such as lack of coordination and clear understanding of service provisions, etc. relating to different sectors were shared with all members so that they take necessary corrective measures to address the issues of trafficking, CM, and GBV.

In Cox's Bazar, UN agencies play a special role in coordination, protection, and service de livery in the camps and in the host community. BC/TIP is an active member of the Protection Cluster. BC/TIP is using this platform for ongoing information sharing and to identify opportunities to expand and improve the effectiveness of the response to TIP, CM, and GBV issues in the camp and in the host communities. BC/TIP will foster partnerships at multiple levels within and between key government actors, NGOs, and local community leaders to address TIP.

UN agencies and relevant international NGOs

BC/TIP staff communicated regularly this quarter with UN agencies and INGOs (DRC, Plan International, Save the Children, IRC, Handicap international, UNHCR, UNFPA and UNICEF) via phone and using online tools and resources to harmonize protection activities and other activities addressing the impacts of COVID-19. BC/TIP program staff acted as advocates with like-minded international organizations as well as UN agencies in Cox's Bazar in taking appropriate measures in camps and in host communities for the protection of TIP and CM victims, and people at-risk for TIP/CM.

In Cox's Bazar it is important to maintain liaison with UN agencies and like-minded international NGOs coordinated to provide service delivery in the camps and host communities for TIP, CM, and GBV issues. BC/TIP is using this platform for ongoing information sharing and engagement and to identify opportunities to expand and improve the effectiveness of the response to TIP, CM, and GBV issues. BC/TIP further strengthened partnerships at multiple levels within and between key government actors, NGOs, and local community leaders to address TIP. As a result

of BC/TIP's advocacy, BC/TIP's referral directory developed for Cox's Bazar district and referred at-risk, victims and survivors of TIP, CM and GBV to appropriate services such as health care clinic, legal support, shelter home services, etc. in the COVID-19 situation.

National and local NGOs

BC/TIP and sub-grantee staff participated in five online meetings this quarter via phone with National NGOs (BRAC, Aid Comilla, NONGOR and others) and local NGOs (HELP Cox's Bazar, PHALS Cox's Bazar, Pulse Bangladesh, and others). BC/TIP also maintained communication with national and local NGOs in Cox's Bazar and shared information concerning BC/TIP's activities, emphasizing the need for greater collaboration among the networking partners to address the issues of TIP, CM and GBV. BC/TIP program's goal is to coordinate with national and local NGOs to share resources, disseminate results, and offer support towards the prevention of TIP, as well as identifying TIP victims and populations at-risk for TIP and CM.

IR 5: Child Marriage

BC/TIP's Child Marriage (CM) component is focused on increasing awareness in communities, among families, and engaging youth groups to prevent child marriage. It also aims to develop the capacities of stakeholders including marriage registrars and local government institutions to prevent child marriage and make referrals to the appropriate service providers, ensuring services for those identified people at-risk and victims of CM.

BC/TIP carries out an innovative campaign program through its partners whose objectives are to enhance the knowledge of community members on issues related to CM, including the consequences so that they can effectively address CM issues. The program also carries out awareness raising within the communities on CM issues and provides them with supportive tools and innovative methods to fight against child marriage.

Apart from these efforts, BC/TIP's CM component works in five core areas: i) strengthening peer leader volunteer groups, ii) mobilizing communities on root causes of CM, iii) orienting locally elected representatives and religious leaders and journalists, iv) sensitizing parents, grand-parents and communities on CM issues, and v) availing support and services for the person at-risk and victims/survivors of CM.

INCREASED RESPONSIVENESS OF THE DUTY BEARERS AND JUSTICE ACTORS ON CHILD MARRIAGE ISSUES

Duty Bearers Trained

In Q3 of Y6, BC/TIP’s sub-grantees trained duty bearers, including marriage registrars and locally elected representatives, on the Child Marriage Restraint Act (CMRA) 2017 and its rules. A total 464 (F- 71, M- 393) people participated in 19 trainings. The objectives of the course were i) to create a clear understanding of CRMA 2017 and its rules among the duty bearers; ii) to increase their responsiveness to prevent child marriage; and iii) to avoid the practice of registering underage marriage under any circumstances. The training educated the target group regarding the penal provisions for those responsible with the intention of reducing the registration of child marriages in those areas. 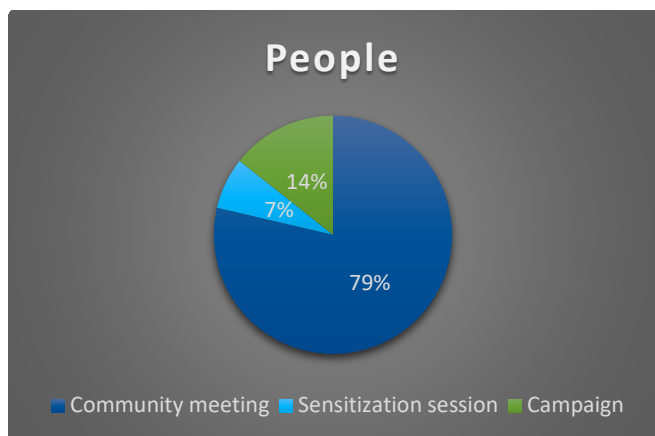
One of the strategies employed by BC/TIP is to increase the responsiveness of the duty bearers and justice actors in reducing the prevalence of child marriage. The duty bearers are the frontline actors, who can prevent child marriage. They can ensure elimination of child marriage by avoiding registration of marriage of underage people and challenge the manipulation of birth registration. This is why, duty bearers’ capacity building remains an integral part of the program. In Q3 of Y6, duty bearers prevented 25 child marriages and referred the victims to various service organizations.

Education of Parents, grand-parents, religious leaders and journalists

In Q3 of Y6, BC/TIP’s sub-grantees provided awareness raising trainings for parents, grand-parents, religious leaders, and journalists on CM issues during community meetings and campaigns. A total of 5,488 (F-4167, M-1321) people were sensitized through 319 events.

Advocates improved their understanding of the CMRA through awareness activities on the legal implications. As a result many parents expressed their commitments not to marry off their underage girls.

The important objective of BC/TIP CM component is to engage the communities and families in preventing CM and informing them of child marriage’s harmful effects. The major points of discussion included the definition of child marriage, child marriage and risks of human trafficking, punishment for perpetuating child marriage, services for the person at-risk, and victims of CM. The parents expressed their

commitment to work towards countering child marriage and to support the communities in reducing in obtaining concerning cases child marriage.

Assistance for persons at risk and victims of CM

During the reporting period QQ3 of Y6, BC/TIP's sub-grantees identified 91 girls at-risk for CM and 21 victims of CM. Five of the above received education support that allowed them to continue their studies This assistance enhanced the socio-economic standards and well-being of those at-risk and victims of CM studies.

Peer leaders, CTCs, and ANIRBAN members contributed towards reducing the incidents of child marriage in BC/TIP's working area by identifying persons (girls) at-risk and victims of CM.

IR 6: Knowledge Management and Learning (KML)

The BC/TIP program applies evidence-based program management and a strong program monitoring process. This is to maintain a high standard of programming and best support the project's planning and decision-making processes. The program does this through systematic M&E data management, adoption of collaborative learning, and monitoring of field level activities. BC/TIP carried out different types of monitoring, evaluation, research, and learning activities in the reporting period. This ensured the quality of results and documentation of the changes the program brought to the beneficiaries' lives.

BC/TIP KML relies on a strategy of frequent spot visits of partner's activities, where findings are shared instantaneously with partners and good practices are documented for further dissemination. In addition to that, quarterly meetings are held where lessons on each partner's challenges and strategies implemented to overcome challenges are shared to inspire partners in resolving their issues using in-house solutions.

BC/TIP KML monitors partners along their diversity of work and uses findings to tailor success strategies for other partners and attain better results in the next implementation cycle. This strategy has been very rewarding, as best practices and learnings for partners are identified and verified through results. These learning and best practices are then shared through quarterly

meetings to other partners, so that they may incorporate the learnings and best practices to scale up their results.

In Q3 BC/TIP developed story guidelines for writing success story for the reintegrated human trafficking survivors and voluntary activities of Peer leader and ANIRBAN members. The program also compiled databases for CTC activities, survivor enrollment, BMET compensation, Peer Leader and ANIRBAN activities, and survivor support.

In Q3, BC/TIP has extended the contract of software developer vendor Digital Express to enable them to carry out their pinning contract. When finished, this will allow geographical visualization of partner activities and achievements.

BC/TIP also contracted Catalyzer as a vendor to carry out the study on the implication of the adoption of section 19 in the Child Marriage Restraint Act, 2017. This quarter, Catalyzer submitted two deliverables: a presentation and a final report. The narrative report will be finalized in the next quarter.

The KML unit has updated training and other databases up to the end of Q3 of Y6 in Microsoft Excel and will update Teams (USAID recently replaced TraiNet with new software TEAMS) next quarter.

In coordination with USAID Asia CTIP project, BC/TIP and Asia CTIP drafted a how to guide for BCTIP learning papers, as well as finalize the research design and data collection plan for the returning migrants research in Bangladesh.

USAID Asia CTIP is working closely with Liberty Shared to turn project Monitoring and Evaluation (M&E) data along with Victim Case Management System (VCMS) data into sharable stories regarding trends in the region. In Q4, with the availability of 10 years of M&E data from the Bangladesh project, Liberty Shared will work with Asia CTIP to produce two to three data stories and provide evidence-based guidance for USAID Asia CTIP partners and bilateral projects.

Cross-Cutting (COVID- 19 Redirection)

Awareness Training for CTC Members, Peer Leaders, Youth Leaders, and ANIRBAN members on COVID-19 issues

In Q3 of Y6, BC/TIP's sub-grantees YPSA and BITA conducted awareness training sessions with 498 CTC members (M-397, F-101) within 35 CTCs and 32 ANIRBAN members (M-24, F-8) on COVID-19 issues. BC/TIP's sub-grantees YPSA, BITA, and AID Comilla organized awareness training sessions on COVID-19 issues with 50 peer leaders (M-44, F-6) and 20 youth leaders (M-12, F-8) in within a small group due to COVID-19 restrictions trainings were conducted while observing social distancing and strict hygiene practices.

In the training sessions, participants received awareness messages on maintaining social distance, hand washing, information about nearest health services, rights and access to healthcare, and government announcements on COVID-19. CTC members, peer and youth leaders, and ANIRBAN members are aware and can disseminate these messages within their communities and to maintain coordination with respective service providers supporting vulnerable communities with correct information and approach during the COVID-19 pandemic.

One of the important strategies of the BC/TIP project is enhance the capacities of CTC and ANIRBAN members, peer, and youth leaders so they can function as vanguards against human trafficking, CM and GBV in their community or concerning any emerging issues in order to support vulnerable communities. They can be effective change agents to bring about positive changes in the lives of the vulnerable groups and reduce instances of trafficking, child marriage, and GBV in their community. Therefore, after the training they disseminated the messages in their community and prepared an action plans including door to door visits and community sessions to raise awareness on COVID-19 pandemic.

Need Assessments and Providing Livelihood Support

In Q3 of Y6, BC/TIP's sub-grantees YPSA, BITA, Aid-Comilla, and NONGOR conducted an assessment among 100 returned labor migrants across Cox's Bazar (M-97, F-03) to investigate the impacts of COVID-19 and to identify themes for a Social Behavior Change Communication (SBCC) campaign to address issues such as stigma against migrants returning from abroad. The primary findings revealed that the behavior and attitude of community members are negative towards them and there is a tendency to maintain social distancing from them.

BC/TIP's subgrantee YPSA conducted an additional needs assessment to survey impacts on 50 reintegrated survivors (M-43, F-07) across Cox's Bazar district on their livelihoods. The assessment found 20% of respondents did not receive any cash/commodity support from government organizations or NGOs; 100% of them did not have access to basic needs and confronted challenges in their workplace; and 100% expected to receive livelihood support for 22 days.

BC/TIP's sub-grantees YPSA, BITA, NONGOR, and Aid Comilla prepared a list of 500 vulnerable persons who needed immediate livelihood support.

Program Challenges

In light of the COVID-19 outbreak and in accordance with 2 CFR 200.328(d)(1), Monitoring and Reporting Program Performance, Winrock International notified USAID on March 26, 2020 that Winrock anticipated that BC/TIP's implementation would be delayed due to the COVID-19 outbreak. Winrock provided a detailed explanation of the impact of the pandemic on 18 workplan activities and the identified mitigation measures.

On May 5, 2020 Winrock requested USAID to redirect \$100,000.00 of BCTIP's obligated award funds in response to COVID-19 and received approval of its work plan for period May 15-July 15 with the suggested activities, implementation timeline, implementer (sub-grantee), target numbers, and the geographic locations in Cox's Bazar.

Annex C: Success Stories

Story 1 (Prevention):

Role of Union CTC to Prevent Human Trafficking

Local Government helping the community

Human trafficking is a global crisis and Bangladesh is one of the source countries as well as transit points for human trafficking. The USAID funded and Winrock International implemented Bangladesh Counter Trafficking-in-Persons (BC/TIP) program is committed to counter this heinous act of human rights violations. The BC/TIP's sub-grantee Agrogoti Sangstha is working in Satkhira and Khulna district to prevent human trafficking and to promote safe and orderly overseas migration.

The Lagoljhara union Parishad formed a Counter-Trafficking Committee (CTC) in 2017 following the National Plan of Action (NPA) for the Prevention and Suppression of Human Trafficking, 2018-2022. The committee consists of 30 members along with a core committee having 10 members. The Lagoljhara CTC organizes meetings regularly and keeps committee members abreast of the overall situation of human trafficking in their locality. To keep track of overseas migrants and returnee migrants this CTC maintains register and updates it regularly.

The CTC conducts different types of awareness sessions in their community to raise awareness against human trafficking and child marriage. To support people at-risk, victims and survivors of TIP and CM, the CTC linked them to the government's social safety net programs such as VGD, VGF, housing, widow allowance, forty-day allowance, and maternity allowance. As a result of the efforts from the CTC the Department of social service (DSS) provided livelihood training and loan support to the people at-risk of TIP. Similarly, the agriculture department provided seed, fertilizer, and pesticides to people at-risk and victims to prevent human trafficking and child marriage and to ensure the victims were not revictimized. These awareness sessions and livelihood support helped trafficking survivors to overcome their difficulties and started to dream of a new life.

To raise mass awareness on human trafficking and child marriage, the chairman of CTC incorporated human trafficking and child marriage messages into the birth registration form. The Lagoljhara CTC has kept BDT 10,000 (\$122) in their annual budget to augment the awareness activities and carry out the expenses of regular CTC meeting. The President of this CTC

regularly attends Upazila CTC meetings, keeps them updated, and follows all the instructions provided by the Upazila CTC.

These awareness programs made community people of the union aware of the impact of human trafficking and child marriage and at the same time they know the importance of promoting safe migration. Most of the potential migrants know about the 10 steps of safe and orderly overseas migration. They also know the places where they can seek assistance, when they decide to go abroad. People visit UDC and DEMO offices to gather information regarding safe migration. As a result of the role played by the Lagoljhara CTC, the rate of human trafficking and child marriage are gradually decreasing in that community.

Story 3 (Child Marriage):

Parvin Akter's dream comes true

A tale of a child marriage victim turns into a self-reliant woman

Parvin Akter, a name of a fighter girl that became a self-reliant woman after a long fight. Parvin was born in a poor family in Cox's Bazar. Her childhood was not a happy one, and she did not have much love and affection from her parents. She was born in January 2002 and by the time she became 3 years old her parents got divorced and separated. Her father left her with her mother. Due to immense pressure of poverty, her mother sold her to a couple from another village of Cox's Bazar. Parvin cannot recall her real parents all she remembers is her foster parents Rashed Ali and Salma Khatun.

Although her foster parents were not bad people, they were also poor with two more daughters of their own. They could not provide Parvin with a happy childhood. Parvin somehow managed to study up to class five as a result of her extreme interest to study. When she was growing older her foster father became a changed person and often time abused her mentally.

In such situation, at the age of 15 her foster parents married her off to a person named Mobin Uddin from Kazi para, a village of Chawfaldandi Union under Cox's Bazar Sadar Upazila in May 2017. The marriage was not registered, and there were no documents of the marriage. After a few days, she realized that her husband was not a good person. He was an auto rickshaw driver by profession but had several bad habits. He started torturing Parvin both physically and

mentally. In a few months, Parvin’s conjugal life became unbearable. At that point her husband fled leaving her alone.

She was devastated. She neither had a good childhood nor a happy married life. As a victim of child marriage, she became helpless. When she was on the verge of losing all hope of life, she met a woman named Johura Khatun, who was involved in various types of social activities. Johura Khatun also knew about the USAID funded and Winrock International implemented Bangladesh Counter Trafficking-In-Persons and its activities. She also knew that BC/TIP’s partner organization YPSA does good things for vulnerable people like Parvin. Johura introduced Parvin with Selina Akter, a leader of the BC/TIP’s volunteer group ANIRBAN. Selina then took Parvin to the Shelter Home of YPSA “Shanto Niloy” in October 2019. When Parvin was brought to the shelter home, she was physically and mentally shattered as a result of torture by her husband.

At the shelter home, Parvin was provided with

full-fledged protection support that included shelter, food, cloth, healthcare and psychosocial counseling support. The YPSA shelter home also provided her with life skills training that changed her attitude towards life, and she became a confident person.

After that Staff members from BC/TIP and YPSA found that there was a training going on at the Smiling Sun Clinic, which they found suitable for Parvin who expressed her willingness to become a nurse during her interview by the case management worker of YPSA. They took the opportunity and enrolled Parvin into the training program of Smiling Sun Clinic. She received a two-month long training on nursing and healthcare related issues. She also did very well among the participants of the training. After receiving her training, she became extremely confident to do something meaningful in life. Finally, in June 2020 she got a job as nursing assistant at the local private clinic namely Union Hospital in Cox’s Bazar with support from BC/TIP’s subgrantee YPSA. She is receiving BDT 5,400 as starting salary, which has transformed her from a child marriage victim to a self-reliant person.

Story 4 (Knowledge Management and Learning):

Counter Trafficking Committees coming of Age

Proyas and RDRS role modeling accessing support for victims

BC/TIP KML monitors partners along their diversity of work and uses findings to tailor success strategies for other partners and attain better results in the next implementation cycle. This strategy has been very rewarding, as best practices and learnings for partners are identified and verified through results. These learning and best practices are then shared through quarterly meetings to other partners, so that they may incorporate the learnings and best practices to scale up their results.

Winrock's local partner Proyas is considered a role model for supporting people at risk of trafficking in its working areas. Proyas used innovative techniques to access various support from Counter Trafficking Committee (CTC) members such as arranging satellite livelihood training along with regular trainings and linking them to loan support. In addition to that Proyas ensured regular CTC presence at community events. The learning being, CTC members present in the session, leads to CTCs greater involvement in BC/TIP interventions, greater understanding of their roles and responsibilities in the NPA (National Plan of Action) and greater shouldering of community level responsibilities. Ultimately this allowed Proyas to seek and gather greater support for at-risk beneficiaries through CTC members. Since the beginning Proyas has supported 738 at risk people on various issues such as awareness raising on safe migration, skill development/livelihood training and linking them to loan support. Among them 599 persons at risk of trafficking got livelihood training and loan support from various CTCs. Of those 599, 62 people at risk received BDT 1,920,000 (USD 22,648) in loan support from various CTCs. Post adoption of this strategy, Proyas reported a sharp upturn in their numbers of people supported through CTCs.

These learnings and practices have been shared many times in the quarterly meetings of BC/TIP and it inspired other partners and they have adopted the mechanism in their community to support at risk individuals. In 2019, RDRS, a new partner of BC/TIP, was greatly inspired with Proyas's success and used the same learning to develop ideas on how to scale up their own results. RDRS returned to their community, introduced this approach and trained their staff and Peer Leaders. In addition, they have innovated further by familiarizing government officials to the National Plan of Action (NPA 2018-2022) so that they own the initiative. As a result, RDRS initiated advocacy and relationship building with CTC members in year 5, FY 2019 (ensuring attendance in meetings, events, explaining CTCs responsibility in protecting survivors as per NPA). Once CTCs comprehend RDRS's vision, RDRS shifted focus in year 6 (FY 2020) to support seeking from CTCs for survivors and at-risk individuals (livelihood, counselling, training, social safety net support). Ultimately, adoption of this learning lead to a sharp increase in their engagement numbers as well. For comparison, here is a glimpse of Proyas' and RDRS' performance in Y5 and Y6:
