The Disaster

On the evening of December 1, 1979, a fire of unknown origin started in a building close to the American Embassy in Georgetown and quickly spread to adjacent buildings. The fire department responded quickly but was unable to save the old wooden buildings; in all, four structures were destroyed. However, valiant efforts by the fire department did prevent the destruction of the American Embassy and other buildings in the area. One woman was killed when she apparently panicked and jumped from the top floor of one of the buildings on fire. Approximately 200 people were left homeless.

Action Taken by the Government of Guyana (GOG)

The GOG provided temporary housing at the West End Youth Centre in Georgetown for the homeless who were unable to find accommodation with friends or relatives. Meals for the homeless were prepared by the Guyanese Defense Force. The Guyana National Relief Committee, a voluntary organization organized through the office of the Prime Minister, went into action promptly to aid the victims. According to the committee, the monetary value of assistance provided by the GOG was approximately \$6,000.
