

## TAICH COUNTRY REPORT DEVELOPMENT ASSISTANCE PROGRAMS FOR KENYA

July 1980

This report describes the programs of 68 private, non-profit U.S. organizations which provide the people of Kenya with development assistance and material aid. An index of the specific programs appears in chart form at the end of the report. Of the 68 U.S. organizations included in the report, 36 were able to provide TAICH with financial data indicating program expenditures in 1979 totaling \$11,014,016. These figures should be viewed more as indicators than as exact sums; differences in fiscal year, methods of financial reporting and methods of estimating dollar values of commodities, equipment and material shipped make correlation and absolute accuracy impossible.

This is one of a series of periodically revised reports which describe by country the development assistance activities of the U.S. non-profit sector. Additional and new information on the programs of the organizations appearing in this report is gathered regularly and is available from TAICH. Readers are requested to advise TAICH of any changes or new programs of U.S. private, non-profit organizations in Kenya. Besides country reports, TAICH publishes directories, bibliographies, a quarterly newsletter and a series of category reports in which descriptions of assistance programs are compiled by functions of development assistance. A publications list is available from TAICH.

It makes available to organizations, government, researchers and others, source materials from its files for study and research. Through publications and the maintenance of an everyday inquiry service TAICH responds to the need for current information about development assistance with particular reference to the resources and concerns of the private, non-profit sector.

THE AGENCY FOR INTERNATIONAL DEVELOPMENT (A.I.D.), part of the United States International Development Cooperation Agency, maintains in its Bureau for Private and Development Cooperation a registry of U.S. private and voluntary organizations active in the fields of relief, rehabilitation and development overseas. Programs are designed and priorities are set by the Central Organization of Trade Unions (COTU); African-American Labor Center assists to the degree permitted by its modest resources.

COOPERATIVES, CREDIT UNIONS & LOANS: In cooperation with COTU and the Kenya Union of Savings & Credit Cooperatives (KUSCCO) has assisted in the development of workplace credit unions. A cooperative housing program has been launched. A Kenya Cooperative Housing Agency will be formed to coordinate all parties interested in helping workers own their homes through cooperative efforts.

INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT & MANAGEMENT: Recently the focus has been on trade union education through the Workers' Education Institute (WEI).

FUTURE PLANS. A new emphasis will be the development of the Labour College at <u>Ki sumu</u> on <u>Lake Victoria</u>. COTU has built classrooms, residences and offices; the development of curriculum is well underway and during 1980 classes will begin, enabling trade unionists to extend their training and education.

COMMUNICATIONS: Provides recording teams which prepare cassette recordings in areas where there is a large amount of illiteracy. These are duplicated in <u>Nairobi</u> and then cassettes and recorders are sent to such areas. Also constructing a public address system specially designed for local conditions.

EDUCATION: Supports 1,650 primary schools and 15 high schools now operated by the Government of Kenya.

FOOD PRODUCTION & AGRICULTURE: Operates two projects in Agudo and Lotubai. In Agudo the aim is to help farmers improve their crops and farming methods. Lotubai was started at the request of the Government to teach the nomadic Turkana about agriculture. Various methods of dry farming have been tried. As part of the Lotubai project established a village polytechnic to teach useful skills to the population that has settled around the project. Additional projects are planned for Lokichogio and Amays.

MEDICINE & PUBLIC HEALTH: Operates a medical center at <u>Kijabe</u> which is in the midst of an expansion program including a new school of nursing. A second hospital is operated at <u>Kapsowar</u> including a community health program funded by Oxfam (U.K.) for preventive health care in rural areas around <u>Kapsowar</u>. Operates health centers or dispensaries at <u>Lokichogio</u>, <u>Lokori</u>, <u>Kalokol</u>, <u>Litein</u>, <u>Gatab</u>, <u>Loglogo</u>, <u>Githumu</u>, <u>Eldama Ravine</u>, <u>Mukaa</u>, <u>Mulango</u> and <u>Syapei</u>. All of these centers provide curative health care.

SOCIAL WELFARE: Provides personnel to 10 children's homes to care for children who have lost one or both parents; this program is funded from the Netherlands.

FUTURE PLANS: To initiate community health projects in north Kisii and Mulango.

Agricultural Cooperative Development International provides personnel to the Agricultural Finance Corporation to assist them in carrying out the programs described below.

COOPERATIVES, CREDIT UNIONS & LOANS: A World Bank/IDA credit totaling \$25 million was made available to the Kenyan Government in early 1977 to help finance an additional three years of Agricultural Finance Corporation's (AFC) ongoing agricultural development lending program. The credit is to enable AFC to expand its small farm holder credit operations in volume and to add six districts to the 22 being served. The project is designed to extend both medium-term (five-years) and seasonal (one-year) credits to relatively more sophisticated and commercially oriented small farm holders who are interested in improved productivity and who show a good potential for expanded production. The project also includes a credit component aimed specifically at medium-scale farmers (those owning over 20 but less than 400 hectares). At the present time there are over 2,000 medium-scale farms in Kenya. Although quite often well-managed, they are seriously under capitalized. With their farms already mortgaged. the owners lack additional security and they are unable to obtain the medium and short-term credit necessary for the purchase of farm inputs and machinery since commercial banks do not normally accept a second mortgage as security. Individual loans of up to \$20,000 are being made by AFC to assist in the purchase of farm machinery (especially tractors), land development and seasonal inputs.

FUTURE PLANS: To assist the Government of Kenya to develop an improved cooperative training program.

COMMUNICATIONS: Sends tapes in English, French or Spanish, or scripts which are translated and taped by volunteers into the local language. These tapes are used by local radio stations to broadcast as a public service short, practical health messages on dental hygiene, disease prevention, drug abuse, ecology, family planning, mental hygiene, nutrition and sanitation. The messages, broadcast daily throughout the prime listening time, emphasize preventive medicine. Each major category is given 10-30 second spots.

The program is run nationwide and focuses on nutritional improvement, particularly for mothers and pre-school children, and on 33 rural community development projects which are assisting approximately 363,000 people. Some of the programs are described below.

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT: Supports an integrated rural development program at <u>Sololo</u> and <u>Moyale</u>, <u>Marsabit District</u>, which includes well-digging, the construction of 500 gallon cement storage jars for family grain storage, formation of cooperatives and women's development education; and an integrated housing and agricultural program, including irrigation, to enable the Ethiopian refugee community at <u>Badassa</u> to become self-sufficient. Purchased 50 raintanks for primary, nursery and secondary boarding schools.

FOOD PRODUCTION & AGRICULTURE: Assisting several projects in various sections of the country including: the Mbitini women's poultry project at Mbitini, South Machakos District, which is providing agricultural services, family grain storage units, a restaurant and a shop for selling women's produce; the Gabra rehabilitation program near Marsabit, which provides small goat herds and bullocks for ploughing; the Kitui sheep and goat project near Kitui, a demonstration and training ranch to improve the quality of local sheep and goats; the South Sakwa water project, Siaya District, a piped water program; and an experimental water catchment project in Kitui District.

MEDICINE & PUBLIC HEALTH: In 1979 distributed 7,580,542 pounds of PL 480 food, valued at \$1,364,177 to 87,000 people, including 65,000 mothers and children under five in 107 pre-school clinics, 17,000 nursery school children in 98 nurseries and day-care centers, 3,500 children in 40 institutions and 1,500 food-for-work recipients. Foodstuffs consisted of milk, soyabean salad oil, corn-soya-milk, bulgur wheat and sorghum grits. Also distributed 703,000 pounds of powdered milk, donated by the European Economic Community (EEC) valued at \$755,921, to 25,000 refugees and displaced families, tuberculosis and leprosy centers, hospitals, homes for the aged and primary schools in remote areas. Purchased local food for displaced persons. The health and nutrition program for mothers and children operated throughout the country includes weighing each child monthly, immunization against disease, education of mothers in proper child care and the utilization by women of locally available food resources to improve family nutrition. Distributed 58,000 pounds of medicines and medical supplies, provided by Catholic Medical Mission Board and European donors, valued at \$166,259, to approximately 84 hospitals and clinics.
