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DEVELOPMENT ASSISTANCE PROGRAMS FOR INDIA

This report describes the assistance programs for India of 112 U.S. organizations. It includes voluntary agencies, missions, foundations and other non-profit organizations which provide the people of India with material aid and assistance in medicine and public health, education, community development, etc.

This is one of a series of periodically revised country reports representing an expansion and updating of Part II of the TAICH 1971 directory, U.S. Non-Profit Organizations in Development Assistance Abroad. Additional and new information on the programs of the organizations listed in these reports may be obtained from TAICH, as well as reports on Bangladesh, Pakistan, Indonesia, Yemen, Brazil, Colombia, Guatemala, Haiti, Nicaragua, Khmer Republic (Cambodia), Laos, Thailand, Botswana, Burundi, Ethiopia, Lesotho, Rwanda, Sudan, Zaire (Congo Kinshasa) and Zambia. These reports are available free of charge.

Geographical place names have been standardized in accordance with the map of India published under the direction of the Surveyor General of India (1972). The designation "international" under the heading PERSONNEL refers to personnel other than U.S. or local, or to non-local personnel in general when citizenship information is not available.

Of the 112 U.S. organizations included in the report 60 were able to provide TAICH with financial data. These figures indicate that a total of \$94,624,462 was expended in financial aid. These figures are approximate owing to differences in fiscal years, methods of financial reporting, and methods of estimating dollar values of commodities, equipment, and material shipped. In instances where a determination of expenditures was not possible the notation "Not available" has been made after the heading FINANCIAL DATA.

The Technical Assistance Information Clearing House, operated by the American Council of Voluntary Agencies for Foreign Service under contract to the U.S. Agency for International Development, functions as a center of information on the socio-economic development programs of U.S. non-profit organizations. Through publications and maintenance of an inquiry service, it makes available to organizations, governments, researchers, and other users, information about development assistance with particular reference to the resources and concerns of the private, non-profit sector.

The information given on each organization is based on the data supplied to TAICH by that organization. Publication of this information does not guarantee accuracy of content, or endorsement of any organization by the American Council or TAICH.

AFPRO is not a U.S. non-profit organization, but an Indian Society; several U.S. voluntary agencies are members of AFPRO. For this reason a description of the AFPRO program is included. AFPRO is an autonomous Indian registered Society established in 1966 as a professional service link between international assistance agencies and voluntary agencies who work in India for the benefit of the marginal farmer. It is a secular, non-profit, non-loss, specialist organization whose purpose is bringing together structures at grass roots level into a single action program for the development of food production in India through the small farmer. The overseas AFPRO-related agencies are the World Council of Churches (WCC), Catholic Relief Services-USCC (CRS), Church World Service (CWS), MISEREOR, Bread for the World, Protestant Central Agency for Development Aid (Germany), Caritas Internationalis, Lutheran World Federation (LWF), Lutheran World Relief (LWR), Division of World Outreach (Canada), CORSO, Christian Aid, United Methodist Committee Overseas Relief, Community Aid Abroad and Australian Catholic Relief. Members of the AFPRO Governing Body include representatives of the member agencies: Caritas India, Church World Service, Catholic Relief Services-USCC, Indo-German Social Service Society, Indian Social Institute, Lutheran World Federation, the Division of World Outreach, the Society for Developing Gramdams and the Indian Freedom from Hunger Campaign/Peoples Action for Development. Heifer Project International is an Associate Member.

FOOD PRODUCTION & AGRICULTURE: AFPRO has five departments whose specialists are professional. Jointly they endeavor through implementing agencies - who also endeavor to work on a non-profit non-loss basis - to help develop the marginal farmer. The five departments are described below:

Overall Planning and Project Development is the responsibility of the Executive Director and Executive Secretary and the main purpose is to focus

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effort on key needs and priorities and to consider new areas of development. To effectively ensure this there is close collaboration with the Government and its development plans. A subsidiary purpose is to advise and encourage AFPRO-related projects themselves to be viable and progressive units capable of continuing development programs through the medium of revolving funds without unnecessarily seeking additional aid. In program planning special care is taken to ensure that as far as possible project proposals incorporate means by which the small farmer can take advantage of the various integrated credit schemes operating in the country. This department is also responsible for overall coordination of common policy through the medium of Conferences, Seminars and Training Courses.

AFPRO's Charter of Duties confines it to development programs. In exceptional cases where relief can be extended to development AFPRO does take an active part.

Water Resources Development (WRD) Department: The main activities of this department are support of on-going WRD programs, evaluation of new project proposals, evaluation of existing AFPRO-related projects concerned with the water development program, assistance in the compilation of inventory and arrangement for procurement of spare parts for AFPRO-owned equipment. Groundwater investigation programs have been established and managed in Maharashtra, Tamil Nadu, Mysore, Bihar and Madhya Pradesh. A team for Andhra Pradesh is now planned.

General Agricultural Department: This department endeavors to extend AFPRO's activities - which were mainly water resources development - into the wider agricultural fields of food production. It encourages AFPRO-related projects in extension work by helping the uneducated farmer to measure his assets and required inputs by giving him a better understanding of new techniques; and by helping to protect him from the money lender and ruthless competitors. Special effort, therefore, is directed to programs which incorporate integrated credit schemes, agro-services and training in particular through Young Farmers Clubs.

Poultry and Livestock Department: Work similar to that being done by the Agricultural Department is also undertaken by this department. There are 20 poultry and 8 livestock AFPRO-related projects and a similar number are being planned. Technical assistance is also given: in 1972 to 45 poultry and 17 livestock projects. Training courses are annually conducted. In recent years special attention has been given to frozen semen and cross breeding projects. It has also helped to import animals to establish new projects of which the biggest consignments were a Christian Aid grant of 210 heifers and a shipment of 56 cattle and 176 sheep from "For Those Who Have Less."

Technical Information Service Department: This department serves as a "clearing house" for information of a technical nature which is provided to agencies engaged in food production and related projects with the help of AFPRO specialists and a Board of Consultants who act in a voluntary capacity. Monthly News Notes are distributed to some 2,500 project personnel and others in India, to interested organizations and to persons abroad. TIS also regularly issues technical publications such as booklets and papers. Since 1967, over 14,600 requests for technical information were answered by the staff of this department.

PERSONNEL: Two executives and, over the years, an average of 15 specialists make up the permanent staff; of these all are Indian with the exception of 2 Australians and 1 Canadian. In addition there are 22 Indian contractual specialists, all in Water Resources Development, and all in the field. There is an office administration staff of 16, all Indian.

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FINANCIAL DATA: The Finance Department is responsible for the maintenance of all funds and accounts relating to the AFPRO administrative budget and to donations to AFPRO-related projects, the bulk of which are phased in. The total disbursements for the U.S. Spare Parts Fund maintained by CWS, New York as of 1973 is \$214,568; it is funded by CWS, WCC, LWR, LWF, and World Neighbors. CWS contributes also to the administration budget which had an estimated expense of U.S. \$91,528 for 1973.

The Board of Founders financially supports the Institute which is affiliated with the University of Allahabad. The Institute offers bachelor's and master's degrees in agriculture, home economics and agricultural engineering. It had an enrollment of 50 women and 515 men in 1972. The following program is conducted by the Institute:

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT: Rural extension work in Allahabad district: in 1971-72 the Institute organized farmer's fairs, youth club rallies, demonstrations and

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discussion groups involving over 25,000 people. Topics included improved agriculture practices, family planning, improved home and health practices and applied human nutrition. Continues to give advice to over 40 youth clubs previously organized by the Institute.

EDUCATION: Formal courses leading to a bachelor's degree in agriculture, agricultural engineering and home economics and a master's degree in agricultural engineering and different fields of agriculture such as horticulture, agricultural extension, agronomy, animal husbandry, dairy technology and agricultural economics. As a part of the rural extension education program, short courses in improved farm and home practices for rural people are conducted in villages primarily within 30 miles of the Institute but also beyond this limit in other villages of Allahabad district. Work among village women is concentrated in about ten villages within 15 miles of the Institute.

MEDICINE & PUBLIC HEALTH: Operation of a 12-bed clinic, which performs approximately 100 deliveries and serves about 29,000 outpatients each year. Clinic staff also assists in teaching home economics classes and supervises the general hygiene at the Institute.

POPULATION & FAMILY SERVICES: A rural family planning project was initiated in 1971 and is in operation in 300 villages of the area with significant impact on rural people and valuable experience gained in the field by project personnel. Male and female sterilizations, IUDs and other contraceptive methods are promoted and performed.

PERSONNEL: 90 academic staff.

FINANCIAL DATA: Not available.

COOPERATING GOVERNMENTS & ORGANIZATIONS: The Institute is supported by the Government of India; the State Government of Uttar Pradesh; the Indian Council of Agricultural Research; Protestant Church agencies in Europe, North America and Japan. It received grants and income from Agricultural Development Council; Bread for the World (Germany); the Ford Foundation; Freedom from Hunger Campaign; Harvard-Yenching Trustees; Lutheran World Relief; Oxfam (England); and the Rockefeller Foundation.

EDUCATION: In South India assists 5 interdenominational colleges, and maintains 22 schools (kindergarten, primary, secondary, normal and vocational training) serving 6,811 students, 1 agricultural training center with 33 students, and 11 adult literacy centers with 75 students each. Assistance in North East India is to a union college; to 21 schools, ranging from kindergarten to high school levels for 2,344 students; to a literature program for the training of Indian writers; and for adult literacy work. In Bengal-Orissa-Bihar, assists 3 interdenominational

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colleges, operates 4 schools (kindergarten, primary, grammar, high and vocational) for 3,321 students and conducts a literature program. (Above enrollment figures are for 1972.)

**MEDICINE & PUBLIC HEALTH:** In South India maintains 3 hospitals at Nellore, Ongole, and Hanamkonda and 2 dispensaries at Ramayapathan and Podile all of which treated a total of 11,657 inpatients and 59,458 outpatients in 1972. Attached to the 3 hospitals are nurses' training schools for about 100 student nurses. Also cooperates in the work of the Vellore Christian Medical College and Hospital and sponsors students in various types of medical training in both mission and Government medical colleges, including family planning programs. In North East India assistance is given to 6 hospital at Aizuto, Impur, Gauhati, Jorhat, Kangpokpi and Tura; to 6 dispensaries at Kangpokpi and Nishangram treating a total of 12,677 inpatients and 47,589 outpatients in 1972; and to three nurses; training schools in Gauhati, Jorhat and Tura with an enrollment of 112 student nurses in 1972. In the states of Bengal, Orissa and Bihar assists in maintaining a 26-bed hospital at Nekursini and 3 dispensaries at Bhimpur and Bhomradhi, which treated 529 inpatients and 30,975 outpatients in 1972.

**POPULATION & FAMILY SERVICES:** Mission hospitals, with Government assistance, have made significant endeavors toward family planning.

**SOCIAL WELFARE:** Conducts 1 community center in South India and 5 community centers in the states of Bengal, Orissa, and Bihar; conducts programs in communications in South India and North East India, and programs of leadership training, community development, and agricultural training in South India, North East India and the states of Bengal, Orissa and Bihar. Participates in the South India SAMAVESAM (a council of Telugu-speaking Baptists) well-digging work which is contributing not only to agriculture, but to the support of destitute people who are paid in food for their work.

The American Council supports the work of the Mission with finances and personnel in co-operation with branch organizations in England, Australia, New Zealand, Scotland and Canada. An orphanage-rescue home for 800 girls and women constitutes a center from which the following integrated community projects are conducted:

EDUCATION: Operation of the Sharada Sadan school for approximately 600 children, kindergarten through grade 11; a school for the blind; adult literacy classes; provision of instruction in home economics and child care. Maintenance of a mechanics and carpenters training program and printing of school materials and local publications.

FOOD PRODUCTION & AGRICULTURE: Operation of a farm and dairy with unneeded produce sold in the local market.

MEDICINE & PUBLIC HEALTH: Maintenance of a hospital, dispensary and village maternity dispensary and general outpatient work. Operation of a mobile medical van which tours outlying villages regularly. The Mission trains medical personnel for the staffing of its hospital and dispensary and distributes foodstuffs, medicines and grains within the community.

SOCIAL WELFARE: Conducts handicraft classes for blind and rehabilitated girls; materials produced are sold in Bombay and through overseas Councils.

FUTURE PLANS: Gradual replacement of missionary staff by trained national personnel.

PERSONNEL: 3 U.S.; 9 international; 30 local (including the superintendent and all department leaders).

PROGRAM INITIATION: 1889. Organized U.S. assistance began in 1920.

FINANCIAL DATA: Expenditures for CY 1972: \$159,682 (including \$87,300 sent directly overseas and \$10,000 used for the purchase of materials which were sent abroad).

COOPERATING GOVERNMENT & ORGANIZATIONS: Government of India partially subsidizes the school program; CARE contributes powdered milk; Direct Relief Foundation and Medical Assistance Programs contributed drugs in 1972.

MEDICINE AND PUBLIC HEALTH: The program of the RIHP is directed toward developing better health among rural people of India. Citizens of both India and the United States cooperate in this effort. Pathikonda Hospital/Clinic, Chitoor, Andhra Pradesh. A 10-bed hospital (with plans for 50 more beds), giving medical services to the needy people of a drought-famine stricken area, furnishing nutritive aid as well as drugs.

Whitefield Clinic, Suburban Village, near Bangalore. Serving needs of community for medical services, drugs, etc.

Mobile Hospital Unit. Used in various ways, including: In 1972 transported staff, equipment, and supplies to Bangladesh border, serving refugees for four months; in March, 1973 used for a Mass Vasectomy Camp near Whitefield Clinic at the request of Mysore Minister of Health; from August to October, 1973 it was used to take a Medical Team (10 persons), organized by RIHP Project Director, to

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give medical aid and nutrition help to 2 famine-and-drought stricken areas of Mysore State. This was requested by the Mysore Minister of Health. The team included staff from St. Martha's Hospital and from the Church of South India's Hospital.

A Youth Extension Service Project in which the Student Health Center at Sri Venkateswara University assisted the University in establishing a program for improving the living conditions of the villagers in Erpedu, a village near the University. Preventive and curative health care, improvement of the local school, and functional literacy are emphasized through establishment of the following: an out-patient dispensary (with the cooperation of the Medical College of the University), an immunization campaign, an adult education program which provides literacy classes in subjects related to vocational and health needs of villagers, and provision of books and science laboratory equipment for the school.

MEDICINE & PUBLIC HEALTH: Student health centers established by WUS continue to function and serve the university community.

POPULATION & FAMILY SERVICES: Indian WUS Committee has established a Youth and Population Program, designed to involve young people in research, information and population activities and to extend to local areas a greater knowledge of the inter-relationships between resources, health and population. Students, faculty and young people meet for 5 day workshops, divided between seminar sessions and field study.
