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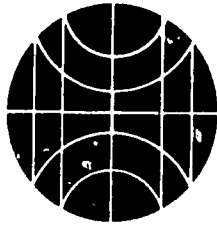
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International Directory of Women's Development Organizations

Editor's Introduction

The primary purpose of this Directory is to provide the basic contacts for communication among women's organizations, resource groups, and the international development community. With the help of these basic contacts, increasingly effective working relations can be built up in time.

The intent was to make the Directory a useful handbook rather than an encyclopedia. The broadness of the subject at hand and the fact that the whole world is included have set a strict limit on the space allotted to each organization's entry. Nevertheless, we cast our net widely in an effort to discover and list all women's organizations, and only one restriction was imposed: the organizations must qualify in terms of the broad meaning of development, by contributing in some way to the social and economic development process.

Initially the plan for this Directory was to list women's organizations in the developing countries only, and to describe their activities. But it soon became apparent that this would deprive many of the organizations in developing countries, especially the new ones, of the knowledge of where their counterparts were in the industrialized world. The plan was, therefore, modified, and organizations in all countries were included, although the number of organizations listed in the U.S.A., Canada, European countries and other industrialized nations had to be severely limited to include only some of the largest national ones. In keeping with the Agency's program focus, the emphasis was still placed on women's organizations in developing countries. For those who want to have more information than we could include, we have listed for the reader some sources of existing nationwide directories of women's organizations which were known to be available. Some of these lists are themselves quite long.

Of course, it is in the nature of human organizations that they change, and women's organizations are no exception. Frequently, the organization's mailing address is the home address of its president. With the election of a new president the organization's address will change. This must be kept in mind when using this directory.

I have tried my best to reach as many organizations as I possibly could. To this end, it was necessary to develop a questionnaire (reprinted on page ix) to send out in order to get the basic information from each organization. The questionnaire had to be suitable for organizations ranging from a few members up to more than one million members, and to elicit the pertinent facts about each group in a way that would permit publication of a reasonably sized book. This was, perhaps, too ambitious an undertaking. This Directory certainly can provide only an overview and a basis for further investigation.

The questionnaires were mailed out between February and July, 1975. I had some interesting experiences with the international mail service, which functions differently in different parts of the world. It soon became clear that air mail letters take anywhere from one to six weeks from the same region, depending on the countries involved. I regret to say that despite several follow-ups and sometimes repeated mailings, and though I had the help of International Women's Year centers (which in many countries act as "umbrella" organizations), I succeeded in getting back rather less than half of the questionnaires.

In tabulating the resulting data we have tried to keep to the original answers as closely as possible. Replies to Question No. 9 (about the organization's activities) had to be edited for uniformity and shortened because of space limitations. We hope that in thus condensing the answers we have preserved the variety of activities.

Replies to Question No. 10 (about difficulties in achieving objectives) were not printed for every organization, because in the vast majority of cases the response was "financial restraints" or, bluntly, "lack of money." But some replies mentioned other kinds of problems. These difficulties or hindrances to the organization's work included "traditional attitudes," "the rooted traditions of the country are an obstacle to enlightenment," "traditional thinking of people in politics," "psychological barriers," "closed minds," and "overcoming prejudices, not only by men but also from women." One answer was simply "men." Another reply was "the influence of machismo, the church, and the educators who convince women they are incapable of independence." "Our government does not listen willingly to advice from women." "Red-tapism," "widespread poverty," and "great unemployment" were cited as obstacles also.

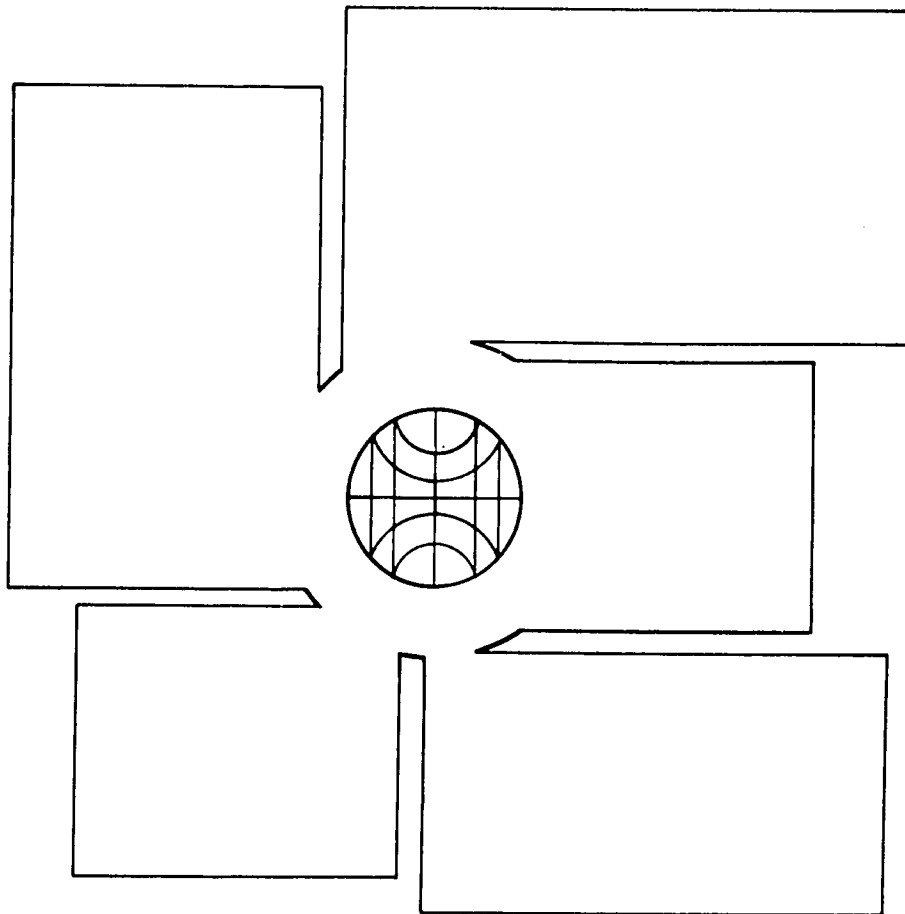
Finally, after reading and analyzing the more than six hundred questionnaires, one cannot help but come to the conclusion that women's organizations represent a huge resource and an enormous quantity of talent which all too often are only partially used by society. In some countries "umbrella organizations" coordinate volunteer service activities. But in others there seems to be much duplication of effort and interest. Often a great deal of effort is needed to raise funds for each program separately. If some of the organizations could join hands, or at least know who else is working in their fields of concern, the productive results of their talents, experience and commitment could certainly be multiplied. This Directory, it is hoped, will be a helpful instrument toward those goals and for development in general.

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GUIDE TO THE DIRECTORY

PART I—Local and National Organizations

The major part of this Directory is devoted to women's organizations which are local or national. The listing is alphabetically by country, beginning with Afghanistan and ending with Zambia. The organizations in each country are listed in the following order:

First, all the women's organizations. Most are those who completed and returned the questionnaire, but a few are included at the end of the list which, though they did not respond, were found in various lists obtained from both official and unofficial sources. The organizations are listed by size, the biggest organizations first and the smallest organizations last. The order of listing has no relationship to the importance of the organization.

Second, resource organizations. These are not always women's groups, but they can be helpful to women's organizations in various ways. Examples are institutes doing research on matters related to women; groups providing useful directories or other lists; or organizations which are sources of information. Some family planning organizations are in this resource section, since they are not women's groups.

The Master Chart of Local and National Women's Development Organizations. The Master Chart serves as a quick summary of and reference guide to all the women's organizations in Part I. The Master Chart is arranged in the same way as the listings in Part I, alphabetically by country. The Master Chart should be especially useful for organizations trying to identify others pursuing activities similar to their own. For example, all organizations which carry on health activities will have a check in column No. 10 of the Master Chart.

PART II—International Organizations

This part of the Directory is arranged as follows:

First, regional organizations; second, worldwide organizations. These organizations are listed in groups according to their activities. The reader will find that many women's organizations in Part I of the Directory are affiliated with one of the international women's organizations in Part II.

PART III—International Resource Organizations

Many of these are not women's groups, but they can be helpful to women's organizations in various ways. The United Nations and its Agencies are grouped together at the end of this international resource section. Only those UN Agencies whose programs include work directly related to the status and participation of women are included in this list.

GUIDE TO THE MASTER CHART

Column 1. PAGE. Turn to the page number shown on the chart for more complete information on the organization.

Column 2. REGION. AM means Americas, both North and South. A & P means Asia and Pacific. EU means Europe. AF means Africa. ME means Middle East.

Column 3. COUNTRY. This is the country in which the organization is located.

Column 4. NAME OF ORGANIZATION.

Column 5. AFFILIATION. A check in this column means the organization is connected in some way to another organization.

Turn to the organization's page number shown in Column 1 for more information.

Column 6. CHAPTERS. This number shows how many different sub-groups are a part of the organization.

Column 7. INDIVIDUAL MEMBERS. The number in this column shows how many people are members. Some organizations do not have individual members; these organizations have sub-groups or chapters.

Column 8. FEDERATION. A check in this column means that the organization is a "federation." Federations are composed of a number of separate organizations, each of which is independent. A federation usually is a coordinating, or "umbrella," organization.

Explanation of Activity Columns:

Each of the columns from Column 9 through Column 16 shows a broad field of activity in which an organization may work. Each column heading shows the broad field. The list which follows divides each broad field into a number of possible component activities, each designated by a letter, A, B, etc.

On the master chart, the letters in any activity column mean that the organization engages in the component activities represented by that letter. For example, under Column 10, the letters A and B would show that the organization engages in Family Planning and Nutrition activities in the HEALTH CARE field.

A check mark instead of a letter or letters means that the organization is active in the broad field, such as EDUCATION or HEALTH CARE, but that the questionnaire response did not give specifics.

- F. Social Service and Welfare including Aged
- G. Other home and neighborhood activities.

Column 12. ECONOMIC and TRADE includes:

- D. Unions
- E. Consumer Affairs
- F. Fund Raising (for other than internal use)
- G. Job and Economic Rights

Column 13. CIVIL and POLITICAL (RIGHTS) includes:

- D. Community Organization/Citizenship
- E. Legislation
- F. Political Action
- G. Advisory Council
- H. Recreation and other civic activities.

Column 14. RURAL, AGRICULTURAL, and ENVIRONMENTAL includes:

- B. Rural Development
- C. Gardening and Growing
- D. Food Processing
- E. Village Improvement
- F. Other rural and agricultural activities.

Column 15. PROFESSIONAL includes:

- A. Teaching and Education
- B. Nursing and Midwifery
- C. Medical
- D. Legal and Legislative including legal aid
- E. Administrative and Executive
- F. Other professional groups' activities.

Column 16. COMMUNICATION and the ARTS includes:

- A. Print Media: Publications
- B. Audio-visual Media: Radio, Television
- C. Visual Arts and Exhibits
- D. Performing Arts
- E. Conferences, Seminars, Meetings
- F. Cultural
- G. Information Communication Service
- H. Other activities in communications and the arts.

Column 17. DATE ESTABLISHED. This date shows when the organization began.

Column 18. LANGUAGE. The language or languages used by the organization.

Column 19. INTERNATIONAL. If a check is in this column, it means that the organization carries on programs in more than one country, or is a member of a larger organization which includes similar groups in other countries. This is different from Column 5. *AFFILIATION*, which means a looser connection with a different organization, possibly in the same country.
